



We are approaching one of the biggest holidays of the year at the end of this month. That of course is Thanksgiving. The first Thanksgiving ever celebrated took place between the Native Americans and the pilgrims at Plymouth Rock in the early 17th century. The Pilgrims marked this day as one of thanksgiving to God as he empowered them to cross the ocean and enter America. This holiday became official in 1863 when President Abraham Lincoln set it aside as a day of thanksgiving to God for our many blessings in America. So you can see historically that this day was set aside as one of gratitude toward God. In the present day if you ask people what are they most thankful for they will likely leave out the elephant (God) in the room. People may say their family, their job, or health, but typically the Giver of these gifts is left out. This thanksgiving I want to encourage us to approach gratitude in the right manner. In this article I am going to give us four areas where we should strive to thank God. This of course is not only for this month but also for every month out of the year.

The first area is praising and thanking God for who he is and what he has done for his people. The Lord is worthy of our praise because of his greatness and goodness. King David wrote, "Great is the Lord and greatly to be praised" (Psalm 145:3). Then he wrote in another place, "I give thanks to your name for your steadfast love and your faithfulness" (Psalm 138:2). The Lord is worthy of our praise because he is the greatest being there is. There is none greater than he. We should also thank him because we experience his goodness on a daily basis. As David wrote above, we should thank him for his goodness that we experience. God is good in his nature and in his deeds toward us (Psalm 34:8). Since God is good he always does good to us. Every circumstance that you face is ultimately for your good (Romans 8:28). In the narrow picture it may not seem that way, but God has the big picture and in his infinite wisdom he knows what he is doing with the details of your life (Psalm 139:16). As David once again wrote, "I will give thanks to the Lord with my whole heart; I will recount all of your wonderful deeds"

(Psalm 9:1). Everyone reading this who belongs to Jesus can tell of his great works in your life. The greatest work he performed is saving you (John 3:16). That is why we need to continually thank him for rescuing us from the dreadful position we were once in. The apostle Paul knew the glorious work that God performed in saving us. In gratitude he wrote, 'giving thanks to the Father, who has qualified you to share in the inheritance of the saints in light. He has delivered us from the domain of darkness and transferred us to the kingdom of his beloved Son, in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins" (Colossians 1:12-14). We come into this world as enemies with a holy God (Romans 5:10). His grace in Christ is what delivers us from that hopeless state. Paul again explains, "For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God" (Ephesians 2:8). The gift of salvation is the greatest gift we will ever receive. We should thank the Lord for rescuing us and bringing us into his eternal happiness (Matthew 25:21).

We should also thank the Lord for his earthly blessings. As we look at God's daily provision for us in the details of our earthly lives we have so much to be thankful for (Ephesians 5:20). In your present life, God cares for you (Matthew 6:25-34). We do not have to fear lack of rain or lack of sun (Matthew 5:45). We should thank him that we can live and eat and go on with our lives. In fact, Scripture tells us, " he himself gives to all mankind life and breath and everything (Acts 17:25). Jesus in his instruction of the vine and the branches tells us that, "apart from him we can do nothing" (15:5). That particular context is referring to spiritual growth, but like the verse mentions above it is true that physically we can do nothing apart from God. I met a man a few years ago who had Lou Gehrig's disease. This is a crippling disease that slowly takes away muscle strength to the point where people can no longer breath, leading to death. The gentlemen I was talking to was relying completely on God with his condition. What he told me was the Scriptures that teach we can do nothing apart from God was so real to him. He was so thankful when he was able to do the simplest tasks of life.

Furthermore, the clear teaching of Scripture is that everything God created is good (1 Timothy 4:4). So we should enjoy what he has given us. This close bond means we should give thanks for the body of Christ. The apostle Paul did this when he said he, "did not cease to give thanks" for the churches that he looked after (Ephesians 1:16). May we follow his example.

My prayer is that this article will remind us to be in continual thanksgiving to the Lord in these four areas. Not just this month but every month. To thank him always for everything is God's will for us (1 Thessalonians 5:17). Our mission as a church is to grow in Christ together. One evidence of growth in holiness is to be thankful. People who live lives dominated by sin are ungrateful people, while those closely following the Lord realize that their life is a gift from him. May we be a church that continually gives thanks to our wonderful God.

Dan was a little nervous. His sermon was not specifically a missions sermon, and so not necessarily what the church might expect of a visiting missionary. How would our supporting church that asked him to come preach receive it? But he was confident that it was what God had given him to say.

To Dan's relief, the response was not just positive, but overwhelmingly so. Dozens of people were talking about it after the first service, and telling those who hadn't been there to make sure they heard it in the second.

The most encouraging reaction, though, came from one of the church leaders. After expressing his own encouragement from and appreciation for the message, he related that many of those whom he'd seen talking animatedly with Dan after the services were among the leadership of the church themselves. He felt this was very significant, because after a two-year pastoral search process that still has not yielded the desired results, even the leaders of the church had begun to feel discouragement. He said that Dan's message had not just encouraged them, it had helped confirm their recently developed mission statement, and even helped them see how the new pastor they are still looking for could help them carry that mission forward and vision-cast it for the people in the pews.

What a gracious God we have. From nervousness that a message might not be well-received to confirmation that a simple sermon can help revive a lagging church by being a shot in the arm to its leaders! Another evidence of the power of God's Word, no matter how simply presented.





Stout Family: Macedonia



This picture of Jesus kneeling alone in prayer hangs in the lower level of Eureka Baptist Church, and its story is part of the church's history. As time goes on, the origin stories of certain items and customs often are modified or forgotten. Thankfully, the written word endures. This picture should be preserved as well.

During the River Road Ramble on September 28, 2019, while the warm smell of the egg coffee and the murmur of voices swirled about, Susan Matson shared some seventy- year-old events.

In 1948 twenty-eight year old Harold Salseth accepted the call as pastor of Eureka Baptist Church on the condition that he could attend the Northwestern Bible Institute in Minneapolis a few days each week in preparation for missionary work.

"It was during the time he was our pastor that he painted the picture of Jesus in the Garden," Susan said.

Pastor Salseth's painting is a copy of a famous painting by the German artist Heinrich Hofmann. The original oil painting, called "Christ in the Garden of Gethsemane," was completed in 1890, and it is displayed at the historic Riverside Church in New York City. It is based on Matthew 26:36-46, Mark 14:32-42, and Luke 22:39-46.

"Pastor Salseth also calmed the waters," Susan added with a smile, explaining that the painting on the wall behind the pulpit, painted in the 1930s by V. Andreas, depicted a turbulent river until Harold modified it during his tenure.

Before he left with his family for Africa in 1950, Harold painted baptistry pictures for Baptist churches in Milltown, Taylors Falls, and Windom, Minnesota. He went on to use his talents in many ways throughout his lifetime.

SALSETH, HAROLD OLIVER August 26, 1920 to Dec. 17, 2008

Rev. Harold Salseth, 88, passed away at home in Spring Valley. He was born in Woodville, WI, to Ekard and Gladys Salseth. He graduated from Northwestern Seminary in Minneapolis in 1943, and completed graduate studies at Taylor University, IN, in 1948. On March 21, 1944, Harold married Joan Nelson of Lake Crystal, MN. They served seven years in church ministry and then over 37 years as missionaries in the Belgian Congo, often in turbulent times. Harold had many talents and executive abilities. He was known for his creative art work and writing. He had a great love for the Lord, his family, and friends.
