Assessment covers the use of a cordless drill with a scrubbing attachment for removing stubborn carpet stains during vehicle valeting.

#### How Assessment Was Carried Out:

Following HSE guidelines and best practice Reviewing past assessments and training records Consulting experienced staff Conducting on-site inspections

#### **Method Statement:**

Staff wear full PPE (high-vis, boots, safety glasses) before starting. After manual cleaning attempts, the cordless scrub may be used if needed. Operator checks the vehicle is secure (ignition off) and follows valeting procedures. Inform the team leader before use. Ensure the tool and attachment are secure; remove loose clothing/jewellery and tie back hair.

Start at a low speed and only increase if necessary, applying light pressure. Apply a small amount of approved interior cleaner before scrubbing. If stain persists, seek team leader advice rather than forcing the tool. After use, return the tool to storage and charge if required.

All chemicals used must be Approved Valeting products, correctly diluted and labelled. Equipment is purpose-bought for vehicle valeting.

This Risk Assessment follows HSE guidelines and ensures significant risks are controlled. Regular reviews maintain a safe working environment.

Use of Cordless Hand Tool	Cuts, bruises, scalp injuries, de- gloving, broken bones or serious harm if poorly maintained or improperly used.	Only trained staff with authorised access may use tools. Regular tool inspections (PUWER compliance) and maintenance by competent contractors. Staff wear PPE (eye protection, gloves) and secure loose clothing/hair/jewellery. Drill speed is kept low to prevent interior damage. Team leaders check equipment as part of routine checks.	Ongoing monitoring by team leaders.	Craig Carswell	11/04/2025
Vibration Exposure	Potential vibration- related ill health from extended use.	<ul> <li>Scrubber use is infrequent and for short durations only.</li> <li>HSE vibration calculator confirms safe usage time (&lt;2.5 hours trigger time).</li> <li>Machines and attachments are checked regularly for wear and tear.</li> <li>Tough stains are to be reported to a supervisor if prolonged scrubbing would be needed.</li> </ul>	Monitor actual trigger times where needed to ensure safe exposure limits. Fire	Injury, smoke inhalation, or fatality if fire breaks out on site.	<ul> <li>Authorised access only</li> <li>Fire alarms and detection systems in place</li> <li>Coordination with client over fire procedures</li> <li>Fire marshals in place</li> <li>Full controls detailed in Fire Risk Assessment</li> </ul>	- Client's Fire Risk Assessment to be requested and held on file	Craig Carswell	11/04/2025

Noise Exposure	Employees may suffer hearing damage or tinnitus due to excessive noise.	Normal noise levels allow conversation at 1-2m; work spread across multiple bays and indoors/outdoors reducing cumulative noise exposure.	<ul> <li>Monitor noise levels if significant changes occur.
