

# Hard Work Practicing Takes Teenager To Rodeo Arena Titles

Being a champion cowgirl requires a unique dedicated combination. For Baylee Barker that includes several outstanding horses with daily exercise regimen, relentless precision practice and heartfelt desire. It has paid off as the 14-year-old Atlanta, Kansas, cowgirl is the reserve world champion in breakaway roping.

"I am fortunate to have four great horses to ride in different events and I work them daily," the all-around cowgirl said. Her team features Dawn, breakaway: Grey, goat tying: Hooey, team roping: and Yogi, barrel racing and pole bending.

"I practice my roping every day," Baylee said. "I rope both the calf head and the steer head dummies because each event requires different loops. Not that many loops, actually, just so every loop I throw is perfect." Practice roping the real thing is most important of all. "Depending on what rodeos I have lined up, I rope live cattle at least three times a week," Baylee said.

Daughter of Zach and Jane Barker, Baylee has been home schooled since her sixth grade year. "I will continue home schooling during high school which I'll start this fall as a freshman," she said. "I am very serious about my education, but being home schooled does sometimes give me rodeo opportunities," she admitted. "When I get caught up on my studies I can take a break working with my horses or practicing myself."

Perfection with her lariat rope is only part of Baylee's workout. "I enter goat tying too, so that requires additional practice, dismounting, throwing the goat and making

the tie," she said. While youthful rodeo achievements have been many, her latest accolade came at the 2021 National Junior High Finals Rodeo. "It was in Des Moines, Iowa, during June, and I was pleased with my runs," Baylee nodded.

The cowgirl's short-go calf was flagged in 3.28-seconds claiming the world reserve championship. That's speedy wherever the roping's being conducted, but Baylee can be even faster when there's an entry fee on the line. "I did rope calves in just over 2-seconds at some jackpots during the finals," she noted. Roping creates most adrenalin for Baylee, but she's in several other events at most of the rodeos. "I enter breakaway, team roping and ribbon roping as well as goat tying, barrel racing and pole bending," the cowgirl said.

A winner in every event at some time or another, Baylee rides in more than the Junior High Rodeo Association. "I compete in the Kansas Junior Rodeo Association and the Forever Seven Association," she said. "I will be going to the Kansas High School Rodeo Association events starting this fall."

While some likely aren't familiar with the Forever Seven Rodeo Association, it is close to Baylee's heart. "They are family run rodeos in memory of their son who passed away when he was just seven-years-old," Baylee explained. "Those rodeos are really special to be competing at."

No tally on her championship buckles, but the cowgirl already has a collection of almost a handful of trophy saddles. Again, the humble all-around cowgirl was emphatic crediting others for her success. "I couldn't do this without my parents' coaching and strong support," she acknowledged. "Of course, my outstanding horses are such an essential part of every event."

Riding both mares and geldings, the cowgirl's mounts are middle-aged generally with some seasoning. "However, I have a couple of horses that didn't have much arena experience when I got them. They've turned out to be great rodeo mounts," Baylee credited.

Being a rodeo cowgirl isn't a fulltime job for Baylee. "I like to sing and I have a guitar that I'm learning to play," she said. Rodeo is in the cowgirl's future with mindset for an accompanying professional service career. "I want to rodeo during college hopefully get a scholarship to be on a top southern team," Baylee said. "But I won't let rodeo take away from my studies in medical school." She wants to specialize in working with newborn infants who need assistance in the neonatal intensive care unit (NICU).

Dedication to goal makes a champion in the arena and life proven by Baylee Barker.

## Equine Owners and Enthusiasts!

The Kansas Department of Agriculture Division of Animal Health is wanting equine owners to start taking proactive measurers to prevent VSV, Vesicular Stomatitis Virus.

Last year, there was an outbreak across Kansas of VSV. This year, the KDA and KHC want owners to be aware of the symptoms and signs of the virus to help prevent another outbreak from occurring.



# Vesicular Stomatitus Virus (VSV) in Horses

Vesicular stomatitis virus (VSV) is a viral disease that primarily affects horses and cattle and occasionally swine, sheep, goats, llamas, and alpacas. Humans can also become infected with the disease when handling affected animals, resulting in flu-like symptoms, but this is a rare event. Time from exposure to the onset of clinical signs is 2-8 days. Infected premises are placed under quarantine for a minimum of 14 days. VSV is a state reportable disease.







#### Symptoms:

- 1. Excessive salivation
- 2. Lesions in the mouth & nose
- 3. Lack of appetite
- 4. Lesions around the feet
- 5. Lameness
- 6. Teat, prepuce & ear lesions

#### Report:

Vesicular stomatitus is a reportable disease. To report VSV, call the Kansas Division of Animal Health at 785-564-6601.

#### Prevention:

- 1. Strict fly control in and around the farm
  - Manure management and elimination of fly breeding areas
  - Appropriate insecticide use for horses, barns, and outdoor areas
- 2. Do not share equipment, tools, or tack
- Separate suspect animals immediately and report
- Shows, fairs, and rodeos may institute new entry requirements
  - A health certificate issued within 2-5 days prior to an event can be beneficial in reducing risks

# <u>Five Mule Team Pulling 'Jesus Wagon' Gets</u> <u>Attention For Traveling Evangelist's Mission</u>

"Did you see those mules pulling the covered wagons down the highway?" Such query was made dozens of times in recent days and literally thousands of times over the past decade-plus. A most unusual sight slowly trudging down rural roadways with passing traffic gawking, yielding way, anxious to know more.

