275 Years

Happy Anniversary: 1748 to 2023

A small pamphlet titled the *Centennial Exercises* was published following the 100th anniversary celebration of our church building on September 25, 1890. The Rev. Dr. William M. Paxton from Princeton Theological Seminary was the keynote speaker at the grand occasion. The Paxton family, four generations of Presbyterian pastors of rich Scots Irish heritage, were an influential force in colonial Presbyterian circles. Having Dr. Paxton travel from New Jersey and preach at our anniversary celebration was quite an honor.

These are Dr. Paxton's beautiful words: "The tongue of time is speaking; the voices of a hundred years are ringing in our ears. If the walls of this ancient church could speak, or its echoes could syllable the memories of the past, what a tale they would tell... We see the old church, its grove of majestic trees, the horses standing in the shade, the gathering of families and friends in little clusters to ask of each others welfare; the children with restrained bashfulness getting gradually together, and the old spring, blessed in the memory of every child that ever dipped up its refreshing water. As we enter the church we seem to see the forms of our venerable fathers and our beloved mothers and brothers and sisters as they gather in the family pew. We reproduce our first early impressions of religious thought and feeling, and lift our hearts toward God and heaven..."

And thus we will this year, 2023, in various ways celebrate our remarkable heritage of 275 years, marking us among the oldest congregations in the United States. The dates we use are these: 1748 marks the founding of the congregation, the original log church which we know was located within the bounds of our cemetery is now all gone; 1790 marks the construction of our stone sanctuary which we are blessed to borrow from the ages to enjoy each week for our worship of Almighty God.

I will try in many ways and at different times this year to offer some hints of the blessing, gratitude and honor I feel at the opportunity to serve this historic congregation. But I have little hope that any words I may say will soar with the majesty and beauty of the words that have already been spoken by all the previous generations, including the esteemed Dr. Paxton.

Recent Correspondence from Mission Organizations/Missionaries



Adams Christian Prison Ministries (ACPM)

December means that ACPM is gearing up for the annual Christmas activities for inmates and correctional officers. Similar to last year, they will be receiving Christmas cards from various churches and organizations to wish them a Merry Christmas. Operation Inmate Socks will be executed providing each inmate two pairs of socks and a Hershey's milk chocolate candy bar. Christmas cookies baked by the members of Herr's Ridge Mennonite Church in Gettysburg will be distributed. The inmates will have an opportunity to receive a blank Christmas card for them to fill out and send to their loved ones. The postage will be covered by ACPM. As a sign of gratitude, ACPM will sponsor a holiday meal for the correctional officers and the staff at ACACC in the beginning of the year.

Volunteer application packets are starting to come in, but many previous volunteers have not yet submitted an application packet. The application packet needs to be completed by all individuals who wish to volunteer inside the prison. When received by Chaplain Perez, the application packets will be forwarded to the security department to conduct a criminal history background check. Once approved, volunteers will receive an invitation to attend the mandatory volunteer security training. Applications are available on the ACPM website and need to be mailed to the chaplaincy department at ACACC, 45 Major Bell Lane, Gettysburg, PA 17325. Please do not email your application since it will contain personal identifiable information.

Fruitbelt Farmworker Christian Ministry

Migrant workers spend around 6-9 months alone in the camps, which affects them and some of the workers have the inclination to feel alone and depressed. After visiting and praying with two workers who were depressed and needed spiritual support, the workers received Jesus as their Savior. We are grateful for every person who is praying for us because this year more than 150 workers received Jesus in their hearts. Gettysburg Soup Kitchen

It is no secret that the increased cost of food and fuel continues to have a significant impact on all of us, and for organizations such as ours and how we maintain our mission: "To provide consistently nourishing meals, at no cost, to the hungry in our community." For our guests, fixed incomes and food stamps are not stretching as far as they once did, and it shows in our numbers. Since May of this year, the number of guests being served by us has increased from a typical day of 45, to as many as 60 a few times each week. Our current data shows that we are on a path to serving 3,000-4,000 more meals this year than in years past. Throughout 2022 guests received 7 meals each week, and pantry items 2-3 days each week. Anyone who is hungry can eat at the Soup Kitchen, no questions asked.

