From the Pastor


The New Old Rugged Cross

After being away from the church for a week, I noticed it immediately when I drove into our parking lot on Monday morning. I have been teasing people who have been around here at the church but have NOT noticed our new Cross. It is a perfect addition to our Church property. It is stout and strong. Without words, it proclaims a message that is bold, clear and loud. It identifies us and is the authority over this property. It is a sign proclaiming who we are. It is a symbol of all that we believe and all that we have received. It perfectly matches the old stones of our sanctuary with a quiet message that says loud and clear, "We will be here. We will endure. Generations will come, and generations will pass away, but the Cross of Christ will stand." It is not ostentatious or proud; it is not arrogant or rude. It is quiet, and almost humble. Yes, although it is huge, it is very easy to miss, walk past, and neglect. But now it stands; and when I ponder it I am moved to prayer. With the stone walls of our sanctuary, I wonder how long it will stand there, straight and tall, guiet and true.

#### Transitional Ministry Team news:

Three years ago, in March Pastor Mark began his ministry here at Lower Marsh Creek. At that time Session hired him for a two-year period to fill our empty pastoral position as our transitional pastor. It was our intention at the end of two years to ask Carlisle Presbytery for an exception to the Book of Order to officially call Pastor Mark and install him as our permanent pastor giving you, the congregation, a voice, and a vote in "officially" choosing Mark. But COVID changed our plans. Fast forward to today and we would like to start that process towards installation.

Towards that end goal, the Presbytery has recommended that we conduct a congregation wide survey to hear from you about Marks ministry AND to learn how you folks view LMC as it is today and more importantly where you would like to see LMC go in the near future.

The Session has engaged Holy Cow Consulting to help with the survey. Yep that's right, there is a company called Holy Cow that uses a survey called CAT which stands for Congregational Assessment Tool to query you by means of an online survey. That survey, otherwise known as a CAT scan, will help us a lot to understand how you see Mark's ministry and where does LMC head in the future.

The survey will open November 7. We will email you a link to participate. For those who need help with the online part, we will have people in our congregation ready to sit down beside you to help with filling it out. For those who prefer a paper copy, we will have that available too. More information will follow on these particulars.

Remember, my Holy Cow needs you to fill the survey pail up with your responses, it is important! Our goal is at least 80% participation! Let's show the Presbytery that LMC is alive, vibrant, and ready to do God's work! ## **Operation Christmas Child National Collection Week** November 15-22 Time to start shopping for your shoeboxes!

Operation Christmas Child is a project of Samaritan's Purse, an international relief organization. Their mission is to provide local partners around the world with shoeboxes filled with small toys, hygiene items, and school supplies and deliver them to children in need around the world, as a means of reaching out to children in their own communities with the Good News of Jesus Christ.

There are three options for the project this year:

1. Pack your shoebox yourself and return it to the church during National Collection Week.

2. Follow Your Box: Adhesive labels are available to attach to your shoebox. They contain a QR Code, which you scan with your smartphone camera. This activates your label and you can discover the destination of your shoebox. "Don't have a smartphone?" The label also contains a nine-digit code that you can enter on Samaritan's Purse website to follow your box: samaritanspurse.org/activate.

3. Build a Box Online: Go to https://www.samaritanspurse.org/operation-christmas-child/ buildonline/

OR Google: Samaritanspurse.org, select "What We Do," select "Operation Christmas Child," and select "Build a Shoebox Online."

You select items to fill your box. The donation for this service is \$25. Many shoebox gifts built online can be delivered to parts of the world where access to the Gospel is restricted or where strict customs regulations require a specially packed shoebox.

Many of you have donated to Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) for Haiti, Tennessee, and Hurricane Ida disaster relief. As of Sunday, October 10, your donations had reached a total of \$3,585, however \$150 more has been received since then bringing the total to \$3,735. I offer you my sincerest thanks and God's continued blessings for your commitment to this cause!

