ORDINARY TIME

This is a survey: Are you familiar with the seasons of the Church year? Can you name them? When did you first become aware of the seasons of the Church year and where? Do you consider the flow and meaning of the seasons of the Church year to be meaningful to you?

I pondered these questions as we celebrated the Day of Pentecost again on May 19th. The Day of Pentecost marks the end of the season of Easter, and is remembered as the day when the Holy Spirit was given to the first believers. Pentecost also marks a decided turn in our attention to the seasons of the Church year. After the Day of Pentecost in the church, the flow of the seasons of the Church year falls into the background. We enter this very long period in the Church year, from Pentecost to the start of Advent, which is named Ordinary Time.

The seasons of the Church are organized around the greatest events in the life of Jesus: Christmas and Easter. Both Christmas and Easter have a season set apart for preparation and anticipation: Advent for four weeks before Christmas; Lent for six weeks before Easter. Both Christmas and Easter are a specific day and a season. The day of Christmas is always December 25 and its season includes the twelve days of Christmas. Easter is always on a Sunday and the date changes depending on the full moon in Springtime. The season of Easter includes the fifty days after Easter, ending with the Day of Pentecost.

I find it meaningful to observe the seasons of the Church year:

The Church year offers a different perspective on time. The seasons of the church year are different from our ordinary obsession with the calendar of days, months, and years. It is important to adopt a different perspective on things.

The Church year creates a schedule of events from which we can follow and understand the life of Jesus. Thus, I believe, the seasons of the Church year are an important teaching tool about Jesus. The seasons of the Church year help us read the Bible.

The seasons of Advent and Lent are particularly meaningful to me. It is helpful to have a defined time set apart to focus specifically on preparing ourselves, deeper spiritual devotion, and creating specific, daily disciplines.

And the long season of Ordinary Time, spanning six months of the calendar year, has its own deep meaning and purpose. During these days we may allow our Christian faith to become an essential and influential aspect of every day. Ordinary Time without any feast days, holidays or focused celebrations calls us to invite the Christian belief deep into the everyday and ordinary fabric of our lives.

God's Outlaw, The Story of William Tyndale

William Tyndale (sometimes spelled Tynsdale), 1494 – 1536, was an English scholar and gifted linguist who became a leading figure in the Protestant Reformation. He was the first person to translate the Bible into English directly from Hebrew and Greek texts. His was the first English translation to take advantage of the printing press, allowing for wide distribution throughout England.

During this time period, the Roman Catholic Church was executing (burning at the stake) persons caught with an English translation. Tyndale was declared a heretic by the Catholic Church. He translated and printed his translations in Germany and Belgium while changing locations to avoid capture by the Catholics.

In 1535, Tyndale was arrested and jailed in Brussels for over a year. In 1536 he was convicted of heresy and executed by strangulation, after which his body was burned at the stake. His dying prayer that the King of England's eyes would be opened, was fulfilled two years later with Henry VIII's authorization of the Great Bible for the Church of England, which was largely Tyndale's translation.

The story of this courageous Christian martyr is portrayed in the movie <u>God's Outlaw</u>. I have a DVD of this movie, and I would be happy to lend it to anyone in our church.

Missions like Tyndale's, advancing the Great Commission, (Matthew 28: 17-20), are as vital today. Nearly 500 years later, people are still being executed for possessing a Bible. Take solace in the fact that our little church is supporting missions (SAT-7, for one, and Gideons- though in a different way) accomplishing exactly the same thing that Tyndale did: getting translated Bibles into the hands of Christ-seekers in the Middle East, North Africa, and Europe. 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

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

In Memory of Rex

Be Thou My Vision is one of my favorite hymns. The second line of the hymn: "*Thou my best thought by day or by night, waking or sleeping Thy presence my light*", has always been of specific interest to me.

What exactly does my vision and my light mean? Perhaps one's personal experiences would determine what this means for each person.

For example: These were truly remarkable events. Our good friend and dear departed brother in Christ, Rex Craven shared this experience with Pastor Mark and a few church members.

