FREE COLLEGE IN MICHIGAN!

Across the state, there are more ways to get free college for most income levels than ever. Here are the major pathways to free college that have had recent changes:

Michigan Community College Guarantee

Income restrictions: No

Available at: Community Colleges in Michigan

MI Residency requirement: July 1 previous to graduation in MI **Offer:** Free tuition for full-time student who start college within 15 months of graduation; Requires full-time study. **Note:** Will use Promise, Pell and TIP funding first. FAFSA required.

<u>Michigan ReConnect</u>

Income restrictions: No Available at: All community colleges in Michigan MI Residency requirement: Yes

Offer: Covers tuition for residents 25 and older, taking at least 6 credits per semester, all credits must be toward an approved associate degree or certification.

Note: Uses Pell and TIP funding first. Covers for up to first associate degree only (anyone with a previous degree cannot qualify). FAFSA required.

University Tuition Guarantees, Pledges, and Advantages

Income restrictions: Yes--vary by college, usually \$70,000 per household or less, except UofM campuses at \$125,000 or less.

Available at: Ferris State, Central Michigan, Eastern Michigan, Grand Valley State, Michigan State, Northern Michigan, Oakland, Saginaw Valley State, University of Michigan Campuses, Wayne State, Western Michigan, and several private institutions

MI Residency requirement: Yes

Offer: Covers tuition for full-time students who start college within 15 months of graduation; Limits may apply (ex. take fewer than 18 cr.)

Note: Uses Michigan Achievement, Pell, TIP, and all individual scholarship funds first, and then institutions cover the rest. Transfer students are typically not eligible. Some schools require Michigan Achievement eligibility. FAFSA required.

60 by 30--College Credentials Matter!

The newest Hot Jobs by 2032 information continues to support that college credentials, and especially the bachelors degree-level credential, are highly valued in job market projections. Currently, 66% of available jobs in Michigan require a bachelor's degree. By 2031, 69% of jobs in Michigan will require a post-secondary certification, associate or bachelor's degree. In addition, by 2032, 84%, or 42 of the 50 "Hot Jobs," which are jobs that pay a high wage (\$65K or more) in Michigan, and will be in high demand, will require a bachelor's degree (up from previous data of 74% by 2030) (Michigan.gov, 2024). While Mason County, the state, and nation, saw an uptick in college enrollment in 2025, the reality remains that only about half of students who start college, graduate.



Despite the existing graduation trend, new funding streams provide hope that more of Michigan's students can both pursue and complete degrees. Guarantees for tuition-free pathways to college exist for nearly all ages of college students. Cost is the leading reason why students do not start college, and remains the leading factor contributing to students stopping out and not returning (Gallup News, 2024). However, with cost minimized for low and middle-income families by recent state aid efforts, other factors, like perceptions of cost and of college being not worth time or effort, can be a new focus for communities to bridge the gap to 60% by 2030.

Why that focus? Research continues to demonstrate that high pay, job demand, and job security are tied to work in knowledge economy careers that require post-secondary education (MiFutureInc., 2024). Our message in Mason County should be that a post-secondary credential is not only worth it, it's also affordable--The most affordable that is has been in several decades! While Mason County itself may not need 60% of residents to hold a credential by 2030, the reality is that many of the young people who grow up here, will live elsewhere across the state and nation in adulthood. This means that locally, we have a responsibility to all students to promote earning a post-secondary credential for their future success and well-being. Please help by sharing about Michigan's needs for more degrees, and encouraging employees, students, and neighbors to consider how a college credential could make a difference in their lives.

LHS and MCE Students Visit Area Universities

Local students and educators took time out of their busy schedules to visit area universities, some students seeing a university for the very first time! In November, Mason County Eastern's English teacher, Dena Thurston, a proud Ferris alumna, took the MCE class of 2026, this year's juniors, for a tour of Ferris State University in Big Rapids. On a separate trip, a group of 15 seniors from Ludington High School also visited Ferris in November, headed up by their Independent Living teacher, Jen Rowe, and accompanied by another chaperone, Tess O'Neal, the LHS post-secondary advisor.

Current Ferris students led each tour. Students on the tour got to see the newest student housing, North Hall, which is more like modern apartment living, compared with the traditional "dorm" style halls, which students also walked through. Students explored the "Center for Virtual Learning," a state-of-the-art facility for all things technology on campus. Finally, students enjoyed an array of great food (and essentially, a mountain of desserts) at the "all-you-can-eat" dining experience at "The Rock," before returning home. The LHS group extended their tour to also visit Central Michigan University in Mount Pleasant. They were excited to see college life first-hand and asked many great questions. Thanks to generous support of the Mason College Access Network (CAN), students on both trips were able to enjoy snacks, drinks and prizes on the long bus ride! "We look forward to more visits in the future," shared Ms. Rowe, who hopes to grow the opportunity for more students to connect to college.

Since nearly 70% of high-demand, livable wage careers in Michigan will require a post-secondary credential by 2030, having a path to a career-related credential after high school is now an essential tool for future success. 

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Promise by the Numbers

Key takeaways:

- Enrollment is up for the class of 2025, both Mason County and across the country! Fall 2025 was our biggest incoming class ever, with 105 students starting at WSCC as first-time college students and using the Promise.
- The Promise Is Relevant! Even though Michigan Community College Guarantee funds are available to cover full-time students, nearly half of Promise scholars use the Promise as part-time students, for books, and for tuition (Michigan Guarantee uses Promise funding first).
- The Promise saves more than meets the eye! The Promise has awarded over \$2M since 2018. Based on the average cost of tuition in Michigan, if Promise Scholars had attended a state university for the same number of credits, it would cost an equivalent of \$12.7M for tuition alone!
