

Update on Front Porch Restoration Board Approval Pending for Summer Work

Board member **Marty Zens** took the leadership to find a contractor for the porch renewal. Zens reports that he scheduled appointments with six contractors on the night of our Wednesday open house in January. Three contractors showed. Only Roger Storlie has given a bid. The other contractors did not seem too engaged because of the small scope of the work.

Zens says that Storlie was very interested in the job. Storlie is of Norwegian ancestry (from Storli--no e on the end). The Storlie family has linkage to the village, about 160 km SW of Trondheim. Storlie said he knew nothing of Ager and the House prior to our inquiry to him. So Zens gave him a tour. He was fired up to be in the house and might have continuing interest personally--maybe with membership. Zens says that Storlie would be a great asset for future carpentry work. He also has a painter that he teams with and has included the painting in the bid.

Zens reports that his efforts to find grant support for the Ager Museum project have not yet led to success.

Global Warming

The Impact on the Native Inupiaq People in Arctic, Alaska Monday, March 2, EC Public Library

Roger Skatrud will share his experiences among the Inupiaq on the island village of Shishmaref, Alaska, a village accessible only by plane 100 miles from its closest neighbor, Nome, Alaska. Life in this village is threatened by the autumn storms and the warming of the waters of the Chukchi Sea. Villagers watch buildings slip into the sea, and they struggle with the decision to move their village. Since 1980, their island home has shrunk from about four miles wide to about a quarter of a mile today.

Skatrud, who lived and pastored among the islanders, will discuss 150 years of Inupiaq history and culture including the role of the U.S. government and its efforts to force the Inupiaq to abandon their nomadic lifestyle and settle down in one location. Inupiaq life is grounded in their traditional beliefs and subsistence existence. Skatrud also explores the role of Norwegian missionaries and reindeer herders knowledgeable in the care of reindeer herds.


Skatrud was born in Eastern Wisconsin graduated from Luther College (1957) and Luther Seminary (1961). He was married to Marilyn Sorlien in 1959. He served as a Lutheran pastor in Medina, North Dakota, Shawano and Chippewa Falls, Wisconsin. Roger and Marilyn are presently residents of Eau Claire. After retiring in 2000, he has served as an interim pastor in Eau Claire and in Nome and Shishmaref, Alaska. While serving in Shishmaref, Roger and Marilyn experienced life among the Native Alaskan people on an island that is disappearing into the sea. As global warming increases, they are faced with the necessity of moving their village and losing their unique way of life.
