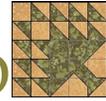
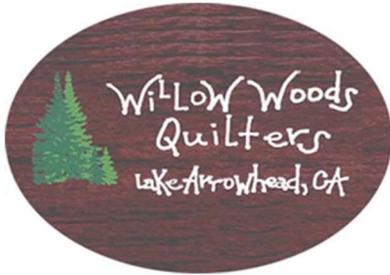

*Our guild is dedicated to promoting the art of quilting through education, sharing and learning, and using our efforts to benefit the community through annual contributions and in time of need.*

One Block Wonder beginners are welcome, and members will help you get started. Here's what you need:

- \*Your One Block Wonder book by Maxine Rosenthal*
- \*Your partially completed quilt, or your curiosity*
- \*Ruler with which to cut a 60 degree triangle*
- \*Sewing machine with 1/4" foot*
- \*Large 18" x 24" cutting mat & rotary cutter with a new blade*
- \*Basic Sewing Kit - thread, scissors, seam ripper, etc.*
- \*Fabric — You need to have 6 pattern repeats for hexagon blocks. Therefore, if the pattern repeats at 24", you need a minimum of 4-1/2 yards for your quilt top. Buying another yard or two will give you enough fabric to include in borders, binding, etc.*

Minutes of January 11, 2020

The meeting was called to order at 10:05 AM.

President Judy Green welcomed members and announced that Susan Wade celebrated her birthday January 6.

**ELECTION/INSTALLATION:** Yolanda Douglas is nominated to fill the position of Secretary. Vote was unanimous to elect her. Judy Green then installed the new 2020 officers with a presentation of crowns and applause. Our 2020 officers are Judy Green, President, Jeanne Folta and Jennifer Lanak, Vice Presidents, Yolanda Douglas, Secretary, and Sherry Schliskey, Treasurer. Judy then expressed her appreciation and thanks to last year's Board Members for all their work.

**SECRETARY:** The minutes of December 14, 2019 meeting, submitted by Judy Green in Elaine Shaw's absence, were accepted as presented.

**Treasurer:** Sherry Schliskey said that the Guild's current bank balance is \$5,794. The Treasurer's report will be filed. 2020 dues of \$30 are due now.

**CO-VP/Clubs:** Jeanne Folta will finesse the e-mail delivery to notify members about Club activities. Trisha Skalnik announced that there will be a \$50 charge to use the Elks' room for an additional Saturday. Sherry Schliskey said that the \$50 was already in the budget. Yolanda Douglas suggested opening the Clubs to Dogwood and other community members. She suggested that there be a nominal fee for attendance.

The Elks room is available to us any Saturday, from 10AM – 5PM. We need to organize Club schedules, protocol, etc. at the next meeting.

**CO-VP/Challenges:** Jen Lanak said that she will present as many challenges as members want to participate in, some with timelines, some not. She will present a few each month.

It was suggested that a field trip to M&L Fabrics be organized. Jen volunteered to host a luncheon at her home down the hill. Carpools need to be arranged. Goal is to have this field trip in the spring when weather improves.

**PUBLIC RELATIONS:** Yolanda Douglas suggested that opening the Clubs to outside quilters would be good exposure to the community. Yolanda will speak to Bob Gladwell (Rotary Club President-elect and Art & Wine Chair) to discuss the possibility of WWQG participating in the 2020 A&W Festival.

**WEBSITE:** Trisha Skalnik announced that the website has been updated. If you want to submit photos for the site, send them in .gif or .png format to Trisha. Jpegs are too large.

**HOSPITALITY:** Cheryl Wood circulated a list for members to sign up to bring refreshments.

## **Challenges – Jen Lanak**

We decided at the last meeting to have the Challenges be a guild-wide activity instead of its own club within the guild. There is no expectation or pressure to participate in all or any of the challenges. If

something catches your eye and interests you – join in! If it doesn't, there is no need to feel guilty. This is strictly for fun and inspiration.

We also decided that it would be fun to have most of our challenges run quarterly. We are a little late starting this quarter's challenge, so I picked an easy one to start.

Introducing the **What's in a Name Challenge** – Using your 3 initials – your 1st initial is the color, 2<sup>nd</sup> initial is the block/pattern, 3<sup>rd</sup> is quilting motif. Choose a color, block, motif based on your initial.