When Rex was anxious about a problem, sometimes, when asleep at night, he would find the solution to his problem. What's so remarkable is how the answer came to him.

During his dreams, a Bible passage would appear to him, not the text, but the name of the book, the chapter number and the verse number. When Rex awoke, he would immediately write this down. The verse was always relevant to his problem, and the verse always had the solution. (Rex kept a record of all of these events.) God was obviously present in Rex's mind, and God's presence was Rex's light that allowed God's, and thereby Rex's, vision to see the Bible verse that would solve his problem.

As the hymn says, "Be thou my vision" and "Thy presence my light."

World Cruise at Knollwood

Knollwood, in Washington, DC, was established by Mamie Eisenhower for military widows 50 years ago and only about a decade ago admitted men as well. It is well regarded as a continuing care community and is currently the home for 325 residents. It was privileged to host Pastor Dale Williams, a former Navy chaplain, and his wife Lenorah on May 14 so they could share pictures and memories of their latest round-the-world-voyage during which Dale served as Protestant cruise chaplain for the first month. He shared with the audience his reason for accepting such a position - that cruising out in the ocean was a "spiritual experience" as he could sense God's presence there, particularly as he read Psalm 107 when "God spoke and stirred up a tempest but then stilled the storm to a whisper," so those who are ever on the ocean might know God's might. Dale took his first round-theworld-cruise in 1972 on board a U.S. Navy Destroyer. He was ordained in 1978 and spent from 1971-1997 serving in the Navy – first as a Line Officer, and then as a Chaplain. During his Knollwood presentation, he also played the guitar and had the audience sing along with him "He's Got The Whole World in His Hands." He then paid tribute to his wife, Lenorah, acknowledging that "being a military spouse is the toughest job in the military." They celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary during that voyage as well. Later in the year, he served as Protestant Chaplain on another cruise, this time around Africa. In 2023 they spent over 210 days at sea. But his lecture focused on his world cruise of 128 days (4 1/2 months) to 59 ports. They started in Ft. Lauderdale on a Holland America line, going through the Panama Canal with stops in Cape Town, Namibia, Angola, Senegal, Gambia, the Canary Islands, Morocco, Tangier, Spain, Portugal, England, Belgium, the Netherlands, Amsterdam, Denmark, Norway, Scotland, Ireland, and the Azores. He even shared stories and pictures of their safari in South Africa and their time in Cape Town. The audience learned that America's Smithsonian Institution has a research facility in Panama as well. Dale's duties on board included holding daily seaday devotions with 30-40 guests, as well as Sunday Interdenominational worship. He also served alongside a Catholic priest and a rabbi and celebrated our National Day of Prayer in an Inter-faith service on May 2, certainly a memorable occasion. Knollwood thanked him for his talk by offering the residents cake and refreshments and presenting Dale with a satin pillowcase from 1941 that a sailor then had sent home to a family member embossed with the Navy seal. Dale will return June 17 to speak about his 73 day cruise around Africa. Before leaving he was extended an invitation to return to lead worship in our beautiful chapel some day. This Presbyterian pastor from Gettysburg, PA who in addition to offering educational and inspirational sermons, is a YWCA lifeguard, loves to swim and snorkel, and is so committed to life at sea that his plans are to be buried there as well. The Navy is proud of this chaplain and we thank Dale for his time and contribution to our Knollwood activities program. (Kathy Megyeri)



DO YOU KNOW ?

