Luka Lubecki



Our Mission is to educate and screen the general public to determine those at risk for glaucoma and other potentially blinding diseases.

Children's Vision Program

Children do not always know what "normal" vision looks like, and are more likely not to complain of vision problems. However, it is crucial to get your children's eye checked at a very early age. Eye examinations are important for normal vision development and to ensure that the child has good visual acuity they need to perform well in school as well as other activities. The doctor will evaluate the eye for glasses as well as look for potentially blinding diseases such as amblyopia (lazy eye).





Amblyopia (lazy eye) is the leading cause of visual impairment among children. It affects 2 to 3 out of every 100 children and unless it is successfully treated in early childhood it can persist for life. Early diagnosis and treatment, so vital, can help prevent any long-term problems with your child's vision. Amblyopia (lazy eye) can usually be corrected with glasses or contact lenses, eye patches, and sometimes surgery. Occlusion is also a cause of amblyopia. If there is an opacity or clouding of

the front structures of the eye, this can lead to lack of development or the weakening of one eye.

Through our Children's Vision Program we screen the vision of children, free of charge. Along with a free screening, we present a program to train parents, teachers, and childcare providers the signs of amblyopia.

The Eye Model

In 2017, Dr. John Lee designed and introduced an innovative new project filled with promise. Prior to medical training, Dr. Lee was a mechanical engineer for a major construction equipment company.

With the help from a number of companies and Richland Community College's Welding classes, the Foundation constructed a Walk-In Eye Model for the Children's Museum of Illinois. This interactive display, "A Peek Inside," allows visitors to enter the model to learn more about the eye and diseases.





The seven foot diameter model has a four foot opening to allow visitors to enter. It is displayed in the Healthy Habits area of the museum. Both children and the adults that accompany them benefit from this learning experience.



Over the last 5 years, The Midwest Sight Foundation has been able to greatly expand the number of free screenings it has been able to give. In 2018, the Foundation screened over 350 people for glaucoma.

On average, The Midwest Sight Foundation does 1-2 screening sessions a week, all around Illinois. Counties served include: Macon,

Dewitt, DuPage, Sangamon, Coles, Douglas, Cumberland, Logan, Champaign,

Moultrie, and Shelby. More counties are soon to come.


