
Reuniting lost pets made pawsible by microchip stations

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GET LOST PETS HOME!

MICROCHIP SCANNING STATION

Push the button on the scanner to turn it on.

The chip SHOULD be on the back of the neck/in between shoulder

Starting on the back of the neck & shoulder blades Run the scanner up & down & side to side Remember to move it slowly.

You may need to do this a FEW times.

If it does not beep continue DOWN to the base of the tail AND DOWN EACH LEG AND BELLY SOMETIMES THE chip will travel to different areas of the body over time.

CHIPPED:

Scan the QR code below & enter a 9,10 or 15 digit # on the screen.



Enter YOUR contact information. If Enter YOUR contact information: If registered, the chip registry will automatically call, text & email the owner within SECONDS You could be getting a phone call from the owner within MINUTES.

If not registered, there will be a list of registries to contact. Start with the 1st one and continue down the list.

If you are unable to locate the owner follow the steps under "NO CHIP".



NO CHIP:

Check the pet for tags - including a rabies tag. If the animal has a rabies tag & lists vet info, contact the vet. They should have record of the owner.

Report the animal to your local animal shelter.

POST on NEXTDOOR & LOCAL FACEBOOK GROUPS. Tag Feral Heroes FB page & we will share the post.

After 3 days you can legally re-home the animal, take to a shelter or keep it as your own pet.

Please Chip the pet prior to re-homing, so they do not get lost again, FHR will donate a chip to any animal that was dumped & animals off the streets and out of the shelter!

The Feral Heroes Rescue microchip station is set up at Tri County Library ready for area residents to help reunite pets and owners.

MABANK—Tri County Library in partnership with Cedar Creek Pools and Feral Heroes Rescue, are working to reunite lost pets with their owners. The microchip scanning stations offer a way for citizens and residents to assist in reuniting lost pets. The stations provide instructions for residents and visitors who locate a lost pet instructing to scan the back of the pet's neck between shoulder blades running the scanner up and down and side to side. The station also instructs citizens where they can scan the animal if no chip is located on the back.

If a chip is located on the pet and they are registered, you will be prompted to provide your contact information which is then passed on to the pet's owner in seconds. If no chip is located on the animal or the pet is unregistered, there are instructions for that circumstance as well. According to Rebecca Burns of Feral Heroes Rescue, she is hopeful more microchip scanning stations will be pawsible (get it?) with business sponsorships and donations. Feral Heroes Rescue is a rescue dedicated to finding forever homes for friendly cats and kittens which gives them a second chance at a happy life. The rescue also strives to improve the lives of community cats through their Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR) program. Burns said these stations are important because people have a duty to check for chips on lost animals. What someone thinks is just another friendly cat, and living in your warm home may actually be someone's lost cat who has been gone for four days.

Burns has plans to put these stations around the Cedar Creek Lake area and in area cities, so if you are a local business owner who adores animals this may be a perfect opportunity for you to help a great cause. There are also plans to set up another microchip scanning station at the Mabank City Park, Gun Barrel City and more.
