# Bladder Cancer & Patella Screening Clinic Set

Pending approval of STCA grant application, the Washington State Scottish Terrier Club will hold a Bladder Cancer Screening Clinic on Saturday, January 31<sup>st</sup>.

Screenings will be conducted by Dr. Jessica Wilcock. Evergreen Veterinary Hospital, 14423 124<sup>th</sup> Avenue NE, Kirkland, WA 98034, have offered the use of their facilities for the clinic. Appointments will begin at 10 a.m. and continue until all registered dogs have been screened.

Scotties must be 5 years of age or older to qualify for the testing. The last time a screening was conducted one Scottish Terrier was identified with bladder cancer. The testing identified the disease and helped to prolong the dog's life. See the attached flyer for more information.

# Required and Optional Health Tests for Scottish Terriers

The Scottish Terrier Club of America suggests the following health tests for Scottish Terriers. If required and optional tests are conducted, your Scottish Terrier can become CHIC certified by the Canine Health Information Center (CHIC), a database for dog health records,

To become CHIC certified, a Scottish Terrier is required to be tested for Von Willebrand's Disease (VWD Type III) and Cranial Mandibular Osteopathy (CMO) and patella luxation. You then must choose one of the following tests (Thyroid, Eyes, Serum Bile Acid, Kidney Screen or Leg-Calve Perthes. The least expensive option is to have an eye examination conducted by a certified veterinarian at a dog show for a minimum cost. It is recommended that these tests be conducted prior to breeding your Scottish Terrier or using your male at stud.

<b>Von Willebrand's Disease</b>	DNA-based vWD test from an approved lab; results registered with the Orthopedic Foundation for Animals
<b>Cranial Mandibular Osteopathy (CMO)</b>	DNA test from an approved lab with results registered with OFA.
<b>Patella Luxation</b>	Veterinary Evaluation of Patellar Luxation with results registered with OFA. Form is completed by your veterinarian who manually manipulates the patella.
<b>Optional Tests for Scottish Terriers (Choose One)</b>	
 <b>Health Elective</b>	One of the Following:
	<b>Autoimmune Thyroiditis.</b> Evaluation from an approved Lab with results registered with OFA. Ideally should be done repeatedly over time.
	<b>ACVO Eye Examination.</b> Results registered with OFA. Often offered at dog shows for a reduced/reasonable price.
	<b>Serum Bile Acid Test.</b> Evaluation from approved lab and results registered with OFA. A first step test to deduce whether a puppy is likely to liver shunt.
	<b>Kidney Screen (Urine Protein:Creatine Ratio).</b> Evaluation from an approved lab and results registered with the OFA.
	<b>Leg-Calve-Perthes.</b> Radiographs submitted to OFA for evaluation.

# Screening for Bladder Cancer: Why Is It Important?

The Health Trust Fund of the STCA continues to offer grants to clubs for holding a bladder screening clinic for members, friends, and other Scottie owners in the area. This is a great opportunity to put into action what we should all be doing with our Scotties once they reach the age of 5 years: Screen at least yearly for bladder cancer with an ultrasound exam. The earlier we can detect any abnormality in our dogs' bladders, the sooner we can get a diagnosis and start them on more effective therapy. Whichever therapy we choose, from NSAIDs or chemotherapy or alternative medicines, supplements and supportive diets, the sooner the better.

Why is this true? Why does early diagnosis translate to much more successful outcomes in our Scotties?

There is a wealth of compelling evidence that treating cancer earlier in its course is more successful than treating it when it is more advanced.

