
# TRace Timing & Start



- 5-Minute Gun: Engines warm up and drivers make timing runs.
- 1-Minute Gun: Drivers position themselves for the flying start.
  - \* Drivers must hold their lanes, typically near the exit of turn one.
- Flying Start: Aim to hit the starting line at full speed as the clock hits zero.

### The Flying Start

- Up to 12 boats race side by side across the starting line at full speed.
- The course is marked with:
  - o Large orange buoys for turns.
  - o Two checkered buoys marking the start line.
- Drivers must time their approach to cross the start line exactly when the countdown clock hits zero.
- Each driver must maintain their assigned lane through the front straightaway and into Turn 1.
- Spectators should aim for a clear view of Turn 1 to catch the best moments of the race.

#### Where to Sit

- Best view: Straightaway near the starting line and Turn 1.
  - o \* Turn 1 is where the most intense and exciting action typically occurs.
- Consider shade, sun position, and wind direction for comfort.
- Visit vendor booths during downtime!

### **Spectator Etiquette**


- Be friendly and respectful.
- No profanity, throwing objects, or disruptive behavior.
- Keep children safe and away from the water's edge

# **Understanding the Course**

Course Length	Laps
1 2/3 Mile	3
1 1/2 Mile	4
1 Mile	5


- Just like in other motorsports, the inside lane is the most sought-after, as it offers the **shortest path around the course**.
- While the race distance is 5 miles, the course layout and size may vary.
- All inside buoys must be passed on the driver's left side.
- If a driver jumps the start, they may not be notified until during or after the race.
- No 1-minute penalty is issued for jumping the start.

## Flag Signals (APBA)



- **Green Flag (Pre-Start):** Displayed between the 5-minute and 1-minute marks before the race begins.
- **Green Flag (During Race):** Displayed while the race is in progress, except during the final lap.
- White Flag (Pre-Start): Displayed between the 1-minute mark and the official race start.
- White Flag (Final Lap): Displayed when the race leader begins the last lap.
- Red Flag: All racers must stop immediately. Stay alert and watch for further instructions.
- Blue and White Flag: Caution—there are issues on the racecourse. Racers should proceed carefully.
- Black Flag: The course is closed. All racers must return to the pits.
- Checkered Flag: Race Finish

### Anatomy of a Hydroplane



- **Key parts:** Engine cowling, cockpit, canard, sponsons, skid fin, rudder, propeller, shaft, air trap.
- Boats use a 3-point suspension: two sponsons and the propeller.

### **Inboard Hydroplane Classes**

- Boats labeled by class (e.g., Y, T, S, A, E, NM, GNH, GP).
  - Y 1.0 Liter Modified
  - T 1.5 Liter Stock
  - S 2.5 Liter Stock
  - A 2.5 Liter Modified
  - E 5.0 Liter Stock
  - o NM National Modified (6.0 Liter Modified)
  - o GNH Grand National Hydro (7.0 Liter Stock)
  - o GP Grand Prix
- Classes vary by engine type, speed, and boat dimensions. Check our 'Teams'
- Speeds range from 95 MPH (T class) to 160+ MPH (GP class).
