

At my invitation, Patricia Araujo came to visit our Coastside Museum. She enjoyed looking at our exhibits and meeting some of our members and our president, Judy Heldberg. Patricia is an artist who lives in San Francisco and among her many works is a portrait of the Goddess Pacifica, the famous statue that was at the Golden Gate Exhibition on Treasure Island from 1939-1940. As most of you know, that statue was the inspiration for the name given to our city when it was incorporated in 1957. The statue was also the inspiration for artist and sculptor Sal De Guarda, who created a scaled-down copy of the statue, and who donated it to the city. It now resides in our museum, next to our exhibit of the Golden Gate Exhibition.

Patricia received her Master of Fine Arts degree from the San Francisco Art Institute, and has had her paintings exhibited in various galleries around the city. (see a description of her and her works at https://www.turningart.com/artist/patricia-araujo) She has always been interested in architectural forms, which she inherited from her father, a noted architect. She loved the style of the buildings and statues at the Golden Gate Exhibition, especially the Goddess

A Memorial was held July 24th 2021 at the Moose Lodge for our beloved Member Marv Morganti attended by many friends and Historical Society Members.




Quarterly Meeting, June 27th 2021



In June, the Vargas Twins, who built the Ocean Shore Railroad Display many years ago, were the featured speakers at the opening of this wonderful display! They enjoyed describing how they built it & were pleased to see it at home in the Coastside Museum.



The Seaside Singers sang and played their "Car 1409" song for the audience.



A good time was had by all with 75 people in attendance. Rob Wullenjohn set the tone for the fun times with a performance of his original ditty about Car 1409. (That is the number of the passenger car now being re-furbished by the PHS.) Kathleen Manning then gave a brief history of the car and told us of the substantial progress being made by the restoration crew.

Then the newly refurbished Ocean Shore Railroad Model was unveiled. The model was originally built by brothers Armando and Daniel Vargas, born in San Francisco and raised in Pacifica, when they were teen-agers 20 plus years ago. It was so interesting to hear them tell how they built the model in their parent's garage. The model was exhibited at various sites in Pacifica and has been in storage for many years. Rob Wullenjohn as project leader and his crew worked long and hard to bring this extraordinary model to life in our Museum. The Pacifica Seaside Singers concluded the meeting with a lively trio of train songs and refreshments of lemonade and train cake.





O.S.R.R. MODEL TRAIN

A century ago, railroads were speculative high-tech businesses, somewhat like computer, internet or space businesses of today.

The Ocean Shore Railroad was built about 1908 to promote shoreside real estate, with nearby home lots for just \$250. OSRR steam trains carried passengers and farm products between San Francisco and the southern peninsula. Tickets were just 20 cents. But winter landslides sometimes washed away tracks, and cars and trucks became more popular, so the route became unprofitable. Tracks were removed in the early 1920s.

Our model shows the local area as it was about 1915. The train runs along the shore, from northern Mussel Rock south to the old railroad tunnel at Devil's Slide. Those 2 points are connected together to create a circular trip. While not geographically correct, that trick produces a realistic, walk-around layout.

Notice there were only a few buildings back then, with no pier, highway, or shopping center. The area wasn't even named Pacifica yet. You may be able to identify the beaches, some buildings and even railroad stops.


Weird California: a Talk by Ruth Carlson
