Challenges – Jen Lanak

Over the holiday, I was considering how to organize a UFO challenge for whomever would like to participate, only to discover that a very similar one is being hosted by American Patchwork & Quilting. So, I thought why not just join up with their UFO challenge. Here is how it works:

Step One – Complete the Chart by filling in 12 projects that you want to work on this year. They can be anything and in any state of progress. If you want to use the official APQ chart, it is here https://static.onecms.io/wp-content/uploads/pdfs/sites/42/2019/11/2020-UFO-Challenge.pdf OR I have crafted a very rudimentary copy below.

Step Two: On the 1st of each month, APQ will choose a number. You will work on the project that corresponds to that number. Again, "work on" is loosely defined. Even if you can only spare 30 minutes on that project for the month – you will still be making progress! People often forget that even baby steps are forward progress. You could also bring your designated project to work on following our meeting while the OBW gang does its thing.

Step Three: Share your progress! It would be fun if we could share our projects at the meetings. One month showing the status "before" and the next the status "after" working on it. However, you may want to get a jump on working on your project as soon as the number is announced on the 1st. Yes, I will also let you know the number in each newsletter!

You can also share your progress on our Facebook page. APQ also has a special Facebook group for participants – you can search for American Patchwork & Quilting's UFO Challenge – to share your progress pics AND a special hashtag for anyone using Instagram - #APQResolution.

The goal here is to make a dent in all those UFOs you have tucked away. Good luck!

So, it looks like I will be working on my Van Gogh quilt.

There were some other challenges that I had brainstormed for the New Year. I think I will do a little survey at the meeting to gage interest. Here they are again; in case you want to refresh your memory. I'm also open to any ideas you may have, and I think some of our special interest groups could do challenges specific to their interests too.

Brown Bag Challenge – each participant puts 4 Fat Quarters in a brown bag. The bags are then swapped, and you have to make something from the fabrics you receive. You can add fabric as needed as long as you use at least one scrap from each fat quarter you had in your bag.

Fat Quarter Challenge – similar to the Brown Bag Challenge, except that every participant gets an identical set of 4 Fat Quarters and must create a project from the fabrics. It is fun to see all the different ideas that can spark from the same fabric pull. Obviously, the one logistical challenge with this idea is cost of supplies because everyone needs to get the same fabrics, it is unlikely that one of us would be able to supply the entire challenge if there are a lot of participants.

12 by 12 Challenge (or variation) – I've been intrigued by this challenge since I saw an exhibition at Road to California. Every month, the participants are given a source of inspiration – often a specific color or word (like "winter" or "love" or "light", etc.) and must create a 12 inch square quilt based on that source of inspiration. Variations in size can made, as well as the number of quilts and time frame between. For example, instead of 12 by 12, we could have 4 quilts at 24 inches square throughout the year (so 4 by 24). This would be a particularly fun challenge for the art quilt group.

Block Based Challenge – we've done these before where you create a quilt showcasing a specific quilt block like Half Square Triangles, Flying Geese, etc. Perhaps it is time to step it up a notch and choose a more difficult block, like New York Beauty, Cathedral Windows, Lone Star, Dahlia or Pineapple Blocks.

Crayon Challenge – Each participant is given a bag with a mystery set of 2 or 3 crayons. They must create a quilt using these colors and may add one additional color of their choice and one neutral color of their choice.

What's in a Name Challenge – Using your 3 initials – your 1st initial is the color, 2nd initial is the block/pattern, 3rd is quilting motif. Choose a color, block, motif based on your initial. For examples: Betty Ann Smith might choose: Blue, Arizona Star, Stipple. Yolanda Fiona Douglas might choose a Yellow, Farmers Wife Quilt (that would be a challenge!) with a Daisy motif. Or Jennifer Em Lanak might choose Jade, Economy Block, with a Leaf quilting motif. You get the idea. I have books of block designs to help you choose if you get stumped with your letter.

Clue Challenge: Each participant chooses three cars from a standard "Clue" game. They then have to represent those three clues in their quilt. The suspects (Professor Plum, Ms. Scarlett, etc.) could represent the color, but they don't have to. The rooms and weapons will be the trickier part. The Rope – could be a rope quilting motif or a couched thread as an embellishment; Lead Pipe could be something grey or long and thin; Conservatory could use floral fabric or applique flowers and vines. Creativity is key!

UFO Exchange – Each participant brings in a project they have started, but don't want to finish. The projects are exchanged, and each participant is challenged to complete the UFO they were given. Participants are allowed to modify the project as they desire in order to complete. For example, if you are pattern that calls for a bunch of 16 patches and the "giver" has done a bunch of 4 patches to start, you can ditch the pattern and use the 4 patches to complete whatever you like. Likewise, you can rip out stitches and re-piece into different blocks if you choose. Or perhaps you are given enough blocks for a king size quilt, but you decide to make a twin and use the blocks on the front and back. Whatever goes as long as you finish.
