



Only Bonnie knows what the heck we are really doing with them. I have to wait until Friday for the next clue. It will be queen size when it is revealed in January.

### Pamela Abell -

Hi Lovely Quilters,

Jen L's Challenge to use the UFOs has been my commitment until further notice. I don't have tons of UFOs or Orphan blocks but am surprised at how many I did find.

This new quilt project started width a file folder that I created when I first started to quilt 8 years ago. It contained 16 side triangles for the 4" V-Block shape using wild fabric in earth tones, then I stopped. I remember wanting to practice on some fabric I don't personally like in case it didn't work. It also contained 8 four-patch blocks in dark gray and more ugly fabric. Then I found 24 more four-patches using 2" squares that Melanie H. gave me from her Mom's scraps, all in earth tones, sewn at night when I couldn't sleep.



How to make those all into one quilt? The colors worked together but I had to come up with a design. I have been studying Sharyn Craig's books on how to design quilt settings and Harriet Hargrave and Sharyn's book, Traditional Quilts.

I realized that all the quilts I have made so far have an 'overall block' look, either straight set or diagonal set, and maybe sashing with cornerstones. I have never done a medallion center before.

I try to learn a new quilting technique or do something different with every quilt I make. I took my time with this one and mulled, stewed, and thought each step through and then dug back into one of my favorite high school classes, Geometry! I even drafted my first very first quilt sections!

Here are all the new techniques I decided to play with on this quilt – never done before by me:

- Large 12-inch star blocks, set on point
- Pieced <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> square side setting triangles, to avoid a big plain triangle on the block edges
- Pieced ½ square corner setting triangles to continue the pieced border all around

- Lots of scraps using the same structure
- Structural design to create an overall finished look for 8 huge blocks
- Medallion star on the back using up all the extra scraps of 24 four-patch blocks with 14 miniature log cabin blocks as the center unit of square-in-a-square
- Pieced back to use up more scraps and try the Medallion

I have the top all pieced and now just have to add borders to the pieced back. I find the challenges of new techniques just what I need. And I like how the quilts are turning out. Using my Tucker tools, I can make the units and blocks any size I want which is perfect for scraps and Orphans.

I miss you all and wonder what you are up to?

I actually quilted something this month! However, I forgot to take a picture of the finished product. What can I say? I am often forgetful. I only have this in-progress pic of a Christmas wall hanging that I made for my mother-in-law. I ended up making a border around it that looks like presents. Maybe I'll get a pic of it when we celebrate Christmas Day at their house.



In other news, we got eggs! Lots and lots of eggs! Currently we are getting between 8 and 12 eggs a day. We've been giving quite a few away. The pic below happens to be all brown, but we are getting white, cream, bluish-green, and brown eggs.
