A Note from Pastor Seth

The Bible tells us that Satan is the ruler of this present age (1 John 5:19). As the temporary ruler of this world, he has certain strategies. It is important for every Christian to understand what these strategies are. One of Satan's chief efforts in our present world is to tear down male headship. Yes, you heard it. Now you might be thinking that we hear little to nothing about this, but all you have to do is to look around to see how prevalent this movement is in our world. When I was growing up the most popular TV show was The Simpson's. The show presented the Homer father, Simpson, unintelligent, deadbeat slob who could do nothing right. He did not lead his wife; he did not lead his kids; he was just there for viewers to laugh at his dopiness. We might be tempted to laugh at this, but when you stop to look, Satan's influence is all over this modern perception of what a man is. His goal is to demasculinize men. He does this by making men worthless like Homer Simpson or making them feminine. The feminization of men should be obvious to all who look. Why is this Satan's strategy? As Christians we should despise Satan but one thing we need to acknowledge is that in the pursuit of evil he knows what he is doing. He knows how to advance evil far and wide. He does what any enemy does well against one's opponent - he takes out the leaders. As Scripture says, "Strike the shepherd, and the sheep will be scattered" (Zechariah 13:7). This is what smart enemies do in war. To take out soldiers is one of the objectives but to take out the commanding officer is a brilliant strategy. If you take out the leader, then those who are supposed to follow do not know what direction to go.

In our modern world people are offended because men, whether leading the right way or not, have been in places of leadership for thousands of years. But even if men have led wrongly far too often this does not mean it is wrong for men to lead. The clear call from Scripture is that male leadership is God's design. As the apostle Paul wrote: "Let a woman learn quietly with all submissiveness. I do not permit a woman to teach or to exercise authority over a man; rather, she is to remain quiet. For Adam was formed first, then Eve: and Adam was not deceived, but the woman was deceived and became a transgressor" (1 Timothy 2:12-14). What we see here is a clear order in God's plan in creation. God made man before woman and the God-given role to men is to lead. This does not mean that men are superior; they are not, but the responsibility of leadership is given to men and not women. This does not mean that women are unable to lead. Many women make excellent leaders but there are only certain arenas where they are to lead. God has given women the ability to lead other women and children. When men and women are together it is the responsibility for men to lead. When men do not lead things fall apart since it is in man's very nature to lead. I once heard a pastor say, "Just as birds have wings and fish have fins so it is in the nature of men to lead." This is clearly seen in Scripture. When God gives instructions as to what a church should look like he says, "An overseer must be above reproach, the husband of one wife" (1 Timothy 3:2). What this states is that a shepherd must be a man. A church is an entity that will only run smoothly if a man leads it. A husband is also to lead his wife (Ephesians 5:22-24) and his children (1 Timothy 3:5). In some capacity all men are called to lead. To not lead is to go against one's God-given nature.

But we live in a backwards world where insisting on male headship is seen as a negative (Isaiah 5:20). Satan wants it this way. In the present-day male headship is seen as oppressive.

It is seen as restricting women from what they should really be doing. The cry today is for women to lead. But this is still God's world and God did not create it this way. For the church, the family, and society to flourish men need to lead. They were made with the fortitude to do so. Leadership is not something that is as rosy as everyone makes it out to be. Leadership is incredibly difficult, and God has given men the mental, emotional and physical strength to be able to lead in different environments. When the apostle Peter writes that women are "the weaker vessel" (1 Peter 3:7) he is not saying that women are inferior. He is saying that they were not given the mental, emotional, and physical strength that God gave men. The emotional toll that leadership takes can be hard for one to bear, but God made it that man can withstand the toll of leadership. To be in leadership means taking bullets for others. As Harry Truman once said, "The buck stops with me." To take bullets for others is a masculine attribute. It is the responsibility of men to do so. It is the responsibility of men to do the hardest things.

When men carry out their Godgiven nature to lead in family life, church life, and in society things run better, and they run better as long as the man leads the way God calls him to. To be domineering is condemned in Scripture (1 Timothy 5:3). To be a servant leader, following the example of Christ, is the call to men (Mark 10:45). When men lead like this all those who follow are blessed. But Satan wants to tear down male headship. He desires to take out the leaders so that those who follow do not know where to go. He does this by saying that biblical male headship is oppressive. He takes out the shepherd so that the sheep will scatter (Zechariah 13:4). He has been mighty successful in this effort, but we need to be a minority voice in a world that continues to push forward Satan's strategy.



Betty Ann Jensen passed away peacefully at Comforts of Home; St. Croix Falls on December 18, 2022 surrounded by family.

Betty was born on February 7, 1932 at home to Martin Edward and Augusta Catherine (Raitz) O'Donnell. She lived in the Frederic area with her 10 siblings. She graduated from Frederic High School in 1950. While attending the Polk County Normal School in St. Croix Falls to get her teacher's license, she met her husband, Sherman Jensen. They were married August 23, 1952. She taught school for one year at Manitou Lake School. She then stayed home to help with the farm and raise their 4 children, Steven, Arlene, Douglas, and David. After selling the cattle and renting out the farm Sherman and Betty owned and operated Eureka Center Antiques from 1972-1988. Betty and Sherman then went to Clock Maker School, and they repaired many clocks until 2011.

Betty had a love and extensive knowledge of local history. She was a member of several local historical societies. She loved working at the Little Red School House at the Polk County Fair. She was named Polk County's History Woman of the Year in 2012 by the Polk County Historical Society.

Betty was a member of the Eureka Baptist Church. She was past treasurer, sang in the choir, and taught AWANA. Betty loved to quilt, make sock monkeys and play cards.

Betty is preceded in death by her parents, 4 sisters and 5 brothers, husband Sherman and grandson Sherman Scott.
