A Message from Pastor Mark



What's that bird?

I preached a sermon on the Parable of the Mustard Seed. This parable ends with a glorious vision of the future day when the tiny mustard, "the smallest of seeds" will grow up to become "the largest of garden plants and becomes a tree, so that the birds come and perch in its branches." The parable of the mustard seed is included in the Gospel of Matthew's collection of parables in chapter 13. In the sermon I preached I talked about birds. I mentioned my enjoyment of a new app I have installed on my iPhone called the Merlin ID bird identification app. This remarkable app is a product of the Cornell University Lab of Ornithology, and has become very popular. This was several weeks ago, and the only bird call I identified at my house was the Carolina Wren, a bird that does not migrate for the winter. This week on the short walk from our house to our garage, early in the morning, I heard a wonderful cacophony of birds singing. Spring has arrived! I pulled out my iPhone and turned on the listening feature in the Merlin ID app. The app is remarkable in its accuracy and quickness. Almost immediately a list of birds came up on my phone indicating that their call was heard and identified: Carolina Wren, American Robin, Blue Jay, Mourning Dove, and Downy Woodpecker. Wow! What a chorus of springtime beauty, and for me, a gift of grace and peace early in the morning.

Of course, I walk the short trip to my garage several times a day and countless times each week. And most of the time I am focused and fast. I have places to go and things to do, and I will not pay any attention to the birds and their beautiful singing. This was another lesson for me; a lesson I have heard often and neglected more often. Pay attention, slow down, look and listen, open your eyes, open your ears, open your heart, be present in the moment, pay attention.

The most thoughtful and insightful definition of prayer for me is this: Prayer is paying attention to the presence of God. This is very difficult; this is very simple.

Please read Psalm 46; a wonderful word that calls us to prayer and calls us to pay attention. Psalm 46 is about the crisis and all the stress in our lives: fear, waters roaring and foaming, mountains quaking, nations in uproar, kingdoms falling, desolations, wars, spears and chariots. And then verse 10: "Be still, and know that I am God." There it is. That is the verse we need; that is the spiritual practice we need; that is the life we need. "Be still, and know that I am God." It is truly all about paying attention in the midst of chaos and desolation. There is beauty, grace and love all around . . .

NATIONAL DAY OF PRAYER

National Theme: "Now may the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that you will abound in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit." Romans 15:13

The National Day of Prayer is a vital part of our heritage. In 1808 Thomas Jefferson wrote: "Fasting and prayer are religious exercises; the enjoining them an act of discipline. Every religious society has a right to determine for itself the time for these exercises, and the objects proper for them, according to their own particular tenets, and right can never be safer than in the hands, where the Constitution has deposited it."

Since that first call to prayer in 1775, when the Continental Congress asked the colonies to pray for wisdom in forming a nation, the call to prayer has continued through our history, including President Lincoln's proclamation of a day of "humiliation, fasting, and prayer" in 1863. In 1952, a joint resolution by congress, signed by President Truman, declared an annual national day of prayer. In 1988, the law was amended and signed by President Reagan, permanently setting the day as the first Thursday of every May. Each year, the president signs a proclamation, encouraging all Americans to pray on this day. Last year, all 50 state governors plus the governors of several U.S. territories signed similar proclamations.

<u>Thursday May 1, 2025 at 5:00 pm</u> - Our Day of Prayer service will be a brief time of Scripture and prayer outside in the front yard of our church, next to the Cross. A light picnic supper will be served immediately after our service.


Praise God! He is risen!

April Was Parkinson's Awareness Month

Did you know?

- ~Almost 90,000 people are diagnosed each year.
- ~It is defined as a progressive neurodegenerative disorder that affects movement, balance and coordination caused by the loss of dopamine-producing nerve cells in the brain, so there is currently no known cure.
- ~Scientists believe the causes are a combination of genetic and environmental factors.
- ~People with Parkinson's usually experience movement problems and non-movement difficulties such as loss of smell, apathy, anxiety, depression and REM sleep behavior issues which can occur years before diagnosis.
- ~Symptoms can be managed with medication, exercise, and in some cases, surgery.
- ~Early-onset Parkinson's occurs in people younger than 50 years of age.

