Hi Friends!

2023 was a banner year for Charlie Five. We stepped into the year with new goals and new opportunities for our participants. We made some new partnerships and maintained old ones. It was a year of triumph and tragedy but in the end I believe we came out on top.

This year my travels took me to Kansas City, Aiken, Houston, Las Vegas (twice), and Ft. Worth/Decatur where we delivered horses, participated in clinics, filmed a documentary, cheered on other Veterans, were honored as recipients of a grant, and made new friends.

We started to go beyond just giving a horse away and began to invest in our participants and their horsemanship journey. We paid for clinics, entry fees and started planning a Charlie Five clinic at War Horses for Veterans in 2024 as a way to promote growth and camaraderie.

After a long time of searching, we were finally able to get John Tidwell his horse. Gunner was a palomino gelding and a great roping horse. Sadly he died from a severe case of colic. The tragedy was overturned when the Journey Home Project provided a grant that would allow us to buy John a new horse so he could continue his horsemanship journey.

Working with Jason Swick at Day 6 Ranch we started bridging the gap between the western world and our warrior community. We have had the privilege to talk to leaders in the industry about the life-changing transformation that takes place in a warrior when they have the opportunity to engage in events like rodeo, horsemanship, ranching and so on.

This year I hope we can settle in and see where our mission, this journey, takes Charlie Five as we finally have begun to establish our legitimacy and role in the western lifestyle community.

Finally, I want to thank you for all your continued support over the last seven years. Whether you are sharing our posts on social media or donating funds, each of you is important to our mission and we are deeply grateful for your efforts.

In February Jeremy was invited out to War Horses for Veterans to participate in a clinic with Russell Dilday, Taylor Gillespie and Kyle Noyce. He was able to take his brother, Tim, along. Tim had recently retired after 30 years as a police officer and the experience was great for him. It was also a great opportunity for Jeremy to learn new skills, build confidence and meet other Veterans.

Combat Veterans Motorcycle Association 47-3 executed a benefit ride for Charlie Five in March that ended at Sierra Blanca Brewing in Moriarty and raised over \$4000 at the event. It was a huge success and a great opportunity for us to get out and mingle with Veterans and build camaraderie in our community.

John Tidwell received his horse in April. Gunner was a palomino gelding that we found in Georgia. Jeremy made the trip there to see them together and make it all official. It was great to finally meet John in person and visit with Kelsey Willis and Greg Ziel again. We got to rope at Kelsey's place and talked about Johns plans and goals and how we could all help facilitate them.

In June our friend Jeb Osborne with Common Ground planned a fundraiser at Lava Rock Brewing in Albuquerque and our friends in the local band Shattered on Stone performed for us. It was a great night and the cold beer was refreshing on a hot summer night. Over \$500 was raised to help us continue our mission.

Rose and Jeremy flew out to Las Vegas in August to witness the first ever War Horse Challenge where 7 veterans competed against one another at the National Stock Horse Association Futurity. Charlie Five helped behind the scenes and did a lot of networking at the event.

2023 IN REVIEW









Jeremy was asked to take part in a documentary and filming took place north of Houston. The film is involves a philanthropist named Dan Celia, a horse trainer named Lauren Herr, and a mustang named Valor. We won't give away too many details but we were able to finally meet our friends with Saddles in Service and work with some really amazing people.

September was the month where we experienced tragedy. After only a few months John Tidwell lost Gunner to severe colic. It was a horrific experience that nobody was prepared for but, thankfully, David Corlew and the Charlie Daniels Journey Home Project were there to help. They sent a grant of \$10,000 to buy John a new horse.

One of the biggest highlights of the year was returning to Decatur, Texas for the Liberty and Loyalty Foundation's Horns n' Heroes clinic and the American Hero Celebration with Charly Crawford. Greg returned as a volunteer while John Tidwell, Jacob Greenlief and Kelsey Willis all participated in the clinic.

With \$10,000 in hand from the Journey Home Project we made good use of our time by having John try out a few horses while we were in the area. John confidently chose a Gelding from David Hastings named Johnny Ringo. "JR" has a ranching background but is comfortable and confident in the roping arena as well. John also received his Charlie Five buckle and did exceptionally well in the clinic.

Jeremy, Rose, Jake, Greg, John and Kelsey accepted a check for \$25,000 from Charly and the Liberty and Loyalty Foundation. he event was broadcast live on the Cowboy Channel live from Cowtown Coliseum in Fort Worth.