In addition to your donations, the Mission Committee approved a donation of \$9,000 to PDA (\$6,350 from the Mission Endowment Fund and \$2,650 from the Mission Organization/Missionaries (MOM) budget, bringing the total donation to \$12,735. Three checks, each in the amount of \$4,195 and earmarked for Haiti, Tennessee, and Ida, have already been mailed to PDA, and three more will be mailed in the near future (\$50 each). — Sandy Buhrman

ACPM continues to distribute Bibles, devotional books, Christian and Catholic books, and other religious items. ACPM has partnered with the Adams County Community Foundation "Giving Spree." ACPM has had the opportunity to schedule "non-contact" clergy visits with some of the local ministers and priests. Inmates request the visit through Chaplain Perez who then makes the necessary arrangements.

#### Thomas and Cheri Henry



Thomas and Cheri closed shop in Turkey at the end of July and flew to Europe to begin six weeks of much anticipated vacation, recovery, and debriefing, with minimal social media. They found that the inner fatigue of the past season and the push of energy at the end to get out of Turkey revealed itself the very first night in Europe in the form of exhaustion, but they were eventually able to enjoy some hiking, reading and just being together. The last week they attended LeRucher's debriefing center in France where skilled

workers helped them unpack the challenging last several years of serving in Turkey and working with a team. They ask for prayers for the ongoing work of restoring the foundation and deepening their roots. On the health front, Thomas returned to Istanbul for ongoing skin cancer treatment and while there, doctors discovered four herniated disks. Doctors say it should reverse itself in a few weeks with proper treatment. They ask for prayers for the daily grind of recovery - exercise, reduction in pain, and healing. The week after their newsletter was written, Thomas and Cheri were returning to Lexington, KY, their home base, where they plan to purchase a home they can return to once they retire from the field. They hope, Lord willing, to have many more years of full-time ministry but are beginning to think about the day they will predominantly live in Kentucky. They say, for the sake of clarity: "We have left Turkey and are starting a sabbatical year of restoration in KY. After this furlough, we plan to return to overseas ministry, although for now we do not know where. Please continue to send pledges and donations to Christar.org."

#### SAT-7

Dr. Rex Rogers, President of SAT-7 USA reports that the situation for Afghan Christians is dire. The Taliban is actively seeking out Afghan brothers and sisters in Christ - many who recently came to faith through the broadcasts of SAT-7, whom they regard as "apostates" or anyone who helped the West, and they are targeting them for execution. Afghan Christians are telling counselors that SAT-7 programs are their only remaining source of hope, prayer, and help. House churches are disbanding, people are burying books and hiding Bibles. SAT-7 is actively raising funds that will allow SAT-7 to produce more programming especially for desperate Afghans. Counselors are expecting an increase in contacts from non-Christian seekers throughout the Middle-East, who are abandoning their beliefs, searching for a God who cares and a faith that gives them hope and peace, responding to the love they see on SAT-7.

# From the Clerk's Desk

The Session held their regular meeting on October 18, 2021 at 7:00 PM in the fellowship hall with Rev. Mark Englund-Krieger serving as moderator. Here are highlights from that meeting:

- Membership as of 10/16/2021: Active Members (AM = CA): 170, Baptized Members (BM = FP): 61 and Family Members: 53.
- The Interpretation and Stewardship Team continues to monitor all church finances. Please see the monthly report in this issue for September on page 15. Because of your continued generosity and financial support the church's financial health is excellent! Thank You!!
- Approved the following events and business items:
  - Saturday, November 13: The Couple's Study Group will have a catered Thanksgiving meal served in the fellowship hall.
  - ♦ Friday, December 24: Christmas Eve services scheduled for 7:00 PM and 9:00 PM.
  - That a Congregational Assessment Tool (CAT) survey be conducted by the Holy Cow Consulting Co. from November 7 through November 27. The purpose of this survey is twofold: to gather input from the congregation regarding Pastor Mark's ministry at LMC and to plan for the future of our church.
  - The reappointment of the Transition Ministry Team composed of Doyle Waybright, chair; Denise Lockwood, Beverly Benner, Isaac & Nicole Bucher, and Carlos Wampler.
  - That the Transition Ministry Team, on behalf of the Session, move ahead to create a Transition Ministry Team Report to file for an exception with the Presbytery of Carlisle to call Pastor Mark Englund-Krieger as the full-time, installed Pastor at Lower Marsh Creek Presbyterian Church.
  - That the cost of \$1,550.00 for new signage on the church campus be taken from the Gifts & Memorials Fund. The signs will be used to identify the sanctuary, office, and fellowship hall. In addition, a welcome sign will be placed at both entrances to the property.
