

News from Doug Pearson, President of the Ager Association

First of all, our treasurer reports that many of you have confirmed your support of the Ager Association with memorial gifts and your contributions for annual renewals. Thank you for keeping this organization alive and thriving.

Second, it is a great pleasure to welcome and thank Oscar Brandser and Bob Gough as new members of the Board of Directors. Oscar is employed at Xcel Energy, and Bob is a recent retiree from UW-Eau Claire (history). Bob also serves on the Landmarks Commission. Each of these new members brings new energy (Oscar quite literally) and perspectives to the activity of the Board.

I am also happy to report that we continue to have public interest in the house and organization. In January and February we had several visitors on our open Saturdays. Some Norwegian ski jumpers and their coaches, here

We expect visits in late March from about 30 folks in Learning in Retirement programs. And, as usual, we have regular artist and Hardanger groups using the house on Tuesdays and Thursdays. This past year we have had several book groups reading Ager books and coming to the house for their book discussion. Consider putting a group together yourself.

We are learning, however, that a museum must always be developing. Once seen, the house may cease to encourage return visits. To sustain interest, the Board has been looking at a variety of ways to develop public attention. We formed two subcommittees to investigate some of

the possibilities. One group arranged a meeting with a representative of the Mayo Clinic Health System, the Economic Development officer of the City of Eau Claire, and the director of Parks and Recreation. Our first meeting reestablished some important connections for the Ager Association. The subcommittee will meet again this spring to talk more about the future for west side impact.

The second subcommittee was a gathering of representatives from the Ager Association, Norden Folk, and Sons of Norway. The main theme of the meeting was to explore opportunities for collaboration—in programming but also in community development. But the conversation became primarily focused on the preparations for Syttende Mai.

And this is a good opportunity to close this letter by informing you that this year's event will take place at the Best Western Plus Trail Lodge Hotel & Suites on Tuesday, May 17. Be ready for dinner served at your table, a fine program, and celebratory fellowship.

About the *History of Norway*: John Yilek, Norwegian history instructor and author, will outline major episodes in Norway's history, including stories about the first Viking attack, a famous legend of the Sami, how a reindeer discovered the largest lode of copper in Europe, Ole Bull's failed Norwegian-American settlement at Oleana, and the heavy water sabotage in World War II. After the presentation, he will sign copies of his new book called *History of Norway*, an account of Norway's history from the Stone Age to the present day.

Ski Jumpers Visit the Ager House

Nothing defines Norwegians like skiing. Whether it's alpine, cross-country, or jumping, Norwegians excel at every level. In a two-week span, Wisconsin has hosted an FIS Cup ski jumping meet (in Eau Claire on February 11 and 12) and the annual American Birkebeiner cross-country race. Area, national, and international skiers have been featured at both events.

Some of the Norwegians and their coaches came to visit Waldemar Ager's house on February 10 just before going off for practice runs in below zero weather and somewhat severe winds. They were surprised to learn that Roald Amundson had visited Eau Claire were pleased to find information on Marcus Trane along with works by Ibsen and Bjornson.

43rd Annual Scandinavian Retreat

On February 19-21, Norden Folk sponsored the 43rd annual retreat program for university students and faculty. Unusually warm weather curtailed most of the outdoor recreational activities, but indoors the programming went on as scheduled. On Saturday and Sunday there were seven hour-long presentations and discussions. Students from half a dozen colleges and universities learned about such things as Ossmol, a language barely surviving in a small area in Sweden, and the eSaga Project that is bringing Medieval texts to life with interactive digital translations.

I was unable to stay for the whole sequence of events, but this annual program is a good reminder of the significant resources and initiatives there are for studies of Nordic culture, history, literature, and society. Our library is one of those resources, but so are our membership and the possible collaborations with our sister Nordic organizations. – *Doug*

Ager House Library News—March-May, 2016—By Miriam Hansen

The library has received a copy of **The Troll with No Heart in His Body** from Graeme and Clare Pearson, both of whom attended the Ager House's Summer Camp in August when the musical version of the story was performed.

These troll stories are retold by storyteller Lise Lunge-Larsen, and are accompanied by Betsy Bowen's unique and beautiful woodcuts. In addition to the tales, most of which are originally from Asbjørnsen and Moe, the author has included information about the nature of trolls and how they have played an important part in Norwegian culture. The author's preface points out the value of folktales for today's children: "Folktales explore the issues as complex as the nature of good and evil, and the triumph of kindness and patience over bullying and anger. Folktales reveal universal truths."
