A Message From Pastor Mark - THE PRESBYTERIANS

Who are the Presbyterians? As we celebrate our 275th anniversary as a congregation this year, I have often been asked about the many, different Protestant denominations which use the name Presbyterian. Indeed, one of the sad hallmarks of the Protestant churches in American history is our propensity for arguing, splitting and dividing. Most of the large, national Protestant denominations have complicated and convoluted histories of divisions and mergers. The Presbyterians are a classic example in American history. From the very start, our churches split, divided and reunited. The Lower Marsh Creek church started in the split between what was then called the New Light and Old Light Presbyterians. There is a helpful Wikipedia page that lists the *Presbyterian denominations in America;* the list is long.

The Lower Marsh Creek congregation belongs to the historic **Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) (PCUSA)** which is, by far, the largest American Presbyterian denomination: Formed in 1789 and now with approximately 8,925 congregations and 1,245,354 members.

The four denominations listed here all broke off, mostly for theological and political reasons, from our mainline PCUSA. The stories around these church splits are terribly conflicted and divisive:

The Orthodox Presbyterian Church (OPC): formed in 1939, and now with approximately 282 congregations and 31,043 members.

The Presbyterian Church in America (PCA): formed in 1973, and now with approximately 1,580 congregations and 383,338 members.

The Evangelical Presbyterian Church (EPC): formed in 1981 and now with approximately 625 churches and 145,210 members.

The Evangelical Covenant Order of Presbyterians (ECO): formed in 2014, and now with approximately 297 congregations and 115,000 members.

Reviewing the history of the Presbyterians in America moves us to prayer and repentance. Maybe during our anniversary year, we should earnestly join Jesus in his heartfelt prayer: "... that all of them may be one ..." (John 17:21)



Linda even included a bit about where several people lived and how far they had to come just to get to worship with fellow believers on a Sunday morning, then added that these same people were the ones who literally brought stones from their fields to build the sanctuary we still worship in. Linda's stories highlighted the wonderful legacy left to us by our forebears and made for a very informative and enjoyable event. Many thanks go to those who worked to prepare our cemetery for the tour, cleaning the headstones so that they could be read and making sure the lawn was mowed, the grass trimmed, and the debris picked up and removed. Every year, the Adams County Public Library System kicks off its summer reading program with Funfest, a vendor and non-profit filled event held at the Gettysburg Area Recreation Park. We had two activities planned for the kids who stopped by, tracing their hands in a chain on block paper (along with our participating adults and their caretaker adults), and a balloon activity. We originally planned to have the kids play a simple form of volleyball with balloons, hitting them to each other and keeping them off the ground. The wind, however, insisted on blowing the balloons out of reach, so we settled for just giving the balloons away, which turned out to be a big hit!







We captured a lot of handprints, illustrating the connectedness of the human race, and displayed the long banner that was created during the announcements in church on Sunday afterward (June 11th). In addition to the Bibles, we also gave away fliers announcing our Diaper Give-Away this August. This event allowed us to reach out into our community in a more pro-active way, and be present at an event that is important to the community — over 4,000 people attended this year! We had many volunteers helping out at our booth—many thanks to all of them for their time and effort, especially to Ms. Shirley and Ms. Joan, who were there the whole time and shepherded tracing hands all afternoon!

The question of why me is very hard to answer indeed. C.S. Lewis, in *Mere Christianity,* has some very interesting theories on this. I have decided that rather than dwell on this question, I am more concerned about this somewhat related question: how should we respond to God's bounty of gifts?

While reading a biography of George H. W. Bush, I came across this Bush family maxim: From those to whom much is provided, much will be expected. (Luke 12:48)

Perhaps the Lord does have expectations as to how we should respond. We can get a good insight into God's aspirations for us simply by studying His Word.

I'm sure we all respond to God's generosity because of our great gratitude for what our Lord and Savior has provided as well as our deep and abiding love for the Lord we have gotten to know.

I believe our best way to respond to God's bounty of blessings is to use the gifts He has provided (our talents, skills, education, experience, etc.) to serve him as well and as long as we possibly can.



Mission Advocate Mailbox - Recent Correspondence

Adams Christian Prison Ministries (ACPM)

The months of May and June are highlighted with the celebration of both Mother's Day and Father's Day. The parents that are incarcerated experience emotions that are created by being separated from their children. It becomes a challenging season for them. The same can be said for the parents who have a loved one incarcerated at the Adams County Adult Correctional Complex. They face difficult times and are asking themselves tough questions. ACPM urges you to continue to pray for inmates and family members during this time of separation.

Mid-year Financials: ACPM is very grateful for the faithfulness of our contributions to this prison ministry. They are funded at 80% and as of May 18th, their expenses have exceeded their income by \$6,851. They are looking forward to seeing the provision of the Lord throughout the rest of the year.

DiscipleMakers (Kevin & Maria Noyes)

As I (Maria) walked to the campfire the last night of Focus (our end of the year conference), I figured I would grab a quick s'more, talk to a few students, and head to bed. I felt exhausted from a combination of pregnancy and bad allergies.

But the Lord had a different plan. I ended up sitting with a bunch of PSU York students and a few of us started talking about what music we like. I still have no idea how the Lord did this but eventually I ended up talking to a student named "Larry" who Kevin has been meeting with about his doubts about his faith. When I asked him when these doubts started, he began to share about going to a private religious school that did not treat his mom (who served as one of the teachers at the school) well. He saw Christians treat other Christians poorly in a variety of ways.

