#### **Assessment Method:**

Reviewed HSE guidelines and best practices
Checked previous assessments
Consulted staff and inspected site
Method Statement:
Staff wear full PPE (hi-vis, boots, glasses)
Team leader assigns vehicles
Licensed driver or dealership staff move vehicles following SOPs
During Vehicle Imaging:
Check vehicle position and lighting
Warn nearby staff of imaging activity
Wear hi-vis vests at all times
Place warning cones around the work area
If possible, have a spotter assist

### **Chemical Use:**

Only approved products with COSHH data Correct dilution and clearly labelled bottles Equipment fit for purpose and maintained

This Risk Assessment follows HSE guidelines, ensuring all significant risks are identified, control measures are in place, and remaining risks are low. It is reviewed regularly to stay up to date.





Noise Exposure	Employees may suffer hearing damage or tinnitus due to excessive noise.	- Noise levels allow normal conversation at 1-2m - Work spread across indoor/outdoor areas reducing cumulative noise	• Monitor noise levels if significant changes occur.
