

The Instrumentalists

Michael Nolan was born in Croydon in 1961 but has been an adopted Scot for nearly forty years. He was one of the first music students to attend St. Mary's Music School in Edinburgh, where he studied composition with Hugh MacDonald and Geoffrey King, piano with Colin Kingsley and organ with Dennis Townhill. He went on to study piano and composition for several years with the pianist-composer Ronald Stevenson.

After two decades working in community music and as an arts development officer, he read film and media studies at the University of Stirling, and recently completed an M. Sc. In Nordoff-Robbins music therapy. He now has his own practice based in Dunblane where he is also Organist and Choirmaster at St. Blane's Church.

Regularly spotted behind the piano at silent film screenings across Scotland since 1995, Mike has composed several soundtracks for DVD releases by Panamint Cinema and the Scottish Screen Archive. His next project is to improvise the piano accompaniment for a forthcoming compilation of films about the Glasgow Empire Exhibition of 1938.

Jean Thewlis (*violin*) studied at the Royal Scottish Academy of Music and Drama, with Louis Carus and Leonard Friedmann, gaining both the professional and teacher's diploma. She was a string tutor with Stirling Council for many years, and, as well as teaching, coached string groups and orchestras. She is a member of the Scottish Fiddle Orchestra and frequently plays in a variety of chamber groups.

Fiona Shearer (*'cello*). attended school and university in Edinburgh and played an active part in the musical life of both. Since 1991, she has been teaching 'cello for Central Region and then Falkirk Council. A chamber music enthusiast, Fiona also helps run the Dunblane Cathedral Arts Guild and last year helped found the Dunblane Chamber Orchestra.

Our Conductor and Narrator this Evening

Sandy Sinclair is a native of Leith, which he thinks of as the capital of Edinburgh. He was educated at Leith Academy and Edinburgh University from which he graduated with a Bachelor of Music degree deep in the mists of time. Having taught music in Scottish Secondary schools for forty five years without losing his sanity altogether, he continues to involve himself in musical activities as conductor of Stirling Male Voice Choir and Govan Gaelic Choir as well as Clackmannanshire Choral Society and was formerly conductor of Stirling Gaelic Choir. He has also pursued an interest in the works of Robert Burns for many years with several local Burns clubs and is particularly grateful to Gerry Docherty and the members of The Alman Dramatic Club for their cooperation in bringing this celebratory event to fruition and to Gerry personally for his helpful advice in finalising the script.

The Alman Dramatic Club

In 1940, 14 ladies founded The Alman Dramatic Club. The title is derived from the names of the town of Alloa and the area of Clackmannan. The first two years of the club only involved meetings and readings but no performances. Since 1942, however, at least 2 plays a year have been produced by the club.

In July 1953 the club moved into the Coach-House theatre. The seating area and stage were originally the hayloft for the horses that served the Inglewood House and lived below. With seating for only 65 people, a visit to the theatre is an intimate experience. You are as near the action on-stage as you can get. The Coach-House is a listed building and in urgent need of renovation, particularly the roof. Larger productions are being staged at other venues, such as the Devonvale Hall, to help raise the necessary funds.

The club has its own collection of props and costumes and more recently, new and improved sound and lighting facilities have been purchased.

The Alman are always interested in new members on and off-stage at the Coach House Theatre, particularly with the costume department.