About two hours later, he concluded "But I think the biggest obstacle to me fully trusting Jesus is that I don't want to change my life. I realize that if I fully follow Jesus, I couldn't just live for myself. Things would need to change. And I think deep down that's what holds me back." I sat there amazed. The Spirit was clearly at work to give him that clarity and insight into what is going on in his own heart.

I asked if I could pray for him, and we prayed together there by the campfire. I encouraged Larry to seek the Lord this summer, to spend time with Him and in His Word even when he isn't sure about his faith.

At our first summer Bible study, Larry shared that he has been starting every day by reading his Bible and praying and that he is noticing a difference in his life! Please pray for God to continue to work in Larry's heart, that Larry would be willing to give up everything for Jesus and trust Him fully.

In our last newsletter, we shared how God answered so many prayers in providing another child. Thank you for lifting us before the Lord.

As the weeks passed, we asked Simeon to guess whether it would be a boy or a girl. With absolute certainty Simeon replied, "It's a boy." Well, we recently had another ultrasound and found out the exciting news... to Simeon's surprise we're having a girl! After recovering from the initial shock, Simeon showed excitement for being a big brother to his new little sister. However, Simeon already told us that he expects to still get a little brother eventually.

Mission of Mercy

Mission of Mercy continues to bring much needed health and dental care to those who do not have insurance or who cannot afford their co-pays or deductibles. Here are two personal stories of gratitude:

New Hope for Jai: "I am writing this to express my deepest gratitude as a recipient of your free dental program. ... I must admit that I was a little bit nervous abut the procedure, but Dr. Roz and Dr. Snyder's expertise and compassion eased my anxiety, not to mention Dr. Snyder's *genius trick* in reducing the pain of the anesthesia injection. That was amazing! ... Soon, I will get new dentures and I am excited. This changes my life, brings me hope and a sort of *freedom*. No more hiding behind masks anymore!"

Relief from Chronic Pain: A middle-aged patient came to the medical clinic aided by two supportive friends who literally supported her so she could walk. A recent, terrible car accident resulted in her having chronic pain issues. After a thorough evaluation, it was determined that an injection would help alleviate her pain. The nursing director and the assistant nursing director both held her hands during the procedure. She was so grateful that she turned and hugged them both before being assisted to her vehicle. The following month, although she wasn't totally pain free, the patient told them "I am able to walk and move without crying." Since this time, she has been able to receive care from a pain management clinic, and she said, "I am so grateful. You gave me hope and improved the quality of my life."

Bob and Kristi Rice (South Sudan)

In a recent correspondence with Bob and Kristi, I asked about the situation in Sudan. They responded with a link to their blog post <u>Embracing Hope</u>.

Here are excerpts from their May 5 post: In mid-April, violence erupted in Khartoum and across Sudan as two sides with powerful forces fought against each other. Hopes that the violence would end are diminishing, while more than 500 civilians have been killed and more than 100,000 have fled the country. ...

There are many churches in Khartoum [the capital], even though it is a majority-Muslim country, and they are particularly vulnerable in this conflict. A link to an <u>article</u> that describes some of the impact on the Christian community was provided in the post. The article begins "Sudan's most Christian neighborhood is under attack. Collateral damage amid severe clashes between the army and its previously partnered militia, churches in the Bahri district of the capital Khartoum and surrounding areas have witnessed the worst of the past three weeks of fighting. The Evangelical Presbyterian church suffered a fire as munitions exploded in a nearby market. The Coptic Orthodox church was struck by a rocket. And All Saints Anglican Cathedral was occupied by militant forces. ...

Join us as we celebrate 27 years of ministry! Historically, most people in the Middle East haven't known a single Christian. They hold many misconceptions and are often taught embellished inaccuracies about Christ followers. As in America today, many feel morality is collapsing around them. Their governments are sometimes corrupt, holding onto power ruthlessly. Many feel hopeless, that there is no way out. Worse, there are few, if any churches (which can be illegal) and fewer Bible bookstores. Most people do not possess credit cards and are restricted from ordering Bibles or Christian materials online. For many, SAT-7 is their only source of light in the darkness.

A professor in Tunisia, a man of influence, sent this amazing message to SAT-7: "Peace and grace to you. I was looking for peace and salvation, so I started reading about Christianity. I've grown to love Jesus, but I'm not sure what to do next." A SAT-7 response counselor answered and then explained to him how to have a genuine relationship with God and how to read the Bible. The counselor said, "He is a very responsive person who enjoys life and is enthusiastic about learning." The counselor then guided him through prayer, personal time with God, and Bible readings. The professor told the counselor, "To be honest, these holy verses encompass everything. If someone believes in light, all he needs to do is see it and become completely dependent on it. The only way out of the darkness is through Jesus. He is the only hope. He is all-powerful. How can I continue to live in darkness when He is The Light?"

A male viewer in Iran, shared: "When we accepted Jesus Christ into our hearts, little by little, the darkness, anger, and abuse disappeared. I started to love my wife and children. Keep praying and listen. Through Christ, you get well and see light instead of darkness, love instead of anger. Thank you for these programs. They are teaching us to be better people." Notice that in a country where social protests continue due to the society's suppression of women, this man's attitude and behavior toward his family were transformed by becoming a new creation in Christ.