For examples: Betty Ann Smith might choose: Blue, Arizona Star, Stipple. Yolanda Fiona Douglas might choose a Yellow, Farmers Wife Quilt (that would be a challenge!) with a Daisy motif. Or Jennifer Em Lanak might choose Jade, Economy Block, with a Leaf quilting motif. You get the idea. I have books of block designs to help you choose if you get stumped with your letter.

I have no idea what I'm going to choose yet, but hopefully will have a better idea at the meeting. No, you don't have to declare by the meeting what you will do, and yes, you can decide as you go how you will fulfill your initials. Remember, this is just for fun! The end of the quarter is March 31<sup>st</sup>, so let's try to share our What's in a Name Challenge items at the April meeting.

**The UFO Challenge:** It's not quite time to get a new number to work on, so I thought I would share my progress on my UFO #2 – my interpretation of Van Gogh's "Café Terrace at Night". You might recall from the January meeting that I only had the roughest of sketches on a piece of muslin – we are talking "really rough" sketch. Well, I am pleased to say that I did work on it a little earlier in the month and have made progress!

When I really started looking at it, I realized that my proportions were all off for the scene, so I flipped my muslin over and re-drew the sketch using a grid technique used in basic drawing that I had completely forgotten about until watching a video about Chuck Close's painting technique (more on that in the Art Quilt club news). Needless to say, things went much better and the proportions were corrected. I then decided to piece together a background of solid colored fabrics to be the base to build my collage on top of. And here it is:



Wow. I know, not much to look at yet, but it is a start. Comically, when I posted this picture on my Quilter in the Closet Instagram page, all the modern quilters thought it was amazing as is. They probably think I will straight-line quilt it like so many quilts I've seen in the Minimalist category at QuiltCon. Not gonna happen this time. LOL.

So, there you go, progress!

As soon as I discover the new number for February, I'll shoot out a quick email for anyone that wants to get a jump on working on their new UFO project.

If you missed last month's newsletter or meeting and still want to join in, you are welcome to join us anytime through the year. Here is quick overview of how it works:

Step One – Complete the Chart by filling in 12 projects that you want to work on this year. They can be anything and in any state of progress. If you want to use the official American Patchwork and Quilting chart, it is here <https://static.onecms.io/wp-content/uploads/pdfs/sites/42/2019/11/2020-UFO-Challenge.pdf> OR I have crafted a very rudimentary copy below.

Step Two: On the 1<sup>st</sup> of each month, APQ will choose a number. You will work on the project that corresponds to that number. Again, “work on” is loosely defined. We are looking for some kind of forward progress, it doesn't have to be finished. January's # was #2. February's number should be released on Saturday, Feb. 1<sup>st</sup>.

Step Three: Share your progress! Bring your previous month's UFO to the meeting to show us what you've done, and your current month's UFO so we can see where you started. You can also share your progress on our Facebook page.


The goal here is to make a dent in all those UFOs you have tucked away. Good luck!

## Art Quilt Club – Jen Lanak

We briefly met at the last meeting and decided that as a group, we were just going to “go with the flow” as far as meeting for the first few months to see how things go. We agreed that utilizing the room and time after the general meeting each month (rather than a separate time) works best for the majority of us. While the OBW group also meets during this time, there is plenty of room to Sit-n-Sew. So, if you feel inclined, bring something art-quilty to work on to the February meeting and we can encourage each other.

Kim also encouraged us to check out the work of painter, Chuck Close. His technique uses a grid to break up an image of a portrait (face), then paints shapes within each square. They seriously just look like blobs of color, but somehow when you step back, the image comes together to reveal the face. It is a fascinating technique, and I could easily imagine the possibilities in quilting. Well, we aren't the only ones. I spotted this quilt at Road to California this week:



This is “My Big Face” by Cindy Stohn of Chandler, Arizona. She did things a little differently than I envisioned, using mostly circles to complete her image, but you get the idea. Isn't it neat??

Kim has suggested checking out the work of quilter, Jack Edson, for further inspiration. He actually incorporates quilt blocks into his portraits. The effect is pretty cool. I hope you will do a quick search to check it out.
