## Why Major in Political Science?

You should major in political science to become a publicly spirited, scholarly minded, and civically engaged individual who has the knowledge, skills, and abilities to effect political and policy change at the local, state, national, and international level.

Cuyamaca College offers a robust AA-T in Political Science that includes courses in Research Methods and Public Policy.

## About the AA-T Degree in POSC

The Associates of Arts-Transfer in Political Science (AA-T) degree is designed ONLY for transfer to a California State University. It is important to look up each target California State University to make sure they will accept the Associate's Degree for Transfer (ADT) and for the major emphasis the student wants.

The AA-T in Political Science is not meant to fulfill requirements for transfer to a University of California campus. There is likely overlap, however, for University of California transfer requirements. Students in partnership with Counseling, need to look at the articulation agreement for each individual University of California campus they are interested in and plan classes accordingly.

## TERMS TO KNOW

- **Course:** course abbreviation and number, such as POSC 121.
- **Title:** full title of the course.
- **Catalog Description:** the official description of the course that appears in the annual Cuyamaca College [Catalog](#)<sup>1</sup>.
- **IGETC:** Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum is a general education package which students can take to fulfill lower division general education requirements for either the CSU or UC. IGETC is organized into Areas 1-6.
  - IGETC consists of 6 areas: Area 1: English Communication; Area 2: Mathematical Concepts and Quantitative Reasoning; Area 3: Fine Arts and Humanities; Area 4: Social and Behavioral Sciences; Area 5: Biological and Physical Sciences; and Area 6: Language Other Than English.
- **CSU GE:** CSU General Education Breadth is a general education package which students can take to fulfill lower division general education requirements for CSU. CSU GE is organized into Areas A-F.
  - CSU GE consists of 6 areas: Area A: English Language Communication and Critical Thinking; Area B: Scientific Inquiry and Quantitative Reasoning; Area C: Arts and Humanities; Area D: Social Sciences; Area E: Lifelong Learning and Self-Development; and Area F: Ethnic Studies.
- **Double count:** means that this course fulfills both a major requirement for the given Associate Degree for transfer (ADT) and an IGETC requirement.
- **Units:** number of units the course is worth.
- **Online:** denotes if the course is offered online.

- **ZTC:** Zero Textbook Cost means that you should not have to pay out of pocket for course materials since they are freely available.
- **CC:** Cuyamaca College.
- **GC:** Grossmont College.
- **Faculty:** Last name of faculty who teaches the course.
- **Offered:** denotes when a course is offered.
  - **FA** = Fall
  - **SP** = Spring
  - **SU** = Summer
  - **-Odd** = Odd Years, i.e., FA-Odd
  - **-Even** = Even years, i.e., SP-Even
  - **##** = denotes year, i.e., 22 = 2022
- **Required or Recommended:** denotes whether a course is required to earn you AA-T in POSC or recommended. Recommended courses have alternatives available, but the alternatives may not be Online and/or ZTC.

# DOUBLE MAJORING

## **Why Double Major and earn your AA-T in Political Science and second degree of your choice?**

You should double major because you can, and because you keep your options open after you transfer to a 4-year university and beyond.

You can double major in Political Science and another academic field of your choice, such as Business, Communications, Economics, Psychology, Public Health, Sociology, History, or Environmental Science.

### **Variation between CSU campuses**

While the AA-T in Political Science will likely secure admission to the California State University (CSU) system, it is important to know that each CSU campus can have unique requirements for transferring in as a POSC major. Thus, it is important to meet with Counseling to discuss your plans.

### **Variation between UC campuses**

Similarly, each UC campus Political Science program can have unique requirements for transferring in as a POSC major as well. Again, it is important to meet with Counseling to discuss your plans.

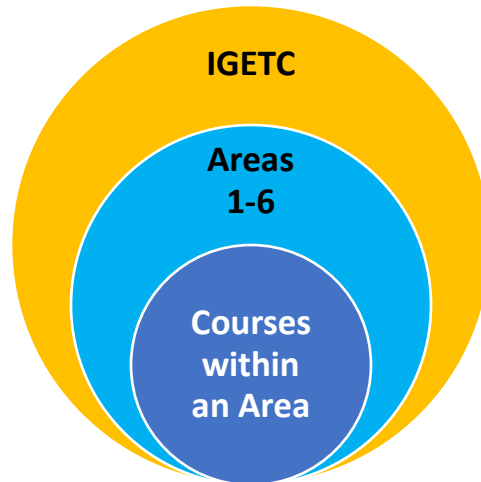

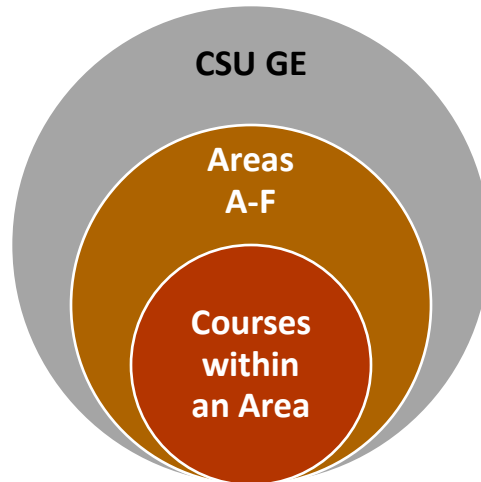

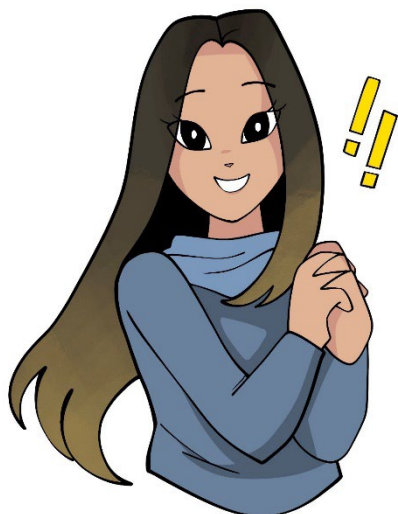
