
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

Teenager Proves Horsemanship Skills As Repeat Highpoint 4-H State Fair Winner

A young horsewoman's dedicated hard work combined with a "phenomenal" horse make repeat champions.M Jackson and SLJ Smart Lil Okie, affectionately called JJ, won the highpoint 4-H horseshow award at the Kans State Fair. What makes the honor even more impressive is that it was the second consecutive year for the ho rider team.

"I love showing horses and am fortunate to have such a great horse," said the 15-year-old Brewster High Sch sophomore. "Mallory spends lots of time perfecting her riding skills, and it has paid off," credited mom Melanic of Colby.

JJ is a 19-year-old sorrel Quarter Horse mare with a proven performance record. "We are a team and work we together," Mallory appreciated. Actually only riding five years, Mallory started out with another older sorrel Quarters mare called Piggy. "We really didn't know much about horses or showing when she began, but we both time studying," Melanie noted. "I did everything I could on Piggy, learned by losing, but just kept practicing," Madmitted.

Occasionally seeking advice from professional horse trainers, the mother-daughter team learned together. "M has provided lots of encouragement and been a great coach," Mallory appreciated.

Participating in 4-H horse activities, the young horse woman rode at local horseshows in Thomas and surrour counties. As her skills improved, Mallory acquired a retired black and white Paint Horse. "Prince was 21-years with show experience and we did well together," she noted. However, to advance further, Mallory donated Printhe Colby College Equestrian Team and found JJ. "She was a winning reining horse, and her previous owners actually sought out Mallory for her," Melanie said. "JJ is a great horse, but Mallory had to spend time learning to ride to her mount's ability. Still, Mallory is truly a natural working with horses," Melanie emphasized.

With outdoor and indoor riding facilities, Mallory was on horseback while classmates were often in other socia activities. "I really always want to show my horse to her best abilities," Mallory said Obviously, the young horsewoman's objective has been met and proven with repeat performances at the state fair in Hutchinson. A remarkable achievement, the highpoint championship was accomplished competing against a record number horseshow entries this year.

Anybody is pleased to win one class but Mallory and her great mount won five. They were first in reining, ranc riding pattern, ranch rail, level IV horsemanship and trail. Top that, the horse-rider team placed second in both English equitation and horsemanship. They were third in ranch trail, fifth English pleasure, sixth Western pleas and 10th showmanship. "The overall championship is determined by the highest point exhibitor in all events," Melanie noted.

"JJ is truly an all-around horse, and I am very conscientious to ride the patterns with precision," Mallory said.

Having competed successfully in speed events, the horsewoman most enjoys perfecting her horsemanship sleeformance classes. "Mallory did well in racing competition with a horse she donated to a Garden City therage horsemanship program," Melanie acknowledged.

In addition, Mallory won the state 4-H horse public speaking contest. She has attained the Level IV Horsemar designation based on her riding ability, interview and testing.

"Before the state fair, I showed JJ at the American Quarter Horse Junior World Show in Oklahoma City," Malk said. "That was a different level and a great experience." They placed 40th out of 196 entries in the ranch ridi class.

Appreciating the work and knowledge necessary to succeed in horse competition, Mallory helps younger hors owners. "I really enjoy assisting 4-H members' increase their abilities with horses," she said. On top of serving 4-H club, Mallory is treasurer of the Brewster FFA Chapter. "I like to participate in all 4-H and FFA activities ar especially enjoy livestock judging," she said.

Raising two foals out of a mare she owned, Mallory sold them as weanlings. "I learned so much about breedir producing horses from that experience," she said. To expand her personal horse training abilities, Mallory has acquired a prospect from an area breeder. "I intend to train him myself and show in the 4-H pleasure futurities state fair," she said.

Again recognizing her Mom's assistance with horses, Mallory also credits her older sister. "Miah doesn't have interests in showing personally but she's a big help for me getting ready for competition," Mallory appreciated.

Uncertain about her career, Mallory knows she'll be lifelong involved with horses. "I am still considering what direction my education will go," she said. "Horse health is very important to me, so I will probably pursue studi veterinary science."

Participation on an equitation team is a strong possibility during her college years.

with her proven abilities, champion horse exhibitor Mallory Jackson insisted, "I definitely want to help others improve their horsemanship skills."

The numerous circles of equine enthusiasts coming together for this event made Colby feel like homecoming!




Saturday, October 3rd was KHC Region 3 Trail Ride at Historic Lake Scott coordinated by Alisha Owens.