Thanks to high profile Parkinson's patients like Jeff Cook from the singing group Alabama and football star Brent Favre, a spotlight is being shone on this disease

My own husband is coping with the debilitating effects of Parkinson's and my attendance at LMCPC has become sporadic. A couple of years ago, we first noticed hand tremors, especially in cold weather as he served on Ski Liberty's Ski Patrol for 42 years. Now, full-scale fatigue is occurring, his energy level has dramatically decreased, his motor skills like handwriting are poor, his speech has slowed, he has difficulty walking, and he takes frequent naps. He uses his ski poles for balance and regularly sees a specialist to monitor his medications.

With the prayers from the congregation, check-ins from friends, and reading the church's newsletter each month, I feel supported. Most of all, I garner continued strength to be a cheerful, helpful caregiver by memorizing the Bible verse recommended in the April Easter message from Pastor Mark -

"Be joyful in hope, patient in affliction and faithful in prayer." Romans 12:12,

I am writing this note to particularly thank the congregation of LMCPC and to ask church members to increase their awareness of this malady and pray for all those who suffer its debilitating effects.

From an April 10 SAT-7 USA email

Christian women living in Iran face a dilemma in deciding how to dress. Though they are free in Christ, the country mandates women to cover their heads. Those who fail to do so may face arrest, beatings, and fines. An Iranian woman named Elika* sent a message to SAT-7's Persian channel to share her perspective.

Elika's message spoke to the seriousness of the situation. "Now, anyone on the street – or anywhere – who is not wearing proper hijab can be photographed by an informant. That photo can then be sent to the police..."

As a Christian, she emphasizes that "God looks at the heart and whether to wear hijab or not is a heart choice." And because of this, she chooses to comply with the law.

"I am obedient to the government, as long as my faith is not affected," she says. "I pray that God will give me His strength so that if I am ever told by this government to deny my God, I would have the courage to stand and endure, even under pressure and torture."

One of Elika's greatest challenges is a lack of fellowship with other believers. But, she emphasizes the importance of SAT-7. "You are here, and you support us. I really thank you, and I am grateful for you, my dear family."

Elika concludes, "We often pray to have the opportunity to stand up and serve Him. And if we are in Iran, we will stand for our faith and for God."

Relentless Pursuit

In Bandéo, the locals hold great attachment to traditional beliefs – primarily animism, a belief that there's a spiritual essence in objects, places, and animals.

Young Life club began in Bandéo in late 2020. The first club launched with six leaders and 38 teenagers in attendance. Fourteen accepted Christ that day. One of them was Bertin. His father disliked Young Life because it was a Christian organization. He would send Bertin far away on an errand if he noticed club was happening. Still, Bertin did all he could to be there, even if just for the ending, and his love for Jesus grew.

Bertin asked his father to let him choose who he wanted to worship, and his father decided to allow it. Unhappy with this decision, his brothers planned to beat him. Bertin told Bruno, his Young Life leader, who warned the brothers he would involve the police if they touched Bertin. The brothers then left Bertin alone to worship as he chooses.

Many other teens want to attend Young Life and follow Jesus, but their parents and superstitious beliefs hold them back. Nevertheless, leaders relentlessly pursue teenagers with the good news as they courageously go into dark places to give hope to the next generation.


MESSAGES FROM OUR MISSIONARIES

A New Day

Spring 2025 Message from Ryan and Alethia White

Dear friends and supporters,

We are writing to thank you for all the ways you have supported us over the years and to inform you of some internal changes that the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) is undergoing, which will affect our work. You may have read about changes to World Mission within the Interim Unified Agency (IUA), but we wanted to take a moment to send a personal message.



We are very much going to miss the partnerships and relationships we have built over the years and the experiences and learning we have been able to share with you. We first came to serve with World Mission, working with a Persian-speaking migrant community in Berlin and, in 2021, shifted to connecting with partners throughout Europe. Through this, we have heard stories of the challenges faced by people seeking a new life, particularly when viewed as outsiders. And we have witnessed how decisions made in the U.S. affect communities throughout the world. We have also seen and heard how faith communities are addressing local and global justice issues and are committing to advocating for marginalized communities as modeled by Jesus.

