On 17th July 1917 at the Invitation of Melvin Jones, delegates met in Chicago, The only point of contention was the selection of a name the New Organization.

Melvin Jones researched the idea of calling the New Organization Lions. He was convinced that lion stood for strength, courage, fidelity and vital action. On a secret ballot the name LIONS was chosen over several others.

The Lions Emblem

At the 1919 convention, there was a move to change the symbol, but a young attorney from Denver, Colorado rose to speak. His names was Halsted Ritter. "The name Lions stands not only for fraternity, good fellowship, strength of character and purpose, but above all, its combination of L-I-ON-S heralds to the country the true meaning of citizenship: LIBERTY, INTERLLEGENCE, OUR NATION'S SAFETY

Lionism

Objectives of Lionism:

- To create and foster a spirit of understanding among the peoples of the world.
- To promote the principles of good government and good citizenship.
- To take an active interest in the civic, cultural, social and moral welfare of the community.
- To unite the clubs in the bonds of friendship, good fellowship and mutual understanding.
- To provide a forum for the open discussion of all matters of public interest; provided, however, that partisan and sectarian religion shall not be debated by club members.
- To encourage service-minded men to serve their community without personal financial reward, and to encourage efficiency and promote high ethical standards in commerce, industry, professions, public works and private endeavors.



Lake Orion Club History and Traditions

Formed in 1938 / Sponsored by Pontiac Lions Club

In 1944, pencil sales to support Leader Dogs to provide assistance for soldiers who have been blinded in service to their country

In 1950, the Christmas Basket was started to provide food and gifts to school families and seniors as a community project.

In 1953, Goodfellow Newspaper Sales financed the filling of Christmas boxes and helped provide clothing for needy families

In 1980, Jubilee became a fundraiser to support a variety of charities

In 1982, the 120 club members received recognition with a Top 10 Award from Lions Club International for its service project of providing CPR training to over 1700 people in the Orion area over a 5-year period.

In 1983, a second Top 10 Award was granted for the summer camp for blind youth at Franklin Settlement Camp for 2 weeks without charge.

In 1995, Margaret DeGroff became the first woman to join the club.

In 2020 the Lake Orion Lioness Club became a Branch Club.

In 2023 the club secured retired mailboxes and recycled them into Recycled Eye Glasses boxes.




How to be a Good Lion

New Member Opportunities

New members are encouraged to volunteer to assist based on the things they enjoy doing. Signup sheets for various functions are usually distributed at the meetings and noted in the club newsletter.

Attend "Kick Off Dinners". The club provides the opportunity for new members to attend the "Kick Off Dinners" for the charities we support at no cost to the members during their first year of membership. The Kick Off Dinners include:

- District 11-A2 Project Kidsight Usually in September
- Penrickton Center for Blind Children Usually in October
- Leader Dog for the Blind Usually in December
- Lions Bear Lake Camp Usually in February
- Corewell Health (previously Beaumont) Silent Children's Fund –

- Madonna University Deaf and Hearing Program Usually in April

Propose a fundraiser or community service project:

- Identify the project: Determine the project you want to submit an d ensure it aligns with the Lions' mission and values.
- Gather information: Collect all necessary information about the project, including details about the project's scope, objectives, and expected outcomes.
- Create a project proposal: Draft a detailed proposal outlining the project goals, how it will be funded, and how it will be managed.
 An estimate on profits from a fundraiser should be provided.
- Schedule a presentation to the board: Contact the club secretary to get your proposal place on the upcoming board agenda. Make a presentation at the meeting and answer questions. If approved you are ready to proceed

Club Meetings

General membership meetings are held on the first and third Wednesdays of each month, September-June.

Zoom Workplace app is an option for members to attend the meeting online if they are unable to attend in person. A zoom link is sent out to members by email prior to the meeting.

The meeting agenda is emailed out prior to the meeting.

The member's name badges should be worn at all meetings.

Joker Poker is played at club meetings. It is optional to participate. By drawing the joker you can win half of the accumulating pot. Members must be present at drawing. The winning member gets the honor of running Joker Poker until there is a new winner. The monies collected go into the Administrative Fund.

The club Tail Twister can fine members at meetings. The fine is limited to \$1.00 per meeting per member. The monies collected go into the club administrative fund.

