They felt the banana tree, or mai'a, was the ideal symbol for the Foundation because the flower, or pua, is considered the 'heart' and from it grows the fruit.

As the tree grows, it makes way for new growth, or keiki, to emerge to take its place. Like the Foundation, it provides from the heart for both the adults of today and the keiki of tomorrow. Each day the Foundations strives to not only grow, but flourish and bloom to support our future generations.


Our Junior Board

The Junior Board of the Hualalai 'Ohana Foundation is a non-award youth leadership committee. Their mission states:

"The objective of the Junior Board is to support the efforts of the Board of Directors in their mission to provide financial assistance for educational and medical needs of the Hualalai Employee Community; to provide the board with a different perspective; and, to provide an opportunity for Junior Board members to learn the importance of philanthropy, as well as, gain professional development skills which will benefit them in the future."

In early 2014, Alec and Ryan Dominick presented their idea of a custom Monopoly board game for the Hualalai Resort and the Junior Board took on their biggest fund-raising challenge yet. They created "Hualalaiopoly" and raised the funds for their project by setting up an online auction to gain sponsors for all the properties and game cards of the Hualalaiopoly game. The game was manufactured and delivered in time to sell during Festive 2014.

The Junior Board has far exceeded initial expectations. Their first fundraiser was a Cart-Wash in 2006, with modest earnings of \$1,250.00. To date, the Junior Board has raised over \$200,000.00 in support of Hualalai 'Ohana families.

Education Programs

Quality education is a precious resource on Hawaii Island. Our goal is to improve access to education through scholarships, programs, and various learning tools. Since 2003, the Foundation is proud to have awarded over \$3.2 million in support of educational programs for our beneficiaries




Dolly Parton's Imagination Library

In our partnership with the Dollywood Foundation, the Imagination Library delivers a new book each month to children from birth until five years old. The books are addressed to the children, which creates excitement when they get their own mail each month. The books provide early learning opportunities and encourage parents to read with their children. *Since 2008, the Foundation has gifted over 12,000 books to employees' children, which includes 122 families in 2014*

LeapFrog Learning Toys

Another investment in early childhood education is the annual LeapFrog giveaway. On one day per year, the foundation distributes LeapFrog educational toys to children from three to eight years old. The event is an exciting one, with over 50% of the units handed out in the first hour. This is a favorite program of the employees and a good investment in helping young children to associate learning with fun. *Since 2005, the Foundation has gifted 2,140 learning tools to the employee 'ohana. In 2014, 250 LeapPad 3's were distributed.*



Pre-K to 12th Grade Scholarships

Private education is an expensive investment for Hualalai employee families and to aid these families, the Foundation provides partial funding for tuition costs. This investment helps with access to education that would not be possible otherwise. Awards are granted to eligible applicants on a sliding scale, which is based on gross income, financial need, size of household and academic merit. *Since 2003, the investment in this effort has allowed 688 children to have access to private school education. In 2014, \$173,500 in awards provided scholarships to 21 pre-schoolers and 49 students in 1st - 12th grades.*



Manny Mero of Engineering has three daughters. With the Foundation's help his oldest daughter, Tasha graduated in 2014 from University of Hawaii at Manoa with a B.A. in Journalism. Her sister Mandy will graduate UH Manoa in 2015. The youngest of the three Joanne is still in high school, but following in her sister's footsteps. She is active in Lifeplan at Kealakehe High School and had been granted two Coursework Awards for the University of Hawaii-Running Start program to prepare for college.



Public School Programs



Honor Roll Awards

This program recognizes the academic work of employee children in 6th-12th grade. Private, public, and charter school students are invited to participate. The event kicks off with a carnival and over a dozen games. Students earn tickets at each game booth and exchange them for school supplies. An award ceremony follows the carnival where students are presented with a certificate along with a cash award. *Since 2008, 650 students have received recognition and rewards for their academic achievements. At the award ceremony in 2014, awards were presented to 86 students, reaching 70 households.*

Lifepan Youth Mentoring

This program focuses on the public school sector by helping to mentor teens in life skills and college/career readiness. At nearby Kealakehe High School, employees and other adults volunteer alongside the teachers to mentor students in their 45-minute homeroom class. This partnership between the Foundation, school, mentors, teachers, and youth is making a positive difference in the school environment and for the students. *This program is growing and has already served over 960 high school students. In 2014, participants included 29 adult mentors, 73 youth leaders and 640 sophomore and junior students. The end of year Youth Summit hosted 81 attendees who spent the day preparing for the 2015-2016 school year.*





Our Funding

The Foundation's success would not be possible without the generosity of our donors. The Foundation receives income from four critical areas.



First, our Annual Appeal which typically provides funding for 65% of annual expenditures to support our mission. This pure form of philanthropy allows us to provide access to quality education and medical aid for the employee 'ohana year round.

Second, the Foundation hosts a variety of events that enhance the sense of Hualalai community, while raising money to support our programs. The most exciting event is the Annual Golf & Auction event. Held each summer this event always offers an incredible array of once-in-a-lifetime auction items.

Third, we are the fortunate beneficiary of the event entry fees from the Annual Mitsubishi ProAm hosted by The Four Seasons Hualalai Resort.

Finally, we have a creative Junior Board that sponsors unique activities and events to support our mission.

Medical Assistance

Significant medical treatment can sometimes create financial distress for our 'ohana. Our financial assistance with life-threatening illnesses and important surgeries help families concentrate on healing. *Since 2003, the Foundation has given over \$650,000.00 to help with significant medical treatment expenses. In 2014, a total of \$143,136.00 was awarded to support 45 households with their medical needs.*

Life-threatening Illness Award

Access to quality healthcare can be a challenge. In the event of a serious illness or injury, Hawai'i Island residents must travel off island for treatment, even sometimes to the mainland. When this occurs, the Foundation helps to ease the burden by helping with patient co-pays, prescriptions, and medical travel. *In 2014, the Foundation gave 25 serious medical awards with an average award of \$4,735.00.*

Surgical Assistance Award

Some medical conditions, though not life-threatening, require necessary treatment to avoid disability. Due to the costs involved, some employees postpone the surgery until they are no longer able to work. The Foundation's award provides up to \$2,000 to help with necessary routine and serious surgeries. *In 2014, an additional 25 medical awards were granted to members of our 'ohana in need of surgery. The average Surgical Award amount was \$889.00.*

Dental Assistance Award

In 2012, the Medical Committee developed a new program to support those in need of urgent dental procedures. Following the same guidelines as the Surgical Assistance Award, this award provides up to \$1,000.00 toward necessary dental treatments. *In 2014, this award was granted to 3 individuals with an average award amount of \$581.00.*
