



Access Through the Veil

The Finished Work of Christ and the Invitation to Communion

“Therefore, brothers and sisters, since we have confidence to enter the Most Holy Place by the blood of Jesus... let us draw near to God with a sincere heart and with the full assurance that faith brings...” (Hebrews 10:19, 22 NIV)

The veil has been torn. The sacrifices have ceased. The separation is over.

Through His incarnation, crucifixion, resurrection, and ascension, Jesus Christ has accomplished what no ritual, priesthood, or human striving ever could: complete, unbroken access to God. This is not a distant theological concept—it is a present spiritual reality. We are no longer outside looking in. We are welcomed in, called near, and invited to dwell.

The invitation is not merely to believe in Christ’s finished work—it is to enter it.

I. The Veil Removed – From Exclusion to Embrace

The Call to Enter with Confidence

- Under the Old Covenant, access to God’s presence was restricted. The Most Holy Place was entered once a year by one high priest (Hebrews 9:7).
- But Christ, our Great High Priest, entered once for all time with His own blood, securing eternal redemption (Hebrews 9:12).
- The veil that once symbolized separation has been torn (Mark 15:38)—revealing that God no longer dwells behind curtains, but within hearts.

Spiritual Parallel: Communion Reclaimed

- What sin fractured, Christ has reconciled.
- What religion obscured, grace has made clear: we can now draw near—not in fear or formality, but in faith and intimacy.
- True spiritual renewal begins when we stop acting like visitors and start living like sons and daughters.

Reflection Question: Am I living as one who is outside the veil, or am I boldly drawing near in the assurance of Christ’s finished work?

II. The New and Living Way – From Shadow to Substance

The Call to Ongoing Fellowship

“By a new and living way opened for us through the curtain, that is, his body...” (Hebrews 10:20 NIV)

- Jesus did not just provide a moment of access—He became the way of access.
 - His body, broken on the cross, became the curtain torn open for all time.
 - Communion with God is no longer a periodic encounter—it is a living pathway, sustained by the presence of the Holy Spirit.
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Spiritual Parallel: Living From Presence, Not Toward It

- Many believers still live as though they must earn what has already been provided by Christ.
- However, Hebrews teaches us to live in the reality of access, not in the hope of it.
- This access shapes every part of our lives—our prayer, leadership, ministry, and mindset.

Reflection Question: Am I striving for what God has already made available in Christ?

III. Let Us Draw Near – The Invitation to Daily Encounter

The Call to Proximity and Participation

Hebrews 10:22–25 provides three sacred exhortations in light of access:

1. **Draw near to God with a sincere heart.**
 2. **Hold steadfastly to hope.**
 3. **Spur one another on in love and good deeds.**
- Access is not theoretical—it is relational.
 - It invites spiritual formation, communal encouragement, and personal transformation.
 - Through Christ, the door is open—and remains open—for communion, growth, and grace.
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Spiritual Parallel: Abiding over Achieving

- Jesus did not die to make us productive—He died to make us whole.
- The fruit of spiritual life flows from abiding in the Vine (John 15:5).
- Wholeness is not found in religious effort, but in resting, receiving, and remaining in divine presence.

Reflection Question: In what ways am I being invited to shift from striving to abiding in God's presence?

IV. The Role of PQ – Cultivating Inner Readiness for Access

While Jesus has secured eternal access, many believers still live in internal exile. Mental saboteurs, emotional clutter, and spiritual doubt often keep people from drawing near—even though the way is open.

PQ creates the space for communion by:

- Identifying and dismantling the internal barriers (Saboteurs) that obscure God's voice.
- Building mental clarity and emotional resilience so that spiritual access becomes a lived reality.
- Reconditioning the mind to rest in assurance, rather than spiral into anxiety or judgment.

As Christian PQ Coaches, we are:

- Helping people realize the veil has already been torn.
 - Guiding them to silence the voices that tell them they are unworthy or unwelcome.
 - Facilitating the mental fitness that makes intimacy sustainable—not occasional.
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V. From Access to Abiding – Living the Transformed Life

The finished work of Christ is not merely about forgiveness—it is about fellowship. We are not invited into a new belief system; we are invited into a new way of being. This is the spiritual journey: to live from union, not distance; from identity, not effort; from love, not fear.

“And where these have been forgiven, sacrifice for sin is no longer necessary.” —Hebrews 10:18
