There has never been a better time to earn a college degree

The **wage gap** for workers with a bachelor's degree and those without has **never been greater.**

Workers with a bachelor's degree earn nearly **TWICE** as much as those with only a high school diploma and **50 percent** more than individuals who have some college or an associate's degree. This adds up to greater than **\$1 million** more over a lifetime. A bachelor's degree matters now more than ever.

What TYPES OF COLLEGES are there?

PUBLIC COLLEGES & UNIVERSITIES

Public colleges are supported by public money, predominantly state government and taxpayers. In Michigan there are 15 state universities and 28 public community colleges, some with multiple regional campuses.

INDEPENDENT COLLEGES & UNIVERSITIES

Independent colleges and universities receive no public money, relying on donors, private funding sources, tuition, and fees. Each has its own unique mission to serve students. There are 24 independent colleges and universities in Michigan that are MICU members, all profiled in this guidebook.



Why choose an **INDEPENDENT** college or university?



PERSONAL ATTENTION

That's what Michigan's independent colleges and universities are all about - small class sizes, high quality academics, opportunities for involvement and leadership in campus activities, and strong learning and living communities.

GENEROUS FINANCIAL AID

90 percent of students at Michigan's independent colleges and universities receive financial assistance directly from the colleges themselves, or through state and federal grants.

HIGH GRADUATION RATES

Students at Michigan's independent colleges and universities have the state's highest fouryear, on-time graduation rates.

SUCCESS AFTER GRADUATION

Graduates enjoy high placement rates into careers and graduate schools. They continue to do well because their education gives them the critical skills that employers cite as keys to success - critical thinking, problem solving, communication, teamwork, creativity, and the capacity for life-long learning

Can I AFFORD COLLEGE?

Applying for scholarships and other financial aid options can help with college affordability.



Don't take yourself out of the game by ruling out a particular college or university based solely on the published tuition rate.

The price of college can often intimidate students and families, and, while the overall tuition, or "sticker price," of an independent college or university can be higher than that of a community college or public one, once all types of financial aid are factored in, the actual "outof-pocket" expense is often about the same or sometimes even less at an independent, nonprofit college or university.

KNOW the types of FINANCIAL AID?

Financial aid is money to help pay for college and comes in four different types including: grants, loans, scholarships, and work-study.

Grants and scholarships are Grants and scholarships are types of financial aid that do not need to be paid back. Scholarships are typically merit-based and will have qualification requirements like test scores or GPA. Loans are borrowed money that must be paid back. Work-study is a program where students can work part-time at their institution to help pay for college expenses.



STATE OF MICHIGAN PROGRAMS

Michigan Tuition Grant

The Michigan Tuition Grant awards up to \$3,000 per student per year and is only for students who have financial need and attend a private, nonprofit college or university in Michigan.

Michigan Achievement Scholarship

The Michigan Achievement Scholarship is the largest scholarship program in Michigan offering up to \$4,000 per student per year for up to 5 years. Students must file a FAFSA to see if they qualify.

Other State Programs

The state of Michigan has programs to assist Michigan students; however, the main state aid program for students attending an independent college or university is the Michigan Tuition Grant. A student may be eligible to receive up to \$2,400 in the Michigan Tuition Grant. State aid programs and information can be found at <u>www.michigan.gov/mistudentaid.</u>

INSTITUTIONAL AID

Independent colleges and universities in Michigan regularly award students grants and/or scholarships based on financial need, as well as academic and other special abilities, such as fine arts or athletics. The average grant/scholarship amount at an independent college or university in Michigan is \$15,000 on top of state of Michigan and federal aid programs.

FEDERAL PROGRAMS

Pell is the largest federal grant program and can be used at institutions across Michigan. During the 2023-2024 academic year the maximum Pell Grant award is \$7,395.

OTHER SCHOLARSHIPS AND GRANTS

You might live in a Promise Zone, which provide funds for students in your community to attend college. There are countless other private scholarships and grants you could be eligible for or apply for. Talk to your guidance counselor, community foundation, college access network about options.

How do I apply for **FINANCIAL AID?**

The first step in the financial aid process is completing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid, commonly referred to as the FAFSA.

The FAFSA helps with determining eligibility for federal financial aid. It is also a requirement for consideration of state aid programs and some institutional and community aid programs. A student should apply, even if they think they may not qualify for financial aid. The sooner you apply for financial aid, the better. Some programs are on a first come-first served basis.

The FAFSA should be completed after October 1 of a student's high school senior year, and each year thereafter when applying for aid. This can be done online at <u>fafsa.gov.</u>

Priority consideration for state programs is given to Michigan students who apply on or before May 1.

Financial aid can be meritbased, need-based, or both.

Merit-based programs assist students who excel in academics, sports, or other activities. It recognizes students for their merit. Need-based programs assist students who demonstrate financial need.





In addition to completing the FAFSA, students should also apply for scholarships. When searching for scholarships, it is recommended that students:

- Check with prospective college or university (Admissions or Financial Aid office depending on institution). There is usually a separate scholarship application process.
- Research local community groups. Guidance counselors often have a listing of community aid programs.
- Search online. Searching and applying for scholarships should always be free. It is not recommended that you pay for services.
- Be aware of deadlines and set reminders to be sure you apply on time!

The **TRUTH** about student debt.



Public discourse is focused on student debt with discussions about crippling amounts of unpayable debt for students. Only about 50% of students even take loans to pay for college. For those who do take loans, the amounts are not as high as you might think.

This is far from the truth.

Graduates from Michigan's independent colleges and universities have an average of \$28,000 in student loans to pay. This is about the same amount debt as a loan for a midsized car, hardly the crippling amount of debt heard about on the news.

Not only are loan amounts low, but graduates of Michigan's independent colleges and universities pay their loans and have the lowest default rate in the state (just 5%).



Run the **NUMBERS**

It's surprising to many families to learn that Michigan's independent colleges and universities — often with their higher sticker prices provide students with not only better academic outcomes, but also better economic return on investment.

Michigan's independent colleges and universities provide generous grants and scholarships for students, offsetting tuition and reducing costs. The average institutional scholarship is \$14,025.


