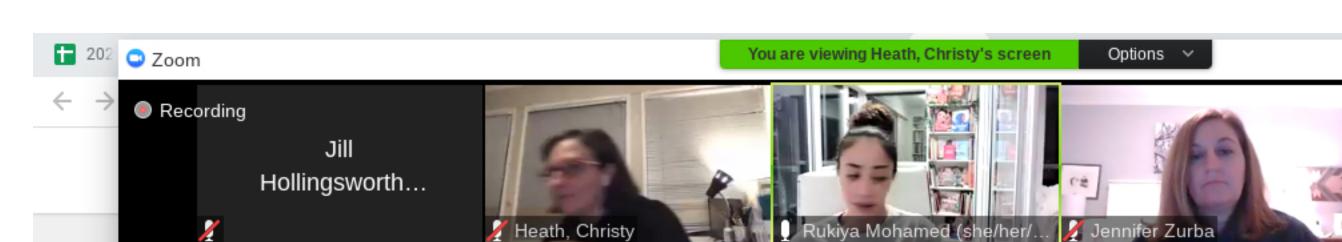












Common Understanding

Race is a social construct. This means that society forms ideas of race based on geographic, historical, political, economic, social and cultural factors, as well as physical traits, even though none of these can legitimately be used to classify groups of people.

Anti-Racism

Anti-racism: is the practice of identifying, challenging, and changing the values, structures and behaviors that perpetuate systemic racism.

Racism

Racism is set of assumptions, opinions, and actions stemming from the belief that one race is inherently superior to another. Racism may be evident in organizational and institutional structures, policies, procedures, and programs, as well as in the attitudes and behaviours of individuals.

Anti-Black Racism

Anti-Black racism: is prejudice, attitudes, beliefs, stereotyping or discrimination that is directed at people of African descent and is rooted in their unique history and experience of enslavement and colonization.

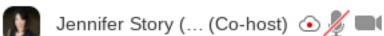

I am thankful for being able to live on such amazing land and safe land which I acknowledge was stolen.

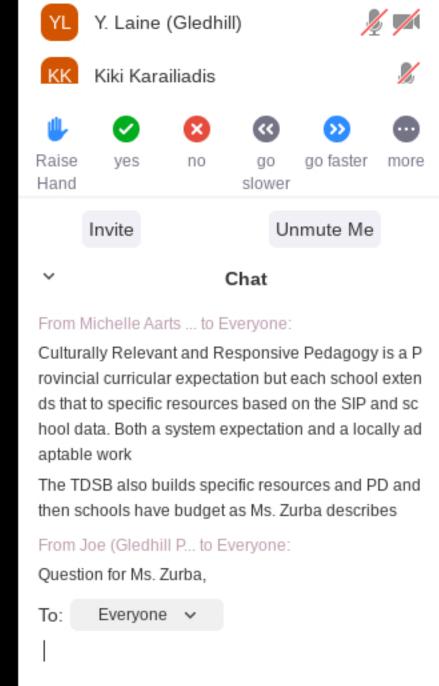
We are hosted on the New credit the Haudinishodee Confederacy and the wendat we also recognize the induring presence of all first Nations, Métis and Inuit peoples.

and colonial present and aim to continually lessen ongoing colonial harms through speaking about them to avoid further erastic of indigenous culture and languages.





