Breeder, AKC Judge and active dog club member, Fred Stephens passed away on Thursday, October 19, 2023 at the age of 86. Fred and his wife Christine began showing Scottish Terriers around 1966. Under the kennel prefix of Glenby, they have produced to date more than 150

American Kennel Club champions.

Since the 1970sFred has had a distinguished career as an American Kennel Club (AKC) judge. He was approved to judge the Terrier, Toy and Nonsporting groups, Best in Show and Junior Showmanship. He judged the Scottish Terrier Club of America's national specialty twice as well as most regional Scottish Terrier specialties and numerous terrier group shows.

At the Scottish Terrier Club of America's annual meeting this October, Fred and Standard revision committee and presented numerous seminars on Scottish Terriers. He was a lifetime honorary member of the Washington State Scottish Terrier Club (WSSTC) and has been a member of the Scottish Terrier Club of California. He was actively involved in Tualatin Kennel Club and the Oregon Terrier Association. On show weekends, he could be seen ringside supporting his wife Christine who took on the responsibility to show the Glenby Clan. He also worked as a ring steward at many events. The California Scottish Terrier Club, and the Washington State Scottish Terrier Club. Fred held officer and show positions in most clubs he was involved with.

A celebration of life will be held at a later date.

Scottie DNA Collection Program And Picnic Highly Successful

At its September picnic, members of the Washington State Scottish Terrier contributed more than 25 DNA samples to the Scottish Terrier Club of America's Health Trust's data base. DNA kits were also sent to club members who could not attend the event in person. The WSSTC was awarded a \$500 grant by the STCA's Health Trust to hold the DNA collection event. According to Health Trust Chairman Marcia Dawson, this was a very successful event with more DNA samples collected many more samples than most other regional clubs.

The HTF has established a Scottish Terrier DNA Bank with RESERO GENOMICS in Salt Lake City, UT for the preservation of Scottie DNA, to monitor genetic and genomic data of the breed, and to provide high quality DNA samples for future research and DNA testing to benefit all Scotties. This one of a kind DNA Bank provides a unique opportunity for all Scottie owners to contribute to the body of Scottie genetic data while maintaining control of their own dogs' DNA.

If you would like your Scottie's DNA added to the database, it is not too late. Contact Dr. Marcia Dawson at hijinksscot@gmail.com and she will send you a kit. You take the kit to your veterinarian and she will draw a small sample. You return the kit and questionnaire. That's all there is to do. You'll be helping future generations of Scotties.

Dog Flu: Symptoms, Treatment, Prevention for Canine Influenza

It's the season for Canine Dog Flue. Dog flu, or canine influenza virus, is an infectious respiratory disease caused by an influenza A virus, similar to the viral strains that cause influenza in people. The <u>canine influenza virus</u> can make your pup uncomfortably sick, and cause you both a lot of stress and time spent at the vet's office. There are two known strains of dog flu found in the United States:



- H3N8
- H3N2

Like human forms of influenza, dog flu is airborne. Respiratory secretions escape into the environment in the form of coughing, barking, and sneezing, where they are then inhaled by a new canine host. The dog flu also spreads through contaminated objects and environments, like water bowls, collars, and kennel surfaces, or through contact with people who have had direct contact with an infected dog.

Crowded areas like kennels, grooming parlors, daycare centers, and dog parks are breeding grounds for diseases like canine influenza. The close proximity of the dogs means that a barking, coughing, or sneezing dog can easily infect canines around them. This is made more dangerous by the fact that dogs are most contagious during the incubation period before they start exhibiting symptoms.

How Long Are Dogs Infected with Dog Flu Contagious?

The incubation period of canine influenza is approximately 2 to 4 days from initial exposure to the dog flu virus. Dogs with H3N8 remain contagious for up to 10 days after exposure, and dogs with H3N2 remain contagious for up to 26 days. Almost all dogs that come into contact with the disease will contract it, but about 20-25% of dogs that are infected are asymptomatic and can still spread the disease.

Symptoms of Dog Flu

There are several symptoms all owners should be aware of. Dog flu cases range from mild to severe and, unlike human influenzas, are not seasonal. Keep an eye out for the following symptoms year-round:

Coughing (both moist and dry)

Nasal discharge

- coughing (both moist and dry)
- Sneezing

- Fever
- Runny eyes

- Lethargy
- Difficulty breathing

Most cases of dog flu are mild, but severe cases can occur. In those instances, dogs can develop pneumonia, difficulty breathing, and a high fever. Luckily, the mortality rate is relatively low, with less than 10% of dog flu cases resulting in fatalities.

Dog Flu Treatments

There is no cure for dog flu. Treatment is supportive. Some dogs may require supportive care, such as fluids, to aid their recovery, as well as nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory medications to reduce fevers. Your vet may prescribe antibiotics to treat secondary bacterial infections.

Both kennel cough and dog flu are highly contagious. Call your vet ahead of time to let her know that your dog is showing symptoms of a respiratory infection. and your vet may request that you keep your dog outside until your appointment time to prevent the risk of transmission. Also, you MUST NOT attend any AKC dog events if you think your dog has Canine Influenza or Kennel Cough.

Preventing Dog Flu

The best way to prevent your dog from contracting dog flu is to keep them away from public places or kennels with recently reported cases. If you come into contact with a dog that you suspect has dog flu or has recently been exposed to it, wash your hands, arms, and clothing before touching your own dog. There also are vaccines available for Canine Flu to use as a preventative measure.