As we wrap up our 31st year of serving the Gettysburg Community, our organization continues to succeed through the kindness and generosity of others. Many youth groups, sports teams and smaller church groups continue to provide gifts of food and supplies; monetary donations generated in response to our annual appeal not only pay for the food and supplies associated with our meal service, but also help pay for utilities, routine site maintenance, and equipment repair or replacement when needed.

Krislund Camp and Conference Center

Children today are more anxious and less happy, spending an average of only four to seven minutes a day in unstructured outdoor play. At Krislund, youth of all backgrounds have the opportunity to learn about our Lord and Savior, disconnect from technology, and be entirely present in the natural world with their peers. These outdoor, faith-based, and interpersonal experiences are crucial for children, especially in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic. Our campers and their parents agree that Krislund's programs are needed now more than ever. In addition to serving residential and day campers in 2022, Krislund also provided adventure programming and Christ-informed hospitality to hundreds of retreat guests from local churches, universities, and special-interest groups.

As Krislund approaches its 60th anniversary in 2023, we hope you will donate to ensure a bright future where all people can continue to encounter God, build relationships, and experience Creation. As we reach this milestone, there is much to be done to ensure that Krislund remains a safe, welcoming place for our campers and guests. SAT-7

What is happening in Iran should be on the hearts and in the prayers of every Christian in America. The uprising of women in this troubled nation has grown even more critical. The government may continue to crush the demonstrators, killing hundreds if not thousands ... or the 43-year-old revolutionary regime could collapse. If freedom prevails, a door of historic opportunity could open for the Gospel. Thankfully, the news media is finally starting to report, women, students, and even men throughout the nation are rebelling ... demonstrating for freedom, demanding release from the oppressive regime. People are being imprisoned and beaten just for standing near a demonstration.

There is a heart-wrenching report of elementary school girls who did not wish to board a school bus. Reportedly, they were beaten mercilessly, and one girl died after falling into a coma. There was a news story of the military firing into a non-violent group of protestors, killing 11, including children. This nationwide movement may end in brutal massacres and mass imprisonment, or some type of long stalemate. We just don't know, but tens of thousands of lives are at stake.

Here are some of the moving messages that have been sent to SAT-7, sometimes at great risk to the senders:

Amir: Without a miracle, I don't see the rulers leaving their throne and hold on Iran. Their answer to the oppressed and defenseless people of Iran is with bullets. Let us unite in prayer for a miracle.

Shahnaz: The people of Iran need your prayers. All these unarmed young people were killed. Pray for Iran to be rescued from evil. Dear believers, may the living Lord Jesus Christ grant you His grace and blessing.

Zina, a teenage girl, wrote: Please pray for the people of Iran. They are killing so many every day. At four o'clock this morning, the agents came and took my uncle away because he had gone out on the streets.

And another said: Many of our young people are being tortured and kept in prison on fabricated charges. I am asking Jesus Christ to save them; and I would like God to help us be freed from these chains. And I would like to build churches in my country for believers to gather in prayer. Amen.

Pray for an end to the violence, that the soldiers will refuse to kill their own people, and that the killing of innocent, peaceful people will cease. Pray that any new government, in God's providence, will be no worse, and that stability and freedom will instead come to this troubled nation. Pray that God will use these difficulties to draw millions to watch SAT-7 PARS, to hear the Gospel, and give their lives to the Prince of Peace, their Lord and Savior.

How God Has Been Restoring & Transforming Us During Sabbatical

These are all a work in progress, but they have already opened us up to greater freedom in Christ. Praise God for skilled & compassionate helpers.