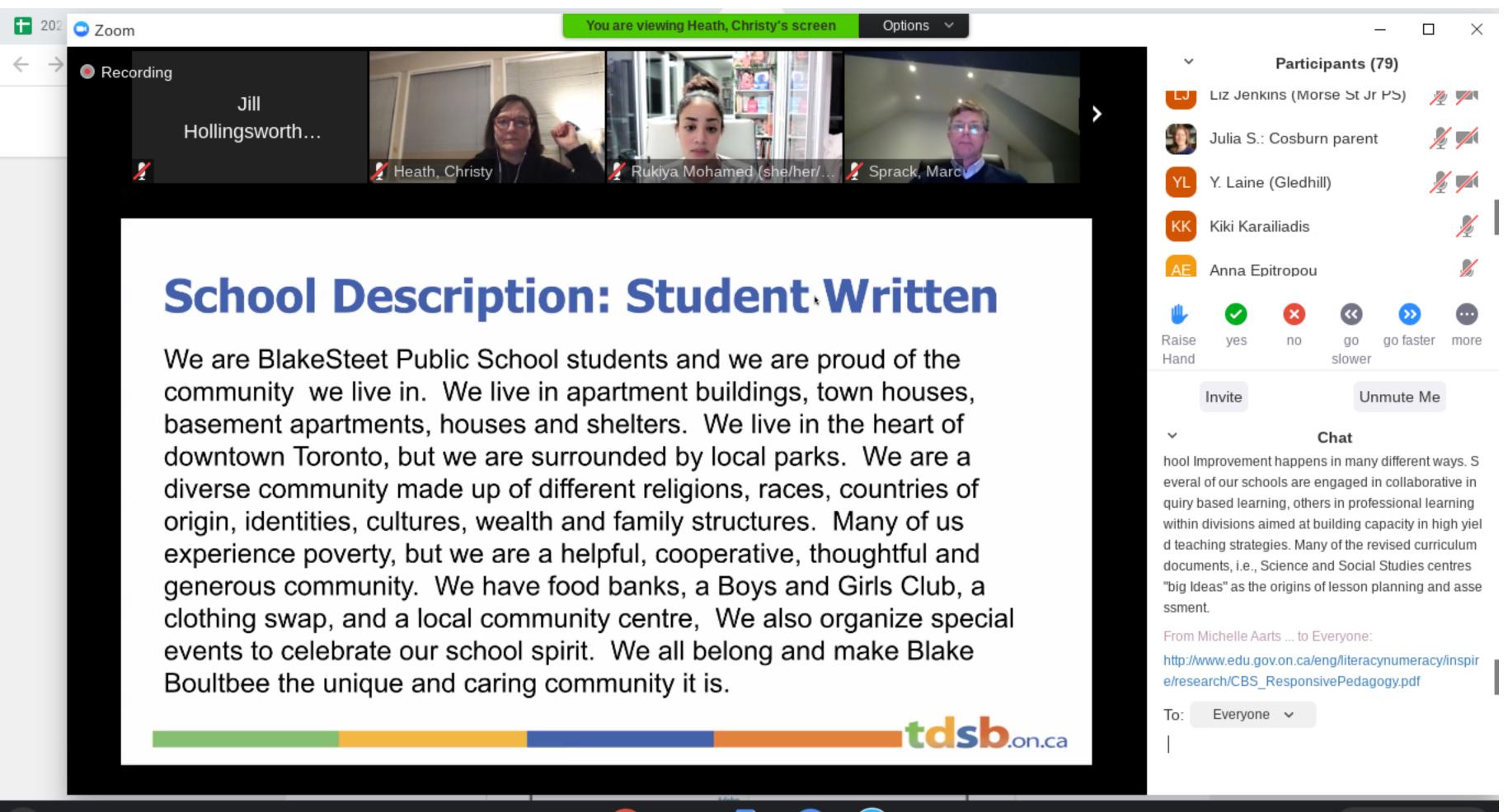












