As Siberia Warms, its Permafrost is Thawing — with Global Consequences

- 1 They used to ride snowmobiles in June in Russkoye Ustya, a Siberian village by the Arctic Ocean coast but recently, the temperature in the area hit 88 degrees Fahrenheit (over 31 degrees Celsius). The climate has been warming rapidly in the Arctic for years, but a heat wave roasting northern Siberia recently has been shocking.
- 2 Wildfires are spreading. The fishing is meagre, the mosquitoes ravenous. The town of Verkhoyansk recently topped 100 degrees Fahrenheit — over 37 degrees Celsius — possibly the hottest temperature ever recorded above the Arctic Circle. Verkhoyansk was best known for sharing the Northern Hemisphere's cold temperature record — 90 degrees below zero Fahrenheit, set in 1892.
- 3 However, climate change has been transforming Russia's northern reaches - with global implications. "Very things strange are happening," said Roman Desyatkin, a scientist in the Siberian city of Yakutsk who studies perhaps the most farreaching consequence of the warming climate - the thawing of frozen ground. The frozen ground, permafrost, lies just below the surface across much of Russia. In some areas, including northeastern Siberia, the permafrost contains ice. With every hot summer, more of it thaws, flooding pastures, twisting roads, destabilising buildings and eroding riverbanks.

HOW PERMAFROST DRIVES GLOBAL WARMING

- Arctic permafrost is ground frozen over millenia, containing animal and plant detritus. Permafrost covers an expanse over twice the USA's size, spread across Siberia, Alaska, etc.
- Permafrost holds about 1,600 gigatons of carbon twice the amount in the atmosphere
- ➤ With climate change, permafrost is thawing, releasing methane — 25 times more potent than carbon dioxide
- For every one degree Celsius rise in Earth's temperature, permafrost can release four to six years' worth of fossil fuel emissions
- Since 2014, Earth's five warmest years have been recorded — and the Arctic is warming twice as fast as the remaining planet
- Permafrost thaw, driven by global warming, can multiply emissions by 41%

- 4 The thawing permafrost has global consequences because it results in the release of greenhouse gases from the decomposition of frozen organic material. A group of scientists convened by the United Nations said last year that the process could unleash 240 billion tons of carbon by 2100.
- 5 Above the Arctic Circle, there is no escaping the heat because the sun shines around the clock. Acrid smoke from growing wildfires has drifted over Siberian villages. Last year's Siberian fires, accelerated by the dry heat, were the worst in recent memory, consuming over 38,000 sequare miles. "Only the rain can put these fires out," a villager said. "This year, we have no rain."

- 1 Air pollution is a major threat to human health. The United Nations Environment Programme has estimated that, globally, 1.1 billion people breathe in unhealthy air. The World Health Organization (WHO) has estimated that urban air pollution is responsible for approximately 800,000 deaths and 4.6 million people lose their lives every year around the globe.
- 2 Traffic and transportation problems, inadequate drainage facilities, lack of open spaces, carbon emission, and the accumulation of waste aggravate the problem. Air pollution is associated with increased risk of acute respiratory infections (ARI), the principal cause of infant and child mortality in developing countries.
- 3 Urban air quality in most mega cities has been found to be critical and Kolkata is no exception to this. An analysis of ambient air quality in Kolkata was done by applying the Exceedance Factor (EF) method, where the presence of listed pollutants' (RPM, SPM, NO,, and SO,) annual average concentration are classified into four different categories; namely critical, high, moderate, and low pollution. Out of a total of 17 ambient air quality monitoring stations operating in Kolkata, five fall under the critical category, and the remaining 12 locations fall under the high category of No, concentration, while for RPM, four recored critical, and 13



come under the high pollution category. The causes of high concentration of pollutants in the form of NO, and RPM have been identified in earlier studies as vehicular emission (51.4%), followed by industrial sources (24.5%) and dust particles (21.1%).

- 4 Later, a health assessment was undertaken with a structured questionnaire at some nearby dispensaries which fall under areas with different ambient air pollution levels. Three dispensaries have been surveyed with 100 participants. It shows that respondents with respiratory diseases (85.1%) have outnumbered waterborne diseases (14.9%) and include acute respiratory infections (ARI) (60%), chronic obstructive pulmonary diseases (COPD) (7.8%), upper track respiratory infection (UTRI) (1.2%), Influenza (12.7%), and acid-fast bacillus (AFB) (3.4%).
- 5 To live a healthy life and have better well-being, practising pollution-averting activities in one's day-to-day activities is needed. These pollution-averting practices can only be possible when awareness among the masses is generated that the air, they-breathe outdoors, is not found to be safe.
