

2024 is in the books! It was a year of learning, changing and doing that has me excited for the upcoming challenges and opportunities that we face. While some of these are unknown, it is a good time to preview what lies ahead.

First, we are expanding and building on our programming. While we don't have a 100% complete picture of ALL that we are going to do, we do know we are going to do more. Our off-site tour program will be expanded, you'll see us out at Clinton Grove (not just for Cemetery Walk!), downtown and anywhere else we can bring history home. Our History by the Plate, where we "take over" a location for some historical fun and a meal will have at least two, and likely more, dates in the upcoming year. Additionally, we are going to hold a Spring Open House, in a similar vein to our Christmas Open House, but focusing on new exhibits, volunteer opportunities for the year and beginning a push to increase membership. This year we will have a focus on the Fire Department, a bookend from last year's Cemetery Walk, and the rich and vibrant history of the firefighters who have called Mount Clemens home. Finally, we have crafted, in partnership with Detroit History Tours and The Detroit History Club, an escape room style program for the Crocker House to diversify the ways people can experience the house and our history.

We are also going to be focusing on developing a sustainable, and varied children's program for the Crocker House. This will not be a solo project, meaning we are actively seeking, exploring and using partnerships in Mount Clemens to craft and implement this programming. While this isn't easy it is the road to sustained and vibrant children's programming.

In other areas we are continuing the work that has traditionally gone on at the Crocker House, preservation of the property in particular. We will be working on repairs of the porch, fencing and the house's exterior. As you, the membership, know the work of preservation is continuous, but well worth the time and energy needed to perpetuate our mission.

Of course we are keeping our pillars and premier events like the Pottery Luncheon on Saturday April 5th, 2025 and our Cemetery Walk on Saturday October 4th, 2025, but we are also adding new events this year. We can't wait to see you there, and we can't wait to see what else this year brings.

Take a look at our preliminary schedule, found in this issue, and know it is far from complete. We are going to be adding more before our next issue in March and more as the year goes on. As always we want to hear from you. If you have a question, reach out. If you have an exhibit idea or want, likewise let us know!


2024 Cemetery Walk