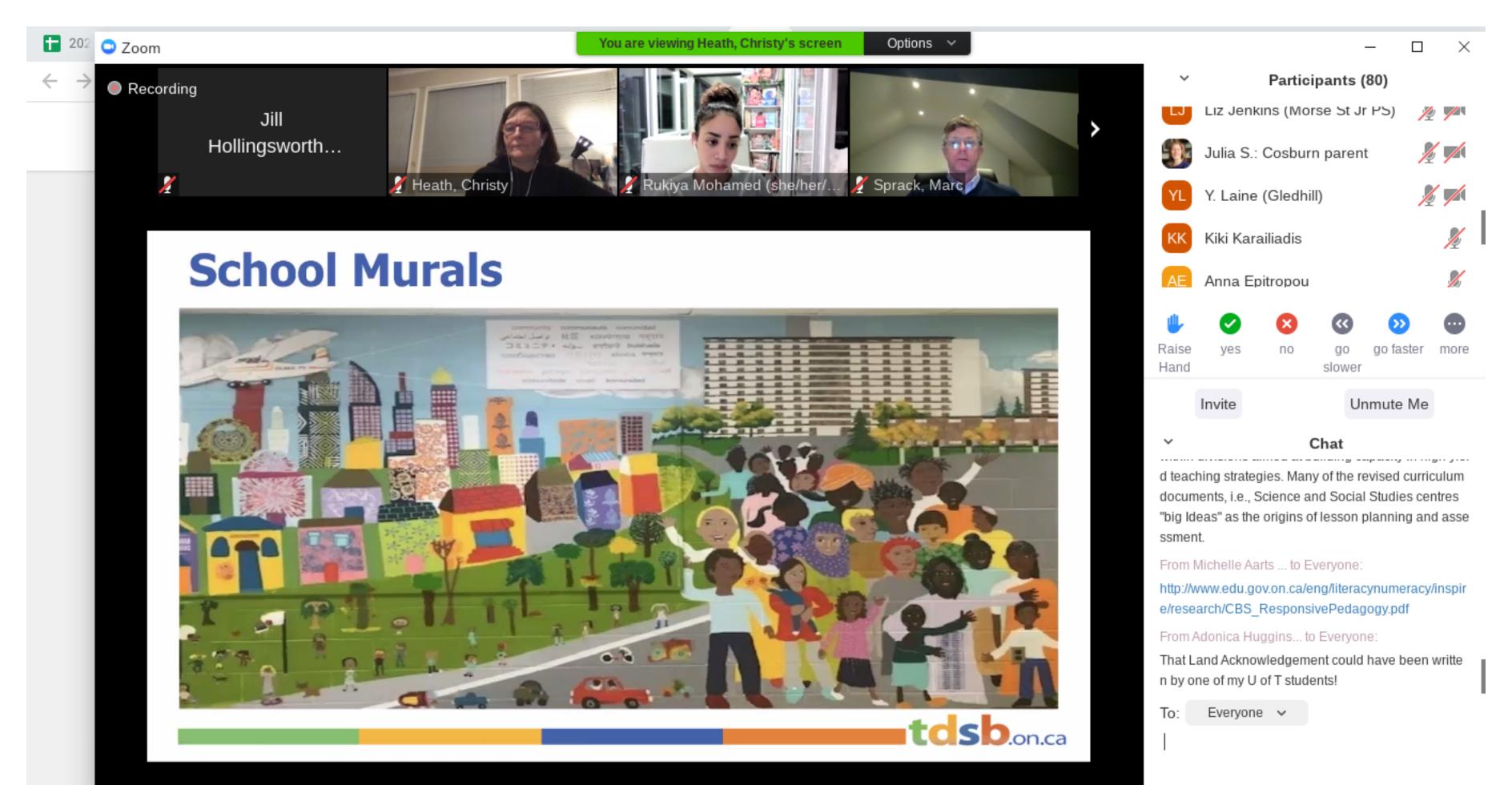


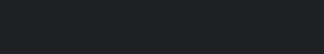














