A Note from Pastor Seth

This is a great time of year to reflect on the true meaning of Christmas and the true meaning of Christmas centers on the man. Jesus Christ. Everyone. everywhere must recognize important place that Jesus holds in world history. Any impartial survey of history will conclude that Jesus is the most important human who ever lived. He lived on this earth for thirty plus years and changed it forever. Christianity has shaped the world in ways that no other movement has over the last two thousand years. I was a history minor in college, and I took several church history courses in seminary. As I have studied history, I have been struck by the fact that largely speaking, the study of western civilization is essentially a study of the history of the church. The last two thousand years has been shaped more by Jesus of Nazareth than anyone else. Let me give you a few examples of this.

In the first century a movement that started out as a small Jewish sect (later called Christians) outlasted the powerful Roman Empire that crumbled several centuries later.

Secondly, the calendar that most people use in the world uses, as its starting point, the life of Christ. Each year before the life of Christ are the letters, B.C. and this stands for "Before Christ." Every year after Christ's birth, are followed by the letters, AD, and these two letters mean Anno Domini. In Latin this means, "The Year of our Lord." Every time we say what year we are living in or mention some time from the past Christ's life is the reference point. Thirdly, it is important to note that the two most prominent worldwide holidays,

Christmas and Easter, focus on the life of Christ. One holiday commemorates the day that he came to this earth and the other commemorates his resurrection. Lastly, the book that describes the life of Christ, the Bible, is far and away the most sold book in the world. Many, many people are drawn to Jesus unlike anyone else. So as one ponders these truths concerning Jesus, no secular person can escape the reality that Jesus is the most influential person in the history of the world. So the question that any honest person needs to ask is why is this man's influence on the world far more significant than anyone else's? There is something different about Him.

It is vital that everyone in the world listens to what Jesus said concerning himself in the gospels. He makes the claim, "I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father (God) but through Me" (John 14:6). He also says, "Whoever believes in the Son (Jesus) has eternal life but whoever does not obey the Son shall not see life but the wrath of God remains on him" (John 3:36). This most significant man makes major statements about reality. To understand the meaning of life is to understand who Jesus is and what he has done. Jesus is the only person in world history that one cannot be indifferent toward? Understanding the true meaning of Christmas has eternal implications. As we enter December, we enter a very special month. It is the time of year when Christians all over the world celebrate the incarnation. The incarnation is a fancy word to say that God became a man in the person of Jesus Christ. It is hard to wrap our minds around this, and frankly we never fully will.

Think about this, the same One who created trillions of galaxies; and the same One who created you and me, became flesh and blood as we are. God never had a beginning, the Father, Son, and Spirit have forever existed in an eternal fellowship (John 17:5). The second person of that Trinity, the Son, is the One who took on flesh (John 1:14). When Jesus came to this earth, he came on a rescue mission to save sinners (1 Timothy 1:15). After living a perfect life (1 Peter 2:22), he died on the cross to pay the penalty for sins and rose from the dead (1 Peter 3:18; 1 Corinthians 15:20), and anyone who believes in him will be freed from the punishment one deserves (hell) and will receive eternal life (John 3:16). To have eternal life means that you will live with the One you were created for, Jesus (Colossians 1:15), and live in fullness of joy with Him and His Father forever (Psalm 16:11). The First Christmas Was Far from Perfect

From the perfect Christmas cards to the perfect tree, décor and gifts, Christmas often seems, well ... perfect.

But if you've had a hard year, all those happy Christmas cards and joyful carols might seem insignificant. How can you have hope when you lost someone you love? Or lost your job? Or struggle with depression?

If you just can't seem to find the joy everyone talks about this season, that's OK. The first Christmas wasn't perfect, either. In fact, the birth of Jesus Christ was full of imperfect situations and imperfect people.

But Jesus still came. And that's why you can have hope this Christmas.