Making the buzzer is the first requirement of becoming a champion rodeo rough stock contestant. Jesse Pope scored on all but one of 42 bareback bronc rides this year in the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association (PRCA). Equally as important, many of the world's bucking horses were among his draws earning the cowboy big rodeo checks.

His career best ride came this year at Des Moines, Iowa, where Pope marked 91.5 points or Three Hills Rodeo's Weenie worth \$2,897. Put it together, Jesse Pope, Waverly, Kansas, na has qualified for his first National Finals Rodeo (NFR).

"Ever since I was little, I dreamed about calling home to tell Mom and Dad that I made the N got to do that, and it was everything I dreamed it would be," Pope admitted. Now on the Miss Valley College Vikings Rodeo Team, Pope lists Marshall, Missouri, as his address. Thursday afternoon, Pope flew to Fort Worth, Texas, where he visited before attending the Friday wed of champion bull rider Sage Kimzey.

"I haven't stopped smiling since I locked in my slot to the NFR. I am very grateful," Pope

appreciated. "I'm grateful to my family and friends for their support as I chase my dream. "Grateful to my sponsors for helping me get up and down the rodeo road. Grateful to the rodeo committees who took the risks to make rodeos happen after the coronavirus shut everything down."

When the PRCA world standings were posted September 30, Pope had won \$49,611.85, sir the season started October 1, 2019. That put him 11th in the world, with the Top 15 moneywinning bareback bronc riders qualifying for the NFR.

After being in Las Vegas for a number of years, the 2020 NFR has moved to Arlington, Texa December 3-12, 2020.

"Traveling across the country to rodeos is a major ordeal and my sponsors relieve some of the pressures," Pope acknowledged. His corporate sponsors include Rock & Roll Denim, Panha Western Wear and Resistol. "I visited a couple of them today," he said Thursday. "I really like their clothing. They're such great people, outstanding supporters of rodeo. "I'm proud to have Emporia Livestock, Veach Leather and T Bar T Cattle also as sponsors," Pope appreciated.

As if the 21-year-old, 170-pound, 5-foot-10-inch cowboy isn't busy enough on the pro rodeo he's a fulltime college student. "I'm a senior in public relations at Missouri Valley," Pope explained. "To be able to be a fulltime college student and a professional rodeo cowboy requipod communications with my instructors."

"Having a rodeo team scholarship has also been an asset to my rodeo career," Pope noted. Competing in National Intercollege Rodeo Association events, Pope adds to his impre rodeo career. "I've qualified for the National College Rodeo Finals every year," he said.

Coronavirus issues did cancel the 2020 college finals. "However, they've extended my eligib so I'll continue to rodeo as a fifth year college student," Pope noted. "Ken Mason is a phenomenal bareback bronc riding coach," Pope declared. "Coach Mason has an inherent to for improving bareback bronc riders."

Tim O'Connell, Zwingle, Iowa, who's leading the yearend PRCA bareback riding standings, halso been coached by Mason. "Tim is a Missouri Valley College graduate and a good friend I frequently travel with," Pope said.

Bret and Jennifer Pope of Garnett, the bareback rider's parents, receive considerable appreciation from their son. "Mom and Dad were always encouraging me while I was growin They went out of their way to make sure I was at the rodeos," Pope said. "Dad never compe rodeo but he and Mom are my biggest supporters."

Little brothers are following in Jesse Pope's boot steps. "Ty is a freshman on the Missouri Va Rodeo Team. Judd is a Waverly freshman competing in high school rodeos," Pope said.

Rodeo titles are nothing new for the NFR qualifier. He was the Kansas High School Rodeo A Around Champion in 2016. "I've concentrated on bareback bronc riding in college and professional rodeos," Pope said.

Only planning to mount two bareback bucking horses at college rodeos before the NFR, Popededicated in his workouts. "I really can't take the risk getting on bucking horses for the next weeks," he said. "I have a stringent daily regimen on the bucking machine, spurring board an stretching exercises."

While Pope has mounted ten bucking horses ten days in a row before, the NFR will be differ "These will be the best bareback broncs and the best cowboys in rodeo," he qualified. "With high payout in every round and the average, anybody in the Top 15 could end up being a wochampion. I'm getting my mind and body in shape so that can be me," Pope analyzed.

4H State Horse Show Exhibitors Warm Up for the 2020 Show

Cancelation Of State's Biggest Attraction Puts Kansas State Fair In Financial Bind

"We did not have a Kansas State Fair this year." David Tobias, interim general manager of the state's biggest annual event at Hutchinson, was most emphatic reiterating the fact.