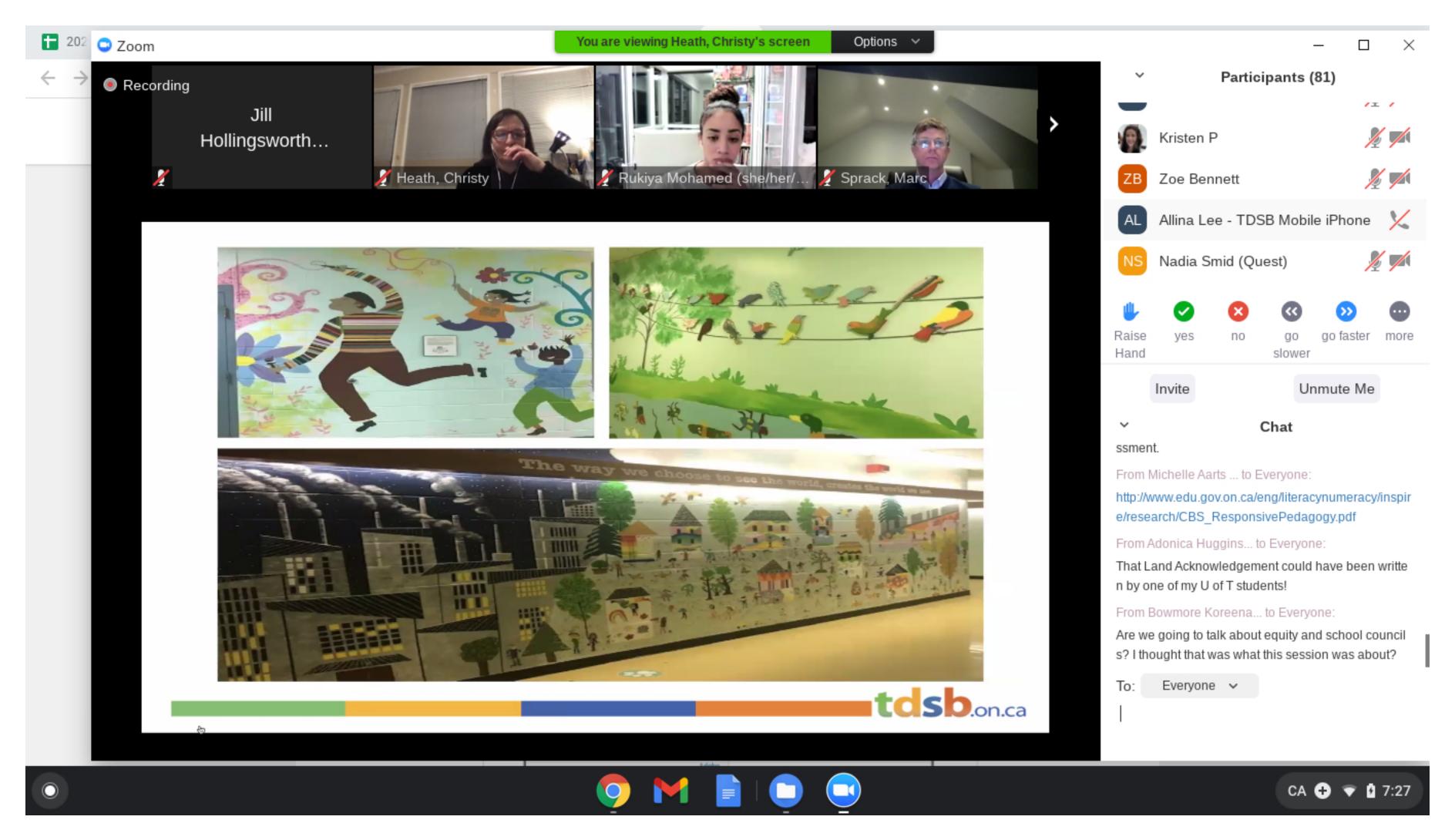






