

In 2019 Melissa established South Texas Mounted Search and Rescue. Riding Cooper and deploying a cadaver dog, she is a mounted human remains detection team.


We look forward watching Melissa and Cooper's success continue to unfold. If you are interested in following their story, you can find them on Instagram with the handle ecooperthemustang

Eric's goal was to get Dunkin trained to be a saddle mule but despite Eric's best efforts, Dunkin was having no part of being ridden. However, Dunkin is an exceptional pack mule and was used by Eric on a number of pack trips.

Instead of keeping Dunkin on as a pack mule, Eric found someone that would benefit from the mule's packing ability. Eric homed Dunkin with a father and son who like spending time in the backcountry together. The son had been injured in an auto accident and requires a wheel chair. Dunkin' now makes it possible for them to get into the mountains!

Jacob served in the United States Marine Corps until 2017 when he was medically retired. While working on a farm in western Illinois, he learned that one thing he really enjoyed was checking cattle on horseback. Jacob applied and was approved to receive a horse by Charlie Five in 2018.

In January 2019 we were able to pair Jacob with his new horse, Midnight, through our friends Brad and Kristin Ochs of Ochs Spirit Equine.

Jacob and Midnight have spent lots of hours together checking pastures, gathering, dragging calves and just enjoying trails near his home.

Jacob has been working diligently on establishing his own organization where he will give Veterans and First Responders a place to learn horsemanship and benefit from working with equines. He has named his organization Heroes Ranch.



This past year Jeremy set the goal to present the American Flag at rodeos as a way to honor the men and women who have sacrificed and continue to sacrifice so much so that we may be free. He also recognized that by setting a goal with his horses, he has a direction when training them.

In July, Jeremy was slated to present the flag for the first time at the Ski-Hi Stampede Rodeo in Monte Vista, Colorado. After months of training his horse to carry the flag, Ol' Dollar spooked and bolted just minutes before the presentation. In an effort to avert injury, Jeremy bailed off the horse just before it ran into the side of a trailer.

Ol' Dollar sustained some lacerations, but nothing too serious and has made a full recovery. Jeremy was transported to the hospital by ambulance and has been recovering from three fractured vertebrae. "I'm fortunate that it isn't something that will keep me out of the saddle."

Jeremy is nearly recovered and is slowly working on achieving his goal of presenting the flag at rodeos.

The Journey Home Project has continued to be of incredible support to Charlie Five. The organization, founded by Charlie Daniels, provided a grant and allowed us to visit the Journey Home team during a trip to Las Vegas for the NFR.

We have continued to expand our reach into various equine assisted therapy programs across the country to let them know who we are and to send participants our way.

Developed plans for community outreach program pilot that will officially launch in 2020.

Increased Facebook following from 1,705 followers to 1,870 and increased Instagram following from 760 to 877 followers.

The organization received generous grants from the Gold Star Mothers and Cowboy Hall of Famer, Sharon Camarillo to help support our mission.




