Challenges – Jen Lanak

The UFO Challenge:

February's # is 2. On my list is my Land of Lincoln quilt. It is probably the oldest UFO I have. I started it years and years ago with the intention of it being an auction quilt for our Quilt Walk auction. While it is a lovely pattern, it is not my style at all, which is why it was easy for me to always put it aside to work on anything else. As with a fair number of the projects on my UFO list, this one got waylaid at the adding borders stage. I don't know what it is about adding borders, but many of my projects halt at this step. I think it is because I get frustrated with cutting those long sections and then sewing those long seams. For adding 4 pieces of fabric to a quilt, it seems to take forever and my brain revolts. It really is time for me to put on my big girl pants, dust off the dust, and get this done.

My January project got a little sidetracked. If you recall, I admitted that I needed to make progress on my Technicolor Galaxy quilt because I had piles of scraps segregated into all the colors of the rainbow lying around my quilting room. There is no way I could take on a different project until I got that mess cleaned up. Well.....I did pull scraps for my next round of blocks for the quilt, but then I got distracted by all the scraps that weren't organized by color (and I had A LOT!). So I started organizing those, and even managed to throw away the "crumbs" I realized I would never use. I got about halfway through the rainbow before the garden chores required priority. So, I guess I didn't really make much progress on my quilt, but I did start the process of cleaning up my area. Does that count?



Jen Lanak –

I am happy to report that while I didn't make an abundance of progress on any quilts last month, I did spend at least an hour a week in my quilting room. I've mostly been sorting scraps, but I also had the good idea to take my machine in for a tune up. It was time and I had been having some trouble with my feed dogs. Now my machine is in tip top shape for the adventures to come.

I've mostly been spending time out in the garden or inside prepping for gardening season. I've got seedlings growing under lights on a rack in an unused bathroom. I am trying to do a round of cool season crops before it gets too hot, but I already think I might be too late. I also started a bunch of flowers that prefer the cooler weather to start their lives – like Calendula, Black Eyed Susans, Echinacea, and Anise Hyssop (this is the first year I am trying it). I will probably start my tomatoes next week, followed by some warm weather flowers and vegetables. I bought a bunch of new varieties of tomatoes for this year that I am eager to try out. I plan to do more canning of the tomatoes this summer because I didn't even come close to "putting up" enough jars to meet our needs for the winter (we eat marinara sauce about once a week in this house in some recipe or other).

I convinced my husband to let me put in three new raised beds to expand my garden. These three will likely have tomatoes planted in them by the end of the month. I like to rotate the beds I use for tomatoes and since these are new, they will be next in the rotation. Here is an in-progress pic of their construction this week, with the girls helping out (not the kids, the chickens).



Speaking of the chickens, they have been enjoying "free-ranging" in the garden, under supervision. When we got the chickens, I knew I wanted to let them wander a bit, but we have a lot of predator pressure. There are coyotes, of course, in the area but the most danger comes from a pair of hawks that nested on my neighbor's property last year. They would love to make a meal out of one of my girls! Last month we tried to construct a temporary aviary using netting and some posts that could be moved around the garden. While excellent in theory, our design proved to be very difficult in aspects of its execution. The netting available was awful and would tangle on a blade of grass. After a few days of cursing and moaning about how difficult it was to work with, we decide to let our girls out freely as long as one of us was working nearby. We realize that this system is not foolproof, but since surviving the loss of our first chicken (Rest in Peace, Nubs. (Long, emotional story)), we are willing to risk it to let them have the enjoyment of being out. Let me tell you – they love it! They go right to work eating the bugs and weeds that surround my gardening beds. I am especially interested to see what impact they have on the bug population. I usually have quite a problem with pillbugs and slugs eating my young plants. It has only been about 10 days since we've let the chickens roam and I haven't seen many pillbugs and zero slugs or snails. It might just be a little early in the season to tell, but I'm hopeful that it is all because of the chickens.