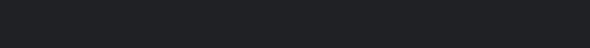


















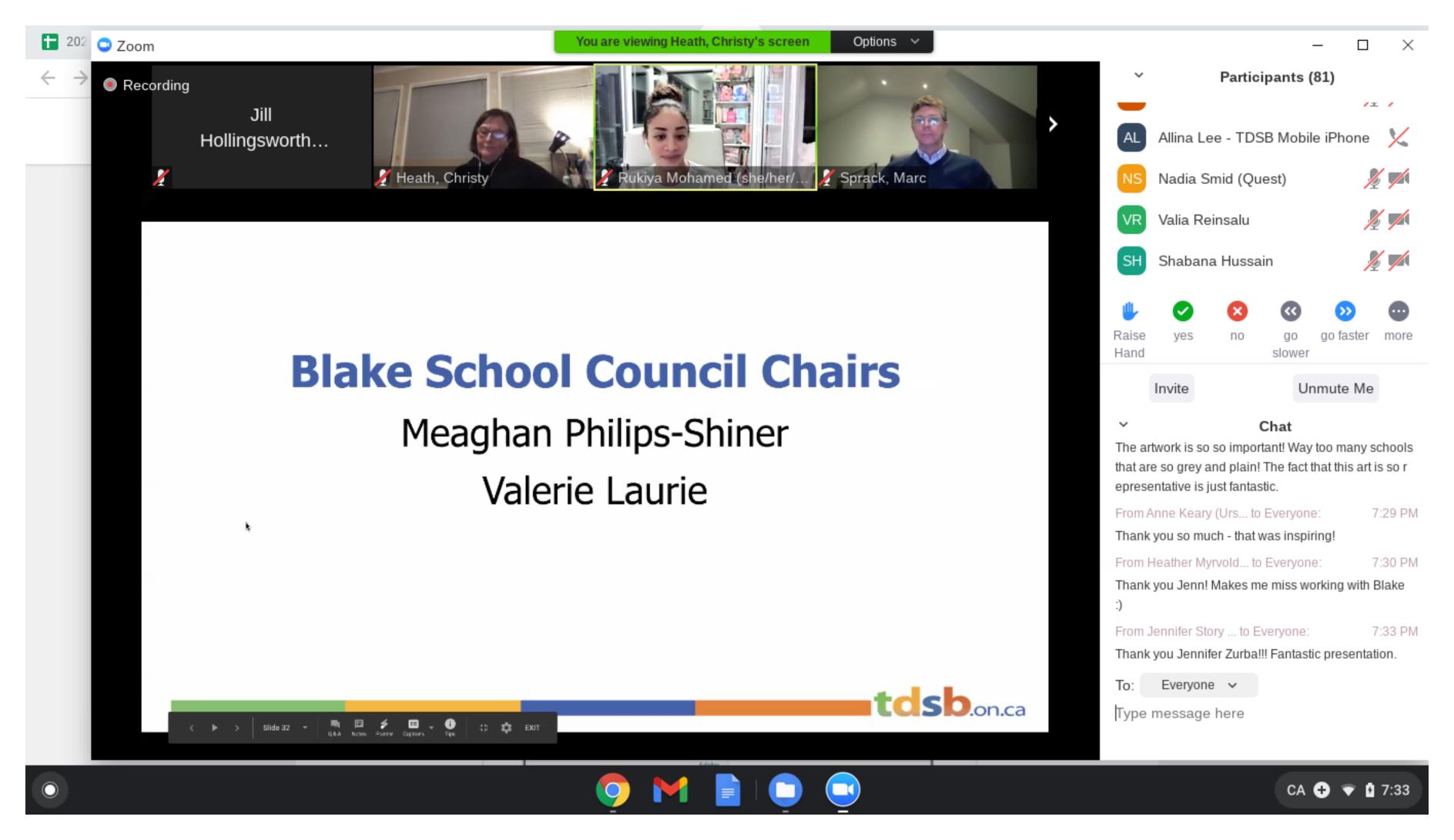


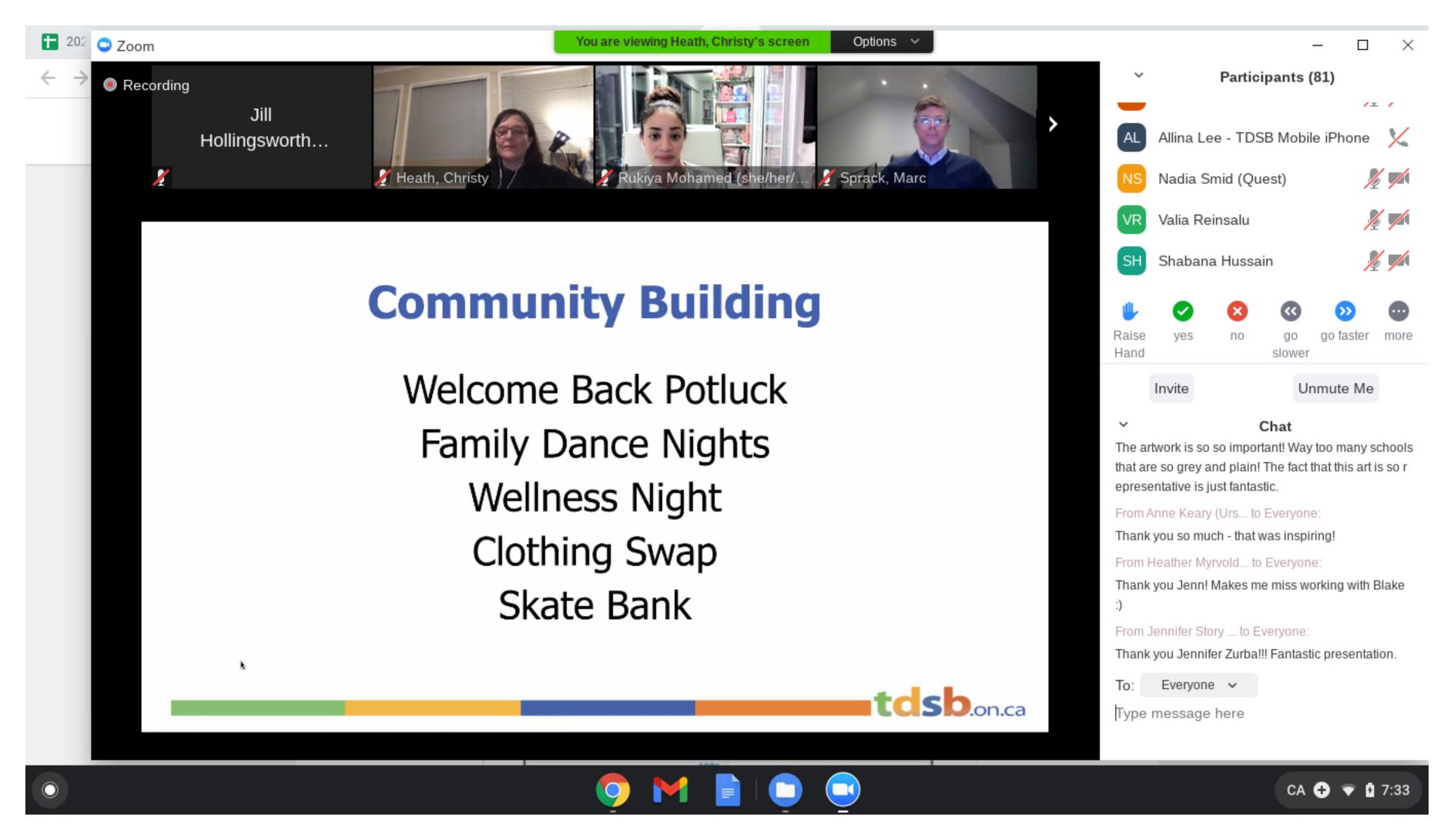




