One of our favorite memories was the annual celebration of Norouz, the New Year celebrated on the Spring Equinox by Persian, Kurdish and other communities. Norouz means "New Day," and one of the ways of celebrating begins the week before, gathering with friends and jumping over fires as a symbol of burning away the bad of the previous year to welcome, with newness, the upcoming year. As our work draws to a close a few days following Norouz, we look forward with anticipation for what lies ahead while also making space for what is ending.

Even though we will not continue working with the IUA, ecumenical cooperation and partnerships with partners will continue. The new model for global engagement will have staff serving as global ecumenical liaisons. More information about the new model and these positions will be shared by the IUA.

Our current plan is to remain in Berlin through the end of the school year in late July and then return to Richmond, Virginia, where we spent the 2023/24 school year. We are grateful for the time and compensation we have been given to make this transition.

After living outside of the U.S. for much of the last decade, this will indeed be a significant transition for our family as we say goodbye to friends and to Berlin, a place that has become home. At the same time, we look forward to being closer to family and friends in the U.S. who have been missed.

Please continue praying for the partners we have had the privilege to connect with and seek opportunities in your communities, congregations and presbyteries to continue engagement on issues of importance and learning from one another.

Christian and Rayan Weaner/TeachBeyond

Christian and Rayan were back from the states about a week when they headed out for training in South Africa. "There, we were able to meet more of our fellow TeachBeyonders and the TeachBeyond Africa leadership team. We also learned so much about how to be more self-aware and intentional with safety protocols so that we can continue to be good stewards of the roles God has called us to here in Senegal."



"In late January, we traveled across the continent to the beautiful country of South Africa for a Field Safety Training that is required for all TeachBeyond Africa members."





"Along the way, we also stopped in the picturesque coastal city of Cape Town and got to go on a real African safari in Pilanesberg National Park outside of Johannesburg."

"As soon as we arrived back in Dakar after our training, our weeks have been filled with spirit dress up days, softball tournaments, musical rehearsals, field service trips, and more!"

"Though our eyelids may feel heavy, our hearts are so full. When we first began the process of moving to West Africa a year ago, we could not believe our eyes at how the Lord opened doors and displayed His perfect provision through so many of you. In fact, there are many words of encouragement from different brothers and sisters and moments of supernatural provision that we journaled about throughout that time, and we often look to them even now when we are tired or need a reminder of the Lord's faithfulness."

"The month of March in particular has been an interesting one as the majority of Senegal has been observing Ramadan. Ramadan is the ninth month of the Islamic lunar calendar. During this time, Muslims spend the day fasting and praying during the call to prayer in the morning, afternoon, and evening. While Ramadan has been Continued on the next page . . .

something we have been aware of and learned about in the past, experiencing it now daily by watching our neighbors and friends observe has been an eye-opening experience. It is a time that has opened the door to a lot of beneficial conversations as we and many of our coworkers and missionary families are often asked daily if we too fast and reflect."

"Last month, we traveled with our ninth grade students for their Field Service Experience (FSE), where we spent a long weekend serving in various locations. Rayan's group went to the village of Ngaparou and did painting and maintenance work on the grounds of a camp owned by one of the mission organizations that operates here in Senegal. Christian's team headed to a small village called Sanghe where the students helped with a faith-based soccer academy and played several exhibition games with the youth teams. This was a fun way to get to know our DA students better and serve alongside them."





"Lastly, many times over this semester, we have been consistently reminded that we can do nothing apart from Christ. In our new culture here, there are days when we feel like we are finally 'getting it' and others where we can't even order our lunch correctly, and on those days, time and time again, the Lord has reminded us that it is in our weakness that He makes us strong."

"A prayer that we read recently said:"

Oh Lord, This life has stripped away my confidence, competence, and control, and I feel exposed and weak. It's uncomfortable and vulnerable and I find myself resisting the Way of Weakness You seem to be inviting me into. Forgive me, God, when my pride causes me to prefer my self-sufficiency over surrender. Cross-cultural life has challenged all I know (or thought I knew, at least) and the reality is disorienting. I prefer proficiency, but you're calling me to humility. Show me how my weakness makes space for Your strength, and that my surrender to You doesn't make me helpless but held.