A Personal Essay

I have had to miss services at LMCPC for the past two months to accompany my husband to his intensive PT therapy program for Parkinson's in Sarasota, Fl. Nothing could have prepared me to regularly view the suffering of those plagued with this disease. While here, we recognized April 11 which was World Parkinson's Day founded in 2005 to raise awareness, shed light on this condition, and advocate for research. Their global symbol is the red tulip. Parkinson's affects people around the world with China having the most cases, but over 1 million in the US alone cope with its effects. With our aging population, more people are experiencing it, and this month alone, 90,000 will be diagnosed. Researchers believe it results from a combination of genetic and environmental factors that cause the central nervous system to affect one's motor system to degenerate over time. Symptoms include tremors, movement and balance difficulties, limb rigidity, and delayed muscle action but the most disabling symptoms are fatigue, tremors and slower physical movement. The best way to live with it are regular exercise, eating a healthy diet, staying hydrated, getting enough sleep and being treated with medication. As we prepare now to leave FL and return to the DC area to contemplate deep brain stimulation which many claim reduces the tremors associated with Parkinson's, I can truly share what I've most missed about time away from LMCPC that makes me appreciate it so much more. So many of the churches I've attended here have didactic pastors, many of whom believe that if they scream their sermons, surely we will become more convinced of their messages. It's then I miss Pastor Mark's pleas for a quiet time of reflection to contemplate God's message of acceptance and love. Secondly, I've missed Linda Clark's music and of course the history of many of the hymns we sing, not to mention the groups who make many of those songs come to life during their Sunday performances. Thirdly, I miss seeing many of Cathy Michaliga's thematically created wall banners and vestments worn by Pastor Mark. But most of all, I miss the smiles, comments and questions from fellow parishioners before and after services that are uplifting, comforting, and so friendly that they bring me a sense of community within the church. So what keeps me most connected when I am away? Thanks to the church newsletter, I still feel in touch with people, mission news and church events and truly look forward to regularly returning to worship services. One doesn't realize what a gem LMCPC is until one is away for awhile but I know others feel the same and so we thank the Lord regularly for the treasure that LMCPC truly is. Mission of Mercy

Mission of Mercy marked another milestone in its 30-year history last fall when donors, staff and volunteers celebrated the launch of the organization's newest mobile medical vehicle. With additional space for the pharmacy and Dr. Sullivan's office, the new mobile vehicle meets the expanding needs of Mission of Mercy.

Mission of Mercy operates one medical and one dental unit, with each unit visiting the same sites together and working in tandem. The dental program now has a part-time volunteer oral surgeon working on the unit who can treat many complex patient cases, especially the extraction of wisdom teeth.

Linda Ryan, Executive Director of Mission of Mercy, has announced her retirement effective July 1 of this year. Jennifer White, who has been with the organization for 27 years, will assume the position.

SAT-7's Audience Relations Team regularly interact with and disciple viewers off-air. Below, is one viewer's journey from despair to dependence on Christ, with guidance from a Counselor. This is fruit from your partnership!

<u>Audience relations team:</u> Hannah, a 26-year-old woman from Sudan with a different background, approached us for help with the difficulties she experiences in her everyday life. She claims that the untimely loss of her 16-year-old niece has caused her to go through the most difficult and saddest period of her life. We thanked her for be-lieving in us and talking with us.

We asked her to briefly explain the matter so that we could assist her. She told us that she does not have children and that she visited Sudan a while ago. Upon her return to Egypt, her niece accompanied her, as she and her husband reside there. However, just a few days after their arrival, the niece fell ill, causing her husband to become angry and believe she was faking illness, possibly due to her dissatisfaction with the situation in Egypt or the transfer. They transferred her to the hospital and kept her there until two days later, when they called us to announce the girl's passing.

The shock was traumatic for Hannah, who wished for death and wanted to end her own life because she believed she was responsible for her niece's death. She felt deeply sorry for what had transpired. And she slipped into the trap of regret and self-blame. Worse, due to the war in Sudan, Hannah was unable to contact the girl's family to inform them of her death.

We sympathized with her and consoled her over the death of her niece. We told her not to blame herself, because only God knows why he allowed that girl to come to Egypt to escape the war and die there.

After conversing with and comforting her, we discussed the topic of God alone soothing the human soul, allowing life's hardships to put us to the test. We knew she accepted Christ before she and her husband married, that they came from a different background, and that her husband is still a Christian today; but she drifted away from Christ.

After discussing this and other topics, such as forgiveness and God's unconditional love, as well as the fact that there is no salvation apart from Christ, she began to ask questions, indicating a thirst for the truth.