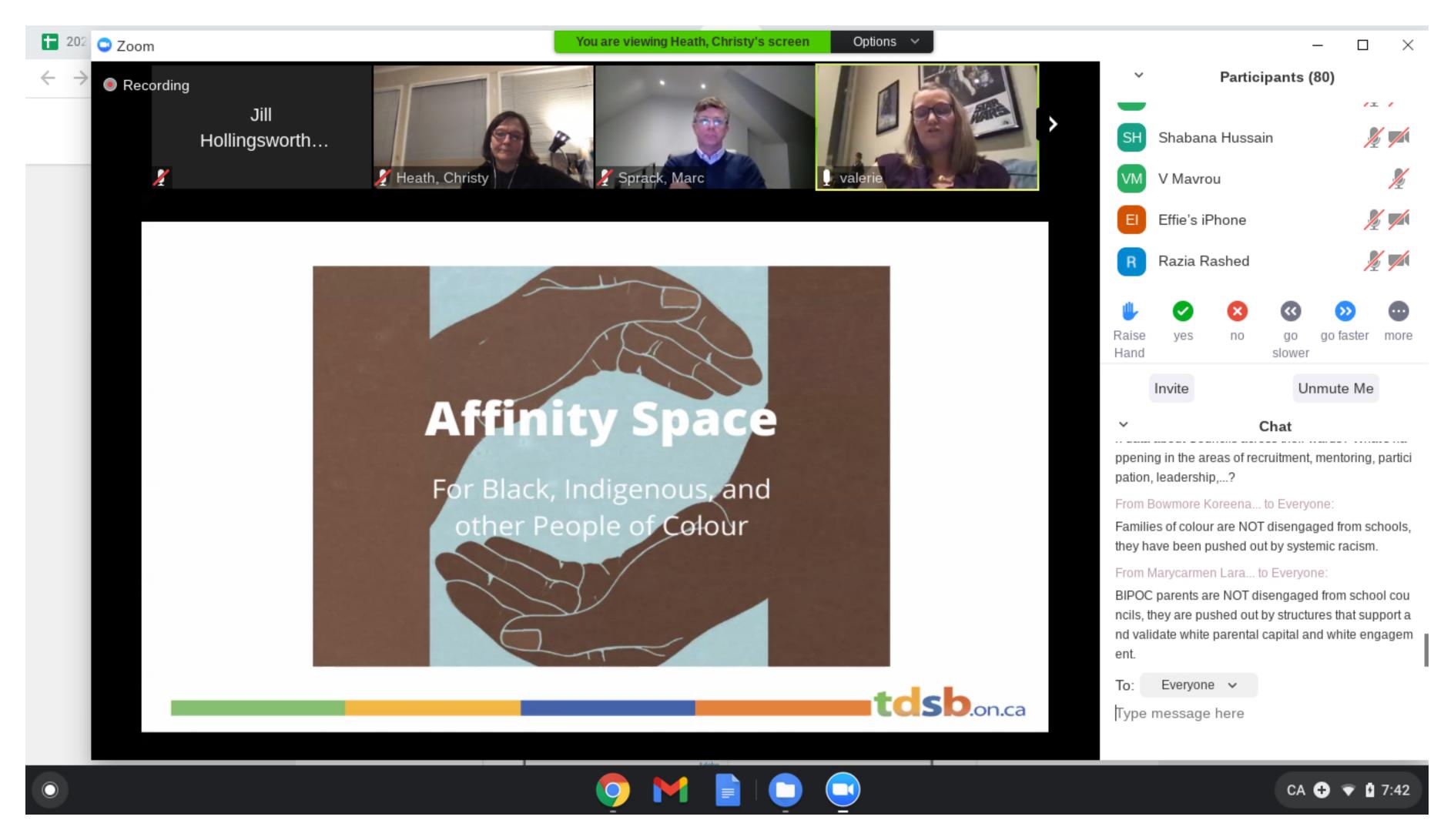
