"We made such a bold and dramatic change," said Deanna. "We are relieved and grateful for the warmth, openness, and inviting atmosphere here."


"People ask why we moved here," said Deanna, "and we tell them because we wanted to!"



There is a little building (and a few other houses) that we drive past all of the time on M-104 in Spring Lake. The sign out by the road says "The People Center" but how many actually know what this amazing organization does – or even that it is an organization at all?

The People Center has been there since 1996 – yes, almost 30 years! While they have expanded their services over the years, one thing has remained the same – their mission. This amazing organization provides food, clothing, transitional housing and helps to connect people going through uncertainty with other resources to help them move forward with dignity.

When you drive down the driveway to the little gray building, it is hard to imagine the impact such a small place can make – but trust me they do! Last month alone they provided food and clothing to over 2000 people. Amazing!

Their clothing pantry is one unlike any other I have seen – they collect for the whole family and really appreciate business attire so they can provide dress clothing for job interviews and such to people who are working to get themselves back on their feet. It is a small pantry with a big impact. They are currently looking for bedding items, NEW underwear and socks, hats, mittens, and snow pants just to name a few.

As for their food pantry – they did a major expansion of that program several years ago and it is like a small grocery store. Fully stocked with great options for everyone. You can donate cleaning supplies, dry goods

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(think cereal, pasta, etc.), canned goods, and other food and hygiene products. These items make a huge impact without much effort on your part. Trust me – they matter to those people in need.

The little gray building is not their only building – they have several other buildings to help people with transitional housing as they get back on their feet. You have probably driven past them a thousand times without actually realizing that is what they are for – right here in our own community. They currently have 6 apartments that are used for transitional housing, so if you know someone in need of this, have them call the office and talk to the staff person to get started.

Our community is so supportive of ALL of our residents and organizations, like The People Center, and is the key to making sure those going through hard times have a place to turn for help – no matter if they need groceries for their kids, a couple outfits for job interviews or more. Just think about it – this little organization started as one small building with one apartment and has grown to what it is today because of the support of us, our friends, and neighbors. We truly live in a wonderful community!

Diabetes and Hearing Loss

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November is diabetes awareness month! This is a good time to talk about the relationship between diabetes and hearing loss. Hearing loss is a lesser known complication of diabetes, so this is very important information to have especially if you do have diabetes or prediabetes.

Diabetes is incredibly common. According to the CDC about 1 in 10 Americans have diabetes and 1 in 3 have prediabetes. Both diabetes and prediabetes increase your risk of hearing loss. In fact, diabetes doubles your risk of hearing loss compared to those who do not have diabetes. Prediabetes increases your risk by a third.

Many understand that diabetes affects your whole body. When it comes to the ear and hearing, researchers believe that diabetes may damage the nerves and small blood vessels in the inner ear eventually causing hearing loss. This is a gradual process that can happen over many years so the individual with diabetes may not recognize that hearing loss is occurring. So it is crucial that people with diabetes have an audiologist on their care team. The CDC recommends those with diabetes have their hearing checked annually.

If a hearing loss is detected, then treatment with hearing aids can begin at an early stage which may decrease your risk of complications of hearing loss such as social isolation, depression, and dementia.

White Chicken Chili

SERVES 4



INGREDIENTS:

- 2 1/4 LBS BONELESS SKINLESS CHICKEN BREAST OR CAN CHICKEN CHOPPED 1 TBSP OLIVE OIL 1 CUP GREEN ONIONS DICED 1 CUP RED BELL PEPPERS CHOPPED 1/4 CUP JALAPEÑO PEPPER DICED 3 SMALL GARLIC CLOVES MINCED 1/2 TSP SALT
- 2 TSP CUMIN 1 TSP CORIANDER 3 CUP CHICKEN BROTH 1 CUP WATER 2 (7) OZ MILD GREEN CHILIES 3 TBSP UNSWEETENED COCONUT MILK 1 SMALL CILANTRO HALVED

HERES WHAT TO DO:

1 — Chop the chicken and veggies (save some green onions to top each serving if you choose). Then place a large pot over medium-high heat. Add the oil, onions, peppers (remove the seeds), Jalapeño (remove the seeds) and garlic. Sauté for 5 minutes.

2 — Add the chicken, salt and spices. Sauté another 5 to 8 minutes, until chicken is nearly cooked through. Add the broth, green chilies, and coconut milk. Bring to a boil. Lower the heat and simmer for 20 minutes.

3 — Serve topped with green onions and cilantro if you choose.
