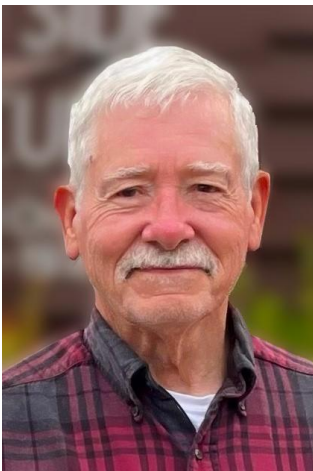

President's Letter



It's been a busy few months for the Pacifica Historical Society.

A couple of months ago there were clues that termites were in the museum building. We had inspectors come and verify that the building was indeed infested. After receiving two bids the board decided to have Planet Orange do the treatment. This included treating the underside of the building and placing a tent over the entire museum so the chemicals could penetrate the wood. The treatment plan includes follow-up inspections for two years. The total cost came to \$9,000; some of that amount was covered by a generous donor. This is part of our mission - not only to preserve Pacifica's history, but to preserve the building which houses the city's museum and is an important Pacifica landmark.

This winter, we planted a Western Redbud tree on the south side of the museum in honor of our long-time and much-missed PHS leader, the late Shirlee Gibbs, a major force behind PHS and the restoration of the building. The tree is already budding and will grow into a large tree with pink blossoms. In a few weeks we will install a small plaque by the tree to indicate it was planted in Shirlee's memory.

PHS board members have visited three primary classes in the school district, giving presentations about the Ohlone people and the history of Pacifica. We've also had visits by classes from our local middle school. On these visits, students learn about the Ohlone tribe, the Ocean Shore Railroad, and the fascinating history of our city. We do leave out some of Pacifica's most colorful stories - those you can hear about on our monthly guided walks around Sharp Park. We encourage you to join us on the last Saturday of every month at noon. Please let your friends and neighbors know; perhaps gather a group and make a day of it, with the walk, a visit to the museum and gift shop and lunch at a restaurant nearby.

I'd like to acknowledge and thank the AlessioGe Foundation for its generous contributions both to our OSRR project and PHS. We now have a paid assistant who works on a regular basis sorting and cataloguing material in our archives. This will make it easier to find things when needed and will ensure that future members will know what is stored in our archives.

We had illuminating and well-attended talks by Gordon van Zuiden, the author of "Never a Dull Mile," the story of the Ocean Shore Railroad; and Santa Clara University's Lee Panich on new discoveries of the Ohlones and the mission system. Next up, on April 12, is my presentation on how the Polynesians sailed across the vast expanse of the Pacific Ocean to inhabit its many islands. These types of events carry out our mission to educate the public on local history; please support us by letting people know about PHS and pacificahistory.org.

Exhibits Committee Begins Work

In August 2025, we celebrated the 10th anniversary of the opening of the Pacifica Coastside Museum. We had displays about the renovation process and the various events we have held since the opening. A panel discussed the long ordeal of fundraising and work involved in getting the building up to code to open to the public.

We are justified in being proud of what we created and the quality of the our displays. In general, visitors are impressed by our museum and the way we share our history. Nevertheless, as with any museum, there is room for improvement. As docents have helped tour around visitors, they have noticed there is a lack of flow, one topic does not blend into the next smoothly. Mostly, displays have been placed where they physically fit, rather than having been placed where related topics are close to one another.

Now it is time for us to rethink the use of our museum space and the way we tell the story of Pacifica's history.

A small committee of PHS Board members and docents have self-organized to discuss what our museum "facelift" should include. What are the topics to include, what format is effective for information to be displayed, and where the exhibits should be placed to create a better experience for our visitors and docents?

We invite you, our membership, to join this process. Specifically, we are looking for two kinds of help:

- 1) Contribution of ideas about what topics we should be sure to include in the displays. What history is essential and should not be omitted?

- 2) Hands-on help. We are confident that our committee can create a high-quality museum experience, but we need people with experience in graphic design, computer programs (e.g. Photoshop or Powerpoint), or general household workmanship. We also need others who are willing to learn whatever is needed to meet our goal.

Lee Panich Shares Local Native Findings



PHS drew nearly full house on March 29 for a compelling presentation by Lee Panich, a Santa Clara University professor who has done extensive studies on Native California people of northern California and their relationship to the mission system. Panich was introduced by PHS President Stephen Johnson (lower left), who noted the importance of recognizing the land in which we live, inhabited for centuries by the Ramaytush Ohlone. Panich is an archaeologist and historical anthropologist who was involved in discoveries at the Sanchez Adobe that included a Native burial ground. KQED Bay Curious Features Us, Again

KQED's Bay Curious radio program spotlighted Pacifica and PHS yet again! Earlier this year, we were for the subject of an episode that – until recently – was a little-known part of Pacifica history: the raid at Hazel's, the oceanfront Sharp Park bar that became a gathering place for gay men who were forced south when San Francisco bars were targeted there in the 1950s. The 1956 arrest at Hazel's of 79 men and 10 women by 35 San Mateo County sheriff officers on "morals charges" and the subsequent ACLU court case is in the history books: it was the first time that the ACLU took on a gay rights case. Our PHS researcher, Deb Hagler Wong, did her usual terrific work piecing together the story for our website and helped in creating a display at the museum. On the wall are historical photos from the 1930s and 40s of early surfers and an SF Chronicle article about --- brrrrr – how surfers managed before the invention of wetsuits. 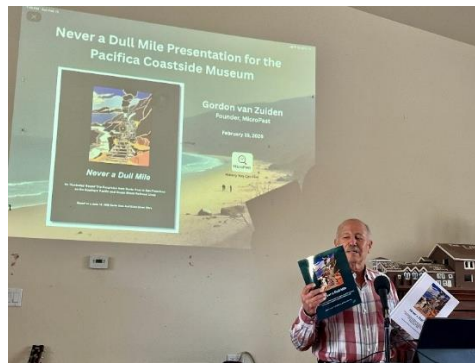


“Never a Dull Mile” on the OSRR

We had a terrific turnout of more than 50 people, including lots of train buffs, for the author talk, a viewing of the latest work on #1409, live music, a train locomotive cake by PHS’s Deirdra Crow and the sale of OSSR ephemeras.
