The risk assessment is based on janitor duties at various dealerships and sites serviced by Carswells Devil in the Detail. It involves daily cleaning and maintenance tasks such as litter picking, surface wiping, and helping site maintenance. These duties are carried out after clocking in, with all staff provided with appropriate PPE (high-vis vests, safety boots, safety glasses, etc.). Specific tasks are assigned by the site team leader and must be assessed by the Health and Safety manager if any changes or additional duties arise.

Method Statement:

PPE: Full PPE provided to staff.

Delegated Duties: Team leader delegates janitor duties based on site needs.

Tasks Include:

Litter picking

Emptying and replacing bins

Surface cleaning

Helping with site maintenance requests

Cleaning work and public floor areas

Special Requests: Any work outside the agreed scope requires written approval from senior management and must be assessed by the Health and Safety manager.

Chemical Safety:

All chemicals used must be from approved suppliers, with relevant COSHH assessments in place.

Chemicals will be diluted as per the manufacturer's instructions, not used neat.

All equipment (e.g., re-spray bottles, cloths) are for valeting purposes only.





Hot Surfaces	Employees, contractors, visitors, public & dealership staff could suffer from burns if bare skin comes into contact with hot parts of the heat gun.	 Only authorised personnel allowed access to the site. Full training provided for sticker and vinyl removal process. Activity is infrequent and not the primary work task, reducing the risk of burns. One hand operates the trigger of the heat gun, and the other handles the vinyl. The worker will feel hot air before direct skin contact with the heat gun, allowing time to react. Heat gun is stored safely when not in use, and left to cool before being returned to storage. The process is carried out near an electrical outlet to minimise the chance of tripping on cables. 	 Monitor for any changes in procedure that could increase exposure to hot surfaces. Continue regular training and refreshers to ensure proper use of heat gun. 	Craig Carswell	11/04/2025