1. An Imperfect Genealogy

The book of Matthew begins with Jesus' genealogy. From the first name on the list, the genealogy is full of broken people—people who are sinful and in need of redemption.

Abraham gave his wife to the Pharaoh of Egypt. Tamar posed as a prostitute. David was an adulterer and a murderer. Solomon had hundreds of wives. King after king listed turned away from God and believed in pagan gods instead of the true God.

But it was into that lineage that Jesus was born.

The point? God can use broken and messed up people to carry out His plan. No matter your past, if you have put your trust in Jesus Christ, He has redeemed you (Romans 8:1), and He has a purpose for you (Ephesians 2:10).

2. An Imperfect Situation

In the same way, the situations surrounding Jesus' birth were less than ideal.

As a young girl, Mary came to be with child through the mysterious act of God. This put her in a difficult situation. As an unwed virgin, her pregnancy would've raised some eyebrows, especially in a day and culture where adultery often merited death. It was hard, and she might have faced ridicule from her family and friends who didn't believe her story.

It didn't stop there. Jesus was born in a stable. His first cradle was a manger.

Even Joseph's story wasn't perfect. The woman he was supposed to marry got pregnant before marriage. He, "being a just man and unwilling to put her to shame," decided to divorce her (Matthew 1:19)—until an angel came to him in a dream and advised against it.

It was messy and far from perfect, but it was into that mess the Son of God, the Creator of the world, chose to be born.

3. An Imperfect World

At the time of Jesus' birth, Israel was under Roman rule with King Herod on the throne. The Israelites were heavily taxed, and many lived in poverty.

"The world into which Jesus was born 2,000 years ago was a troubled one." —Franklin Graham

But Jesus didn't wait for the world to be perfect; He came in the midst of suffering. He is "Immanuel," God with us, as the prophet Isaiah declared in Isaiah 7:14. He came into the darkness, walked among us, was hungry, tired and didn't have a place to call His own. He "in every respect has been tempted as we are, yet without sin" (Hebrews 4:15).

This Christmas, if you find yourself in an imperfect situation, remember, the Christmas story isn't perfect and nostalgic. It's messy, full of broken people and broken situations.

But Jesus still came. For you.

A Christian Christmas Tree

When you think of Christmas Day, one of the first images that comes to mind is the Christmas tree. But what is the religious significance? While there is no overt reference to an evergreen treen in relation to the actual birth story of Christ, believers have attached religious meaning to the once pagan symbol.

The Choice of the Evergreen

The evergreen tree is a tree that maintains its color throughout the year. Even in the depths of winter, the evergreen tree shows its life. This characteristic of everlasting life represents the life we have in Christ (John 3:16).

The Shape of the tree

The triangular shape of the Christmas tree has often been used to reference the Holy Trinity (Matthew 28:18-19). The upward pointing branches often symbolize our praise to God.

The Lights on the tree

For many Christians, candles or lights on the tree signify how Jesus came as the light into the world. The star placed atop the tree represents the star the wise men followed to Bethlehem (Matthew 2:9).

Presents Under the tree

For some, presents under the tree represent the gifts the wise men brought to Jesus (Matthew 2:11). For others, the presents represent the gift of salvation we have through Jesus (Romans 3:21-22).


The Cutting of the Tree

When the evergreen tree is cut, it is struck down to its death, only to be raised to glory in splendor as a decorated Christmas tree. This transformation of the tree symbolizes how Jesus died on a tree and was raised to new life on the third day.

Ultimately, the choice to celebrate with a Christmas tree during the holidays is a personal one. While many people do focus more on the dazzling aspects of the celebration, there can be beauty in the symbolism. First Corinthians 10:31 states, "So, whether you eat, or drink, or whatever you do, do all to the glory of God."



"When God Weeps, Why our Sufferings Matter to the Almighty"



When God Weeps is not so much a book about suffering as it is about God. It tackles tough questions about heaven and hell, horrors and hardships, and why God allows suffering in this life.