Caring for Those Who Care for the World Taken from Thomas & Cheri Henry's April 19 Prayer Letter

Thomas and Cheri are based in Staffordshire, England, and are providing development and care for international workers through One Another Ministries.

KENYA

A couple we led through a marriage intensive in March reminds us of the complexities of marriage. Relationships are complicated, especially marriage. Everyone is looking for others who are looking for them - for aloneness to be re-

moved, to belong. Each person comes out of a very different family of dynamics that brings a whole history of joy, baggage, and pain, into childhood, into adulthood, and into marriage. And they join together as one flesh in a covenant relationship with God and man. To be honest, they don't really know each other very well yet. And they live happily ever after! Sound like a fairy tale? Some say it is. Until you understand God's design for marriage. Three ingredients are needed for a holy and happy marriage - humility to lay down your life, courage to be vulnerable, and faith to believe that a healthy marriage is possible with God. And more humility, a willingness to repair (a comforting confession) when you mess up.

If you are married, you are not married to the same person you married. We all change. And as believers, we are hopefully being transformed more and more into God's image. It is true; one purpose of marriage is to make us more holy. It either will or it won't. There's a lot to overcome. But there is so much to be hopeful for. Your marriage is worth all the energy you can muster. Because ultimately, marriage is meant to display Christ and the Church (groom and bride) to a watching world. Is yours?

Add to all that, a couple serving in a cross-cultural context, like Kenya. The crucible of life overseas takes its toll on an already challenging relationship... and on their ministry team... spilling over onto the very people they are trying to reach... eventually, impacting all who sent them in the first place! The cost of an unhealthy marriage is immense. But help is not far away. This is why we offer missionaries support for a deeper marriage.

ASK and PRAY, "Does your marriage HINDER or HELP the work God calls you to?"

UGANDA

These three weeks of training proved to be some of our most challenging yet most rewarding. The context is a society that often does not hold high the standard for relational commitment. After day one with the first group of eight single leaders (four married but not with their spouse or separated) they were like deer in the headlights. But over the next three days they were soaking in material they had never heard before. It convicted their hearts and challenged their own family's relationships. They were visibly excited to practice and give away what they received.

The next week, instead of the 24 we thought would attend, there were 50! A remote village church was filled. Of particular note, was their response to our biblical teaching on singleness. This gave hope to those who felt alone and burdened. Some of God's purposes for singles (at least as long as they are single) are to instill in them a



sufficiency in Christ, to take advantage of the opportunity to sow their seeds more widely, and to recognize the spiritual children that await them.

The MAF is made available to members of Lower Marsh Creek Presbyterian Church, who are struggling financially due to unforeseen circumstances. The MAF is not a budgeted fund. Its receipts consist primarily of contributions from members of the Church, and its expenses consist of fund disbursed for its intended purposes at the direction of the Pastor and MAF committee.

"If anyone has material possessions and sees a brother or sister in need but has not pity on them, how can the love of God be in that person? Dear children, let not love with words or speech but with actions and in truth." (1 John 3:17-18)

"Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up. Therefor, as we have opportunity, let us do good to all people, especially to those who belong to the family of the believers." (Galatians 6:9-10)

A four (4) person committee will be appointed by the Session to serve as the MAF Committee. This committee is responsible for reviewing the request/need for the member in need. The committee, with the Pastor, will make the determination regarding the awarding to gifts from the fund to qualifying member. While the Pastor and the Committee are ultimately accountable to Session, the Pastor may make a decision to disburse monies from the fund, subject to the guidelines herein, without involving the MAF Committee or Session.

The stated purpose is to meet people's basic needs. Some of the most basic needs or circumstances, including: Mortgage/Rent, Utilities (lights, water, gas), Food, Medical treatment, transportation to or from a place of employment. Assistance with funeral expenses may be considered for members, the spouses and children of members, and for individuals for whom the member was "caretaker". Also end of life preparations. All disbursement of funds are made directly to the party or entity to whom payment is due.

The MAF does have policy/procedure and application located in the church office. The MAF has been a God given gift for a few members our congregation. We ask that you consider MAF in your giving plan to the church. "Give, and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together and running over, will be poured into your lap.
