### Some Cemeteries of Eau Claire—The Norwegian Story

Many Norwegian-Americans are buried in Eau Claire's two large, public cemeteries. Waldemar Ager, of course, was interred in Lakeview Cemetery and has a large memorial monument. Also, in this newsletter in 2020, I wrote about the impressive and well-sited monument in Forest Hill Cemetery for *Formand* Gjermund Hoyme, who led what today is the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.

These public cemeteries, however, while officially non-denominational, in the nineteenth century were largely the final resting place of Eau Claire's "Yankee" settlers. Other ethno-religious groups understandably felt the need to develop their own cemeteries. Beginning with St. Patrick's Cemetery in 1862, Irish Catholics, German Lutherans, Norwegian Lutherans, Jews, and German Catholics successively built cemeteries on Eau Claire's Northside (Hmong were to follow a century later). These groups located their burial grounds north of Omaha Street, between the properties facing Starr Ave. and Churchill St., extending to the railroad line at the crest of the bluff above Dells Pond.

In 1885 the Scandinavian Lutheran Cemetery Association opened its cemetery at what currently is 1822 Omaha St. What became First Lutheran and Our Savior's churches (now merged as Spirit Lutheran) were primarily responsible for this development. Hoyme, pastor of First Lutheran (not yet a *formand*), led a reportedly "interesting and impressive" dedication ceremony on Sunday, June 7. This cemetery became known as the "Norwegian Cemetery" or the "first addition." Twenty-five years later the Norwegian cemetery proposed to expand by leapfrogging its neighbor to the west, the German Lutheran cemetery. When neighbors objected, it compromised by limiting the size of this "second addition," at 1712 Omaha St. Confusingly, this new burial ground became known as the "Scandinavian Cemetery." To further muddle things, both cemeteries also are referred to as the "Northside Lutheran Cemetery." In 2024 there are about 3,600 gravesites in the Norwegian and Scandinavian cemeteries on Omaha St., tended in past decades by the women of the Scandinavian Lutheran Cemetery Guild.

Among the prominent Eau Claire residents buried in the Norwegian Cemetery is Peter J. Smith, a civic leader and politician for over 40 years during the first half of the last century. A Republican and later Progressive in politics, he was a close ally of Robert M. LaFollette, Sr. Smith was a LaFollette delegate to the 1924 Republican National Convention and was a state senator from 1929 to 1933. He was also a founder and for several decades the grand secretary of the Eau Claire-based American-Scandinavian Fraternity (located in what is now the Grand Apartments, the old Wells Fargo building at the corner of East Grand and Graham streets). Two years after Smith's death in 1947, the Fraternity added an impressive memorial monument to his gravesite for "one who dedicated most of his active years to the upbuilding of our order." U.S. Senator Alexander Wiley, a fraternal brother of Smith's, spoke at the dedication of this monument on September 11, 1949. Smith was "a good American," the senator emphasized, who performed his duties faithfully and well.

Today the Norwegian and Scandinavian cemeteries are overseen by the Lutheran Church Cemetery Board, with volunteer members from Eau Claire's mainline Lutheran churches. The cemeteries are close to full, but still have room for additional burials—there were six interments in 2023.

The trip was a success but frustrating at times. Norway is changing. I had to ask my sister-in-law before I arrived if people still used cash in their transactions. They do, but I remember the confused feeling I had had just a few years ago when I presented kroner bills from yet another trip and was told they were old bills, too old, and not possible to use. The currency had to be mailed to the national treasury to be changed! I am glad I had my DNB debit card updated two years ago. The card is used even at the lavatory at the central rail station in Oslo, Oslo S! (NOK 20 = \$1.27).

I was indeed surprised when the train entered the station in my hometown from the opposite direction of what I expected. This was due to a new tunnel.

The Waldemar Ager Association, Inc., has also made improvements, and miracles happened when the two houses on Whipple Street came down. Then Gordy Thorpe found a person to move the *Stabbur* to Eau Claire from a farm near Osseo. That was the second miracle. After resting in our garage during the winter, the little Viking ship from the Ray and Betty Larson estate finally made it to the museum. Grateful to our treasurer Kathryn and her grandson for moving that gem. It has been filled with dirt and flowers. That was the third miracle.

The big item for the Board is to begin in earnest to plan for a Nordic Center on the vacant properties next door. Community members are sought to be part of a larger planning committee. The May Board minutes show that "The committee will consist of two members from the Board, two from the general membership and two from the community." Please let us know if you can participate. This could be fun! And your presence would make a fourth miracle. The Nordic Center will house the **Waldemar Ager Library** now on the second floor of the house and not so easily accessed and also out of space for additions to the collection, many of which are yet to be catalogued. The building will also offer a meeting room, kitchen, exhibit space, storage area, and, possibly, a coffee and gift shop.


# CultureFest at the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire