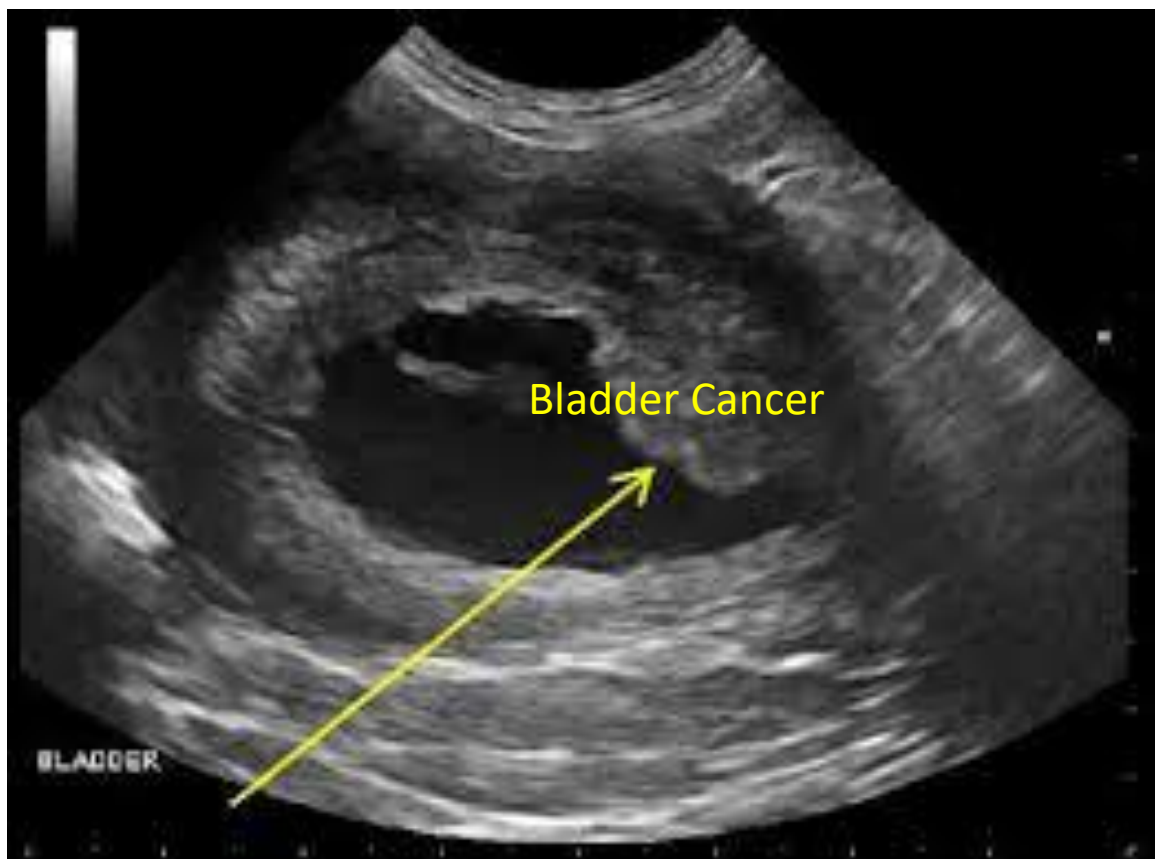
- Genetic complexity: Early-stage cancer is much less genetically complex than later in its course. As a tumor grows, it changes in complexity and mutates and creates more genetic resistance to various therapies. This leads to failure of the drug. The earlier any therapy can get to a tumor, the more effective it will be.
- Immune compromise: Early in the course of cancer, the dog's immune system is stronger, and more capable of controlling runaway growth of cancer cells. Over time, as the undetected cancer grows unchecked, the immune system gets worn down and used up. This exhaustion of the immune system is a serious result of diagnosing cancer later in its course, and it robs the body of a major weapon of defense. Early detection allows us to provide essential immune support.
- Blood supply: Early in its development, a tumor is fairly well organized with structure and blood vessels that almost mimic normal cell growth. However, over time, the tumor becomes more and more abnormal with erratic behavior, runaway growth, and abnormal, gnarly blood vessels that are not able to deliver the cancer fighting drugs to the tumor. This translates again to failure of the therapy.
- General health: Early in the course of cancer, the patient, both human and dog, is stronger, healthier and better able to tolerate therapies. The quality of life is good, and starting the therapy before there are major symptoms, metastasis, and the involvement of other organs can help to prolong that quality of life.

Bladder cancer (TCC or Urothelial Carcinoma) in our Scotties is a serious health problem. We need to beat this devastating disease to the punch and detect it as early as we possibly can. Don't wait until your Scottie is straining to urinate, passing bloody urine, and acting uncomfortable. By then, it may be too late to do much good at all. The added bonus of these screening exams is finding other potential health problems in the prostate, kidney, and even gall bladder of our Scotties.

The best plan is to form a screening clinic committee in your club and organize the details. The HTF can help with recommendations, protocols and paperwork. Don't miss this opportunity to have your Scotties screened with a short and painless procedure, and plan to have your Scotties screened starting at 5 years of age from now on!

# Facts About Bladder Cancer in Scotties

1. Scottish Terriers are 20 times more likely than ANY other breed of purebred dogs to get bladder cancer.
2. Female Scottish Terriers are more likely than males to get bladder cancer.
3. Invasive transitional cell carcinoma (TCC) is the most common type of bladder cancer in Scottish Terriers.
4. A 2024 study found that Scottish terriers exposed to cigarette smoke (in the air or licking it off clothing) were 6 times more likely to develop bladder cancer than those who were not exposed.
5. Scotties who consume cruciferous vegetables (green leafy, broccoli, cauliflower, cabbage, kale, Brussels sprouts, collards, etc.) at least 3 times a week are less likely to get TCC cancer in their bladder.
6. An association has been found between exposure to lawn herbicides and pesticides and the risk of TCC in Scottish Terriers.