The Member's Choice Raffle is conducted at meetings with all members being provided with a raffle ticket at no cost. The number drawn gets to pick a charity they would like \$100 to be donated to.

Board meeting are normally held the third Wednesday of each month following the general membership meeting. The meetings are also scheduled in the summer months of July and August when no general membership meetings are held.

The agenda for the board meeting is made available for all members.

All members can and are encouraged to attend board meetings but only board members can vot

New Member Induction Ceremony

The Induction Ceremony is the symbolic beginning to a member's service as a Lion. It is also a key element in the lifelong retention of a member. The ceremony is normally conducted during a membership meeting.



Club Board Elections

The officers of our club, also known as the board of directors, include the president, immediate past president, vice presidents, branch club president, secretary, treasurer, membership chair, tail twister, lion tamer, and 12 directors. Officers are elected annually, in the spring, for a term coinciding with the club's fiscal year (July 1-June 30). Additional information on board positions can be found in the club roster book. The elected board members are installed at an installation meeting/dinner in June. The current board members with their pics are on the Lake Orion Lions Club website on the Club Officers page.



Club Officer Induction Ceremony

An induction ceremony for all board members is held in June at a site selected by the incoming president.

Club Dues



Membership Dues and Fees Chart

Dues are currently set at \$100 a year, July 1 – June 30. The first-year dues for new members are on a sliding scale depending on the month of the new member is installed. Additional family members can join at a reduced annual fee.

The distribution of dues are as follows:

- Lion Club International \$52
- MI Lions \$11
- 11A2 \$10
- MI Mag \$4.50
- Lake Orion Lions \$ 22.50

New members should be prepared to pay their dues upon being installed.

Budget



We are a 501(c)(3) Non-Profit Organization Tax ID: 38-3633253. IRS rules require us to maintain a minimum of two separate funds, an administrative account and an activities or account.

Our club treasurer maintains an administrative account for collecting dues and paying for our administrative costs for the club such as dues, supplies, postage, club voice mail, etc. It also covers "perks" that we as a club offer to our members and guests such as our Club Christmas party, sending members to Leadership Institute, covering costs for new members to attend kick-off dinners, covering the costs of guest meals at our meetings, etc. Under no circumstances can funds raised by the public be used in any manner whatsoever for administrative expenditure.

We refer to our activities fund as our charities account. The "main" charities account is where deposits and expenses for our events flow through as well as our annual donations to the charities we support. Our club also has two additional Charities accounts, one for Jubilee and one for Charity Poker. The Charity Poker account is a requirement by the State of Michigan to have a separate checking account for all monies involved in our Charity Poker events. The excess funds from these two accounts get transferred to our main charities account annually.

Lions Club Apparel

Lions club patches can be added to member's personal attire by completing the Club Apparel form and paying the necessary cost.

Awards

Awards for service and leadership

- <u>Humanitarian Award</u>: The association's highest honor, given for exemplary humanitarian efforts. It includes a large grant from the <u>Lions</u> <u>Clubs International Foundation</u> (LCIF).
- Melvin Jones Fellowship: A prestigious award to recognize outstanding Lions and members of the public who have demonstrated dedication to humanitarianism.
- <u>Chevron Award</u> Program: Recognizes Lions for their long-term service in 5year increments, starting at 10 years.
- Excellence Awards: Acknowledge clubs and leaders for outstanding leadership, membership growth, and impactful service.
- <u>Presidential LCIF Recognition</u>: Honors leaders who have made an extraordinary impact through their dedication and achievements.
- <u>Kindness Matters Service Award</u>: An annual award for a handful of Lions and Leo clubs that perform outstanding and innovative service projects.

Awards for membership

- Membership Key Awards: Awarded to individual Lions who sponsor new members.
- MISSION 1.5 Premier Club Award: A multi-tiered award system to encourage membership growth.

Other recognitions

- <u>International President's Certificate of Appreciation</u>: Awarded for distinguished achievements in service.
- <u>Lion of the Year</u>: A local award given by individual clubs to a member who consistently goes above and beyond.

Lions are active. Our motto is "We Serve." Lions are part of a global service network, doing whatever is necessary to help our local communities.