Like many activities throughout the world, the state fair was canceled due to coronavirus health concerns. However, the elaborate state fairgrounds facilities still must be sustained without the annual income to do so. Two hundred eighty acres comprise the Kansas State Fairgrounds including 70 buildings all together maintained by 26 employees.

Contrary to common belief, the state of Kansas provides no fiscal appropriations for this facility which represents a state entity. The Kansas State Fair is a separate body unrelated to any state programs. "The Kansas State Fair is a fee-funded agency. We do not get funding from the state," Tobias clarified.

Upon cancelation of the state fair two months ago, the former general manager resigned. With 9½-years' experience working for the Kansas State Fair, Tobias was then appointed to the interim position. Since 2018 legislative action, the fair does get a percentage of state sales tax generated on the grounds, Tobias noted.

"We live by concert tickets, gate admissions, vendor rentals, sponsorships, and competitive entries. Obviously that has all been very little this year," Tobias said. "About 90 percent of our income is from fair-time revenue in 10 days, with the rest from non-fair building rentals. Due to the fair cancellation and lack of anticipated revenue, the fair's current operating shortfall is \$2.3 million," Tobias said.

"In clarification the Kansas State Fair celebrates the best of Kansas communities, commerce, youth and food," said Amy Bickel. "It's also the larges gathering of Kansans every September since the first official fair in 1913," the marketing director explained. "This is the first year the state fair has been canceled."

Kansas State Fair survived through the Spanish Flu pandemic of 1918 and nearly canceled in 1945 due to World War II, but the war ended during August and the fair continued.

According to a 2018 Department of Agriculture report, the fair has a \$74.6 million annual impact on the State of Kansas economy. Also, there's a \$40 million-plus impact in just a 60-mile radius around Hutchinson, Tobias pointed out. "We have contacted Commerce Secretary David Toland, who indicated we need to work with Washington to secure funding," Tobias said. "The International Association of Fairs and Expositions has spearheaded legislation for \$500 million to help preserve the fair," he added.

"We are also looking at micro events that could help generate some funding," Bickel said.

While there was not a Kansas State Fair, livestock competitions did continue, according to Jenn Galloway, livestock events coordinator. Youth including 4-H and FFA members work all year on projects to exhibit at Hutchinson' Kansas State Fair during September. "The Grand Drive weekend, our premier youth livestock show, attracts more than 800 youth exhibitors and 3,000 entries," Galloway said. More than 10,000 youth projects are entered annually at the Kansas State Fair. In 2019, that included 2,200 photography exhibits, 935 rabbits and 1,616 food entries. "In 2020, we still hosted live the 4-H horse show, the Grand Drive, poultry, dairy cattle and dairy goat shows," Galloway noted.

Virtual static competitions were conducted for other youth projects. "In a normal year, we have 4,800 open exhibitors, including both livestock and static entries," Galloway said. Only 1,300 open exhibitors participated this year because there were no static entries such as baking, gardening and

quilts. "However, in the open livestock division, 652 cattle were exhibited, the most ever, and double a normal year," Galloway said.

"Traditionally nearly 700 vendors rent space to promote their products at the Kansas State Fair. About 85 percent of them are from Kansas," Bickel said.

"Facing unparalleled challenges, our full time staff remains committed to do everything they can to continue the longstanding celebration," Tobias said. "We all hope the fair will sustain these unprecedented times and hope to bring the tradition back in 2021."

The Kansas Fairgrounds Foundation is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization dedicated to supporting special needs for the fair. "That group is offering financial assistance at this time," Tobias credited.

Donations can be made to the Kansas Fairgrounds Foundation, 2000 North Poplar, Hutchinson, Kansas, 67502. "Entire amount of donations goes to the Kansas State Fair," Tobias promised.

The "Kansas Cares About The Fair 2020" campaign was developed to help in this time of need," according to Bickel. "Individuals can give online at KansasStateFair.com by clicking donate. All funds go entirely to the Kansas State Fair. Your gift, large or small, will help secure the future of the Kansas State Fair for generations to come," Bickel said. "We continue 'Celebrating All Things Kansas' until we meet again. Stay strong, Kansas."

You must contact the Hillsdale Park Office to reserve a campsite in the Saddle Ridge Equestrian Campground at Hillsdale State Park.

Allowing only equestrians in these parks, is safer for everyone. Equestrians have limited, designate areas, and this helps to preserve them.

While visiting our State Parks, please don't litter on the trails. If you pack it in, pack it out. And clearly your pens prior to departing.

With the current restrictions due to COVID 19, please call before you haul to any event, trail ride or activity.