That's intension of the unique traveler holding lines of five big sorrel mules tugging two big heavily loaded wagons. "I'm traveling the country to tell people about Jesus," Randy Boehmer insisted. Going west on Old 40 Highway in Dickinson County stopped just briefly, messages on wagons verified the mission. "Jesus Saves, Ask Him," is colorfully boldly inscribed on the lead wheeled vehicle, Boehmer the driver, dogs at his feet.

"Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved and thy house," Acts 16:31, emblazes the second wagon. "I don't have a hometown. I just go where the Lord leads me, 31 states in 13-1/2 years," Boehmer said "I intend on doing this the rest of my life; I would not be doing anything else," the intriguing muleteer continued. "I will go and spread the Word and testify about Jesus."

Eager to get back down the country byway, Boehmer handed over a color reprint of his story, objective clearly defined. A taxidermist four decades, Boehmer did originate in Arizona, but drastic life changes put him on the backroads. Cleaning out his parents' garage in 1991 after they'd passed away, Boehmer realized, "Their possessions were disposable. All they'd worked hard for meant nothing in the end." Death of Boehmer's wife from cancer in 1998 further guided his future. "I started reading the Bible and Jesus came into my heart," Boehmer said. "It said I had to turn away from my sins and accept Jesus. And that is what I did.

"God put a desire in my heart to travel around the country in a covered wagon and spread His word." With extensive formal Bible study, Boehmer spent several months enhancing muleskinner knowledge and learning farrier skills to become self-sufficient. He credits the Amish for their advice and encouragement.

The covered wagon was refashioned personally by Boehmer from a farm wagon. His tail along vehicle was made from another old feed trailer. An unusual hitch to certain longtime teamsters, Boehmer has three mules in front and two behind. That's in contrast to common unicorn hitches with two behind and one in front. "These are mules weighing maybe 1,500 pounds, out of Belgian draft mares and Mammoth Jacks," Boehmer clarified for laypersons.

His rigs include a wood stove and bed for year around travel. A solar panel is affixed atop a vehicle to power lights, and a couple additional modern technology devices. Traveling only about four miles per hour, Boehmer has a rotating beacon on the wagon alerting others that he's there. Strong patriotism and acknowledgement of his nation's freedoms, Boehmer proudly flies an American flag in a smaller trailer hooked behind.

Boehmer never knows where he will spend the night. "I just pray, and the Lord always provides," he appreciatively credited. "I get my food at grocery stores along the way, prepare it myself," Boehmer said. Horse feed is bought at local elevators although his team typically gets nourishment while grazing during overnight rest stops. "I generally only have to buy hay in the winter," he commented.

Most of what Boehmer owns is with him. "Things aren't important. Life here on Earth is short compared to eternity," the mule man declared. Pretty much independent, Boehmer receives small monthly financing from his Arizona church. Sometimes, those

intrigued meeting the traveling evangelist offer assistance of various sorts.

Such was the case when Boehmer needed wagon repairs. He camped at Jacque Karl's ranch near Detroit, Kansas, and community members joined offering supplies and other support. "God provides," Boehmer said. "Every day I thank God for the day before, and pray without ceasing for the day to come. "I make a lot of friends along the way. That's the hard part about all of this, having to leave those friends behind when I pull out. But we will all be one big happy family in Heaven one day," he recognized.

Seven verses from the Bible's book of Romans are persistent of Boehmer's initiative on the handout for inquisitors. He emphasizes Romans 10:13: "For whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved." "I am just a simple man with a simple message," Boehmer asserted. "There is no other name than Jesus by which a person can be saved. "A trip ends. But a journey goes on forever," Boehmer said. "It's all about an eternity with Jesus. I will continue this journey until I die, telling other people about Jesus."

#### Kansas Horse Council Announces Equine Economic Impact Survey

MANHATTAN, Kansas — The Kansas Horse Council, with support from the Kansas Department of Agriculture, is seeking equine owners across Kansas to participate in an Equine Economic Impact survey to generate data and information regarding this segment of the Kansas livestock industry.

The equine industry in Kansas is relatively small, compared to production livestock; however, equine ownership positively impacts the Kansas economy and should be recognized for its contributions. The equine sector in Kansas is an evolving sector that typically includes all forms of Equidae (sometimes known as the horse family) and may include educational, artistic, sport, leisure, therapeutic, and working classes of equines.

As part of the Kansas Ag Growth Strategy, leaders from throughout the Kansas equine industry collaborated in the development and implementation of long-term strategic growth goals with input and discussion among key stakeholders. One published outcome includes completing an economic impact study which led to development of the Equine Economic Impact survey.

The purpose of this survey is to assess the current economic contributions of the equine sector to Kansas. The equine sector is an economically diverse industry, and this survey will include all horse ownership regardless of use. Direct ownership provides a ripple effect supporting sales and service industries by virtue of adjunct needs, such as grain, hay, transport services, real estate, fuel, truck/trailer/tires service and sale, veterinary, farrier and so forth. Information may help identify opportunities for new niche markets or expansion of existing business and services where needs might be identified. Data should reveal relevant information to help update labor statistics in the equine industry.

The Equine Economic Impact survey is voluntary. The survey will be open through December. To take the survey, please visit <a href="www.tinyurl.com/equineks">www.tinyurl.com/equineks</a>. 