Hannah: How did God abandon me and not protect me from myself when I chose to stay away from Him?

<u>Audience relations team:</u> We emphasized to her that God does not tempt or force anyone to do anything. On the contrary, His will is for everyone to be saved and come to know the truth. We advised her to remain patient as she felt the absence of her niece and reminded her of God's goodness. We felt her longing and need for comfort, as well as someone telling her that salvation is only through Christ.

After a lengthy talk, she wondered how she could go on with her life despite everything that was going on around her. We described how she might repent and return to God, and we asked whether she was ready. So she agreed and joined us in praying the prayer of repentance and salvation, as well as declaring Christ to be the Savior of her life. We urged her to put everything in God's hands. She thanked us for our assistance and attention and asked to begin the follow-up process. Glory to Jesus!

We contacted her again, gave her a discipleship course, and discussed the new nature of Christ.

<u>Hannah:</u> I would not lie to you. How many days do I talk to God by myself, saying, "Lord, I am confident in your justice?" But I need your support, even if it's just a thought in my heart. You heard me; there was no response.

Audience relations team: We replied to her and prayed with her, and she asked questions, which we answered.

<u>Hannah:</u> My conscience says that I constantly make mistakes, whether they are purposeful or unintentional. How can I get rid of this feeling? I stood in front of our Lord and confessed, but I did not feel comfortable.

<u>Audience relations team</u>: We responded to her. Then we discussed prayer and daily time with the Lord, and we shared a portion with her.

Hannah: I realized that the past period had no protection for me because I was far from the Lord.

<u>Audience relations team</u>: We discussed the Word of God and how to concentrate on it. We also discussed the new creation and the goodness of God.

<u>Hannah:</u> In times of adversity, people often attribute it to God. But according to what I gathered from the passages, not everything is from God.

Audience relations team: So we answered her and explained who the tempter was.

<u>Hannah</u>: I really needed this verse. Thank the Lord for all his blessings. Thank you very much. Thank goodness I shared all of this with you. Today's verses are nice and reassuring for my heart.

Audience relations team: Finally, she told us that she joined a group to study God's Word daily.

[Brian told me that the Audience Relations team conducted more than103,000 one-to-one discipleship conversations with viewers last year.]

Mission Co-Worker Ryan White Visits LMC

Rev. Ryan White, one of the Presbyterian Church (USA) mission co-workers supported by LMC's Mission Opportunities and Missions (MOM) budget, visited the church on May 16 to discuss his work and that of the greater community of Christian churches in Western and Southern Europe.

Along with his wife, Alethia, Ryan has been in the mission

field for more than 10 years and is nearing the end of a year back in the U.S. The couple has been working with Iranian refugees in partnership with the Iranian Presbyterian Church of Berlin, Germany, providing pastoral care and collaborating with other Christian organizations and churches that serve Iranian refugees. However, he recently has taken the position of Co-Regional Liaison for Northern and Continued on the next page

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Central Europe (they will continue to be involved with the Iranian church).

He devoted much of his presentation at LMC explaining what this new job entails.

Ryan showed LMC members a map of Europe with the Presbyterian and other churches and organizations with which he works and covered the various issues they are addressing, including congregational vitality, racism, poverty, militarism, climate change, gender & sexual justice, and migration.



Most of the work is grouped under the Biblical justification of Matthew 25, which includes, "For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me."

The Whites, including their daughters Ariella and Laila, will continue to live in Berlin.

The logistics of Ryan's visit were a bit unusual. Ryan, Alethia, and their two daughters, have been staying in Richmond, Va., with Alethia's mother, and Ryan came to LMC by bicycle, a two-day trip with an overnight stop in Washington, D.C., on the way. He stayed with Dale and Len Williams after dinner on the 16th, and the next morning Dale gave him a brief tour of the battlefields before seeing him on his way. His planned stops after leaving Gettysburg were State College, Waverly, Canandaigua, Utica, and finally Poughkeepsie (an overall one-way trip of 850 miles!). From Poughkeepsie, on May 24 he will take the train back to Richmond.