Rejoice with Cheri

- I don't have to make everything right because I am OK in Jesus. (I am growing in awareness that God is the true Rescuer. I can relax and transfer my needs & desires onto Him in faith.)
- I am entitled to my own opinion period. (The implication is that others are entitled to their opinion too period.)
- When I sense sadness or gloom rising up in me, I can stop and explore the message I am telling myself. (The next step is to ask Jesus if there is a lie attached to what I am telling myself, dispute it, and return to joy.)
- Stop looking to empty cisterns for living water. (Jesus and sometimes the Spirit of Jesus living in others satisfy my thirst.)
- I have had a deep and complicated "Anger Iceberg", and it's melting. (Christian counselors, a Spiritual Companion/Director and safe friends have helped.)
- I am gifted with leadership abilities for the building up of the body. (The implication is to stop asking Thomas to speak for me. I am growing in not overwhelming people.)
- Having more margin for stillness, prayer, and "the love exchange with God" greatly reduces my intensity. (The implication is not to run so fast!)

Rejoice with Thomas

- *I am not as strong as I think.* (The implication is that I must take off the mask, recognize my limits, take my weakness, temptation, and burdens to the Lord, and not carry them myself, appearing to be someone I'm not.)
- Let evil get to me. (I need to let myself feel the pain and impact of sin and injustice, to not spiritualize it away or chalk it up to God's sovereignty too quickly. I want it to drive me to my knees to intercede or confess.)
- Hope all things. (I don't want to give up on things that seem hopeless. All things are possible with God, and my hope is in Christ no matter what the outcome.)
- Embrace the WHOLE person I love. (The implication is that nobody is perfect, we're all complex. I may not like a person's flaws or idiosyncrasies, but I am called to accept them and love them the good and the "ugly", and not let those things get to me.)
- Don't idealize my childhood. (I'm realizing important things were missing. This awareness has been painful, but it has opened the door to being honest with myself and the Lord and to learn to walk in freedom.)

We thank God for you who give financially. Your sacrifice made our sabbatical possible. And you who pray. Your struggle is worth it. Don't give up! Even though we stopped for a season to be restored, God NEVER stops! The lost are being found. Disciples are being made. The church is being gathered. And Christ will soon return. As you eagerly wait for Him, may the joy of the Lord be your strength.

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Why The Blue Envelope? Per Capita Offering

The annual giving of all Presbyterians, in the form of our Per Capita offerings, is a "tie that binds" the entire church and benefits every congregation. Per Capita provides the means to strengthen the connections of our work and build lasting relationships to help all Presbyterians share God's love through mission and ministry. Per Capita is the primary source of funding for the Office of the General Assembly and is how Presbyterians mutually and equitably share the costs of coming together to discern the Spirit's leading for the future.

Per Capita amounts are determined by General Assembly nationally, regionally by the Synod and locally by the Presbytery. These monies are used to administer the responsibilities, functions, and mission of each governing body. This year that assessment in our presbytery is \$31.00 per member. Our Session is committed to paying the full assessment for all members on our roll because we treasure our relationship with the wider church, and the congregation benefits when members contribute their share to the whole.

This year the split is as follows:

General Assembly: \$ 9.85 Synod of the Trinity: \$ 2.40 Presbytery of Carlisle: \$18.75 Total: \$31.00

This assessment per member maintains a physical office and staff at all three levels of governance; it provides training and leadership development for our church officers; it provides learning opportunities for pastors and members of congregations and faith formation initiatives for youth through Camp Krislund; it also provides oversight and preparation for those discerning God's call to ministry. These are just a few examples of what the per capita funds do.

But it is not these benefits alone that make us so deeply committed to the per capita offering. It is our shared sense of our Reformed heritage and our Presbyterian identity that compels us to take our relationship with the whole Presbyterian family so seriously.

Thank you to all who have paid and plan to pay your share of the \$31.00 per member. By contributing your portion of per capita, you will free up dollars in our regular budget for the work of our congregation in this community. If you have not contributed to this in the past, we hope you will consider doing so this year. You may remit your per capita contribution by using the special envelope designated "per capita" that came with your offering envelopes, or simply by writing "per capita" on the memo line of your check.

We look forward to your participation in per capita giving, an expression of your commitment to ministry both within our congregation and beyond.
