"Buckling your seat belt is the law in Illinois - and your best defense if you're in a crash," said Stephane B. Seck-Birhame, IDOT's bureau chief of Safety Programs and Engineering. "If you think you might drink or use drugs, plan to designate a sober driver so your and everyone else's Thanksgiving holiday is safe and filled with memories you'll cherish for a lifetime."

During the Thanksgiving holiday period from Nov. 22-26 in Illinois last year, IDOT reported 2,842 crashes, including 16 people killed in 16 crashes, six of which involved alcohol.

"The Thanksgiving holiday is a time for getting together with friends and family," said ISP Division of Patrol Col. Chris Owen. "But if you're planning to drink when you get together, especially the Wednesday before Thanksgiving, often called Blackout Wednesday or Drinksgiving, make sure to arrange a ride share, designate a sober driver or have someone who isn't drinking pick you up. And always make sure to wear a seat belt. People will be thankful you did."

State law requires that all vehicle occupants wear seat belts, no matter where they are in the vehicle. If you're traveling with children, remember they are required to ride in a child safety seat until at least age 8 in Illinois.

The increased traffic enforcement is made possible through federal funds administered by IDOT and supported by ISP and local law enforcement. The effort coincides with IDOT's "It's Not a Game" radio, digital and TV campaign, which reminds the public of the consequences of impaired driving as well as distracted driving, work zone safety, pedestrian safety, motorcycle awareness and occupant safety. 

Drones

The use of unmanned aircraft, or drones, for any aspect of hunting or recovery of wildlife is unlawful in Illinois.

"Not only is drone use for hunting unlawful in Illinois, it goes against the spirit of fair chase and widely accepted hunting ethics," said Jed Whitchurch, director of the IDNR Office of Law Enforcement. "Illinois Conservation Police officers are monitoring for drone use during the fall and winter hunting seasons. We encourage all hunters to familiarize themselves with the Wildlife Code and abide by the law."

The unlawful use of drones for hunting could result in enforcement action, including but not limited to the seizure and forfeiture of unlawfully used equipment. Hunters are advised to review all requirements of the Illinois Wildlife Code, which regulates the taking of wildlife and the use of unmanned aircraft in these situations (520 ILCS 5/2.33(i) and 520 ILCS 5/1.20).

Artificial intelligence

Artificial intelligence, or AI, is gaining popularity as a resource for answers about hunting regulations. But a review of AI-generated answers to common hunting questions in Illinois shows this underdeveloped tool frequently provides flawed, conflicting, or incorrect answers.

"AI-generated information can pose a real problem when it comes to hunting laws, which can be very specific and nuanced based on the season, site, or situation," said Phil Borsdorf with IDNR's Hunter Heritage Program. "Our advice is to rely on primary sources for hunting information, such as the Digest of Hunting and Trapping Regulations, IDNR's Hunt Illinois website, and the state wildlife code."

E-bikes

As electric bikes, or e-bikes, have become more popular, some hunters have found them to be convenient, affordable vehicles for reaching remote hunting sites. However, these bikes are prohibited on IDNR-owned and operated lands for any reason, including hunting and trapping access, except on public access roads or designated bike trails.

Hunters can visit individual state park websites or contact park site offices for more information about bike trail accessibility.

As recently as last week, Illinois Conservation Police received a complaint about a hunter using an e-bike in the woods at the Peabody-River King State Fish and Wildlife Area in St. Clair County. Upon further investigation, the hunter was cited for having an expired e-bike permit, transporting an uncased bow, and other offenses.

IDPH Urges Illinoisans to Celebrate Thanksgiving Holiday Safely by Taking Precautions Against Food-borne and Respiratory Illnesses

While risk of respiratory viruses is lower than recent years, hosts are still urged to provide good ventilation for gatherings, stress hand hygiene & covering coughs

The Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) is reminding Illinoisans to celebrate the 2024 Thanksgiving holiday safely by taking precautions to protect everyone from foodborne illnesses as well as uninvited guests - those seasonal viruses that may be circulating. Hosts can protect their guests by following basic food safety steps, including keeping hot foods hot, cold foods cold, and properly thawing frozen turkeys before roasting them.

"Thanksgiving is one of my favorite holidays," said IDPH Director Dr. Sameer Vohra. "I love the food, spending time with family and friends, and the football. As we gather in community this week, I want to remind everybody, and especially those preparing food, that we can prevent unwanted illnesses by following proven food safety tips. Two of the most important are: thoroughly thaw frozen turkeys in the fridge and make sure the turkey and stuffing are cooked to a safe temperature of 165° Fahrenheit."

IDPH's Seasonal Respiratory Illness Dashboard currently indicates low levels of seasonal respiratory illnesses such as flu, COVID-19 and RSV, but activity is expected to pick up as the weather cools and activities move indoors.

Director Vohra also stresses that hosts can enhance the safety of guests by providing proper indoor ventilation, encouraging good hand hygiene, and reminding guests to cover coughs and sneezes. If someone is feeling sick with respiratory symptoms such as fever, cough or sore throat or other symptoms, such as diarrhea or vomiting, it is best to stay away from others until the illness passes. If staying away from others is not possible, wear a mask and eat at a distance from others, and wash hands before touching any common food sources or other objects.

The best way to protect yourself from seasonal viruses is being adequately vaccinated. The FDA and CDC have approved 2024-2025 seasonal vaccines for COVID-19 and flu as well as updated who can receive the RSV vaccines. The new COVID-19 and flu shots are recommended for everyone over the age of 6 months. And RSV vaccine is recommended for everyone 75 years and older, as well as those 60 to 74 who are at increased risk for severe RSV, who didn't receive the vaccine last season. Pregnant people and young babies born between October and March should also get immunized for RSV.

When it comes to food safety, the CDC offers tips on how properly cook a turkey and avoid serious foodborne illnesses such as Salmonellosis. The first step is to safely thaw the bird. When turkey begins to thaw, any germs or bacteria that may have been present before freezing can begin to grow again. This is why food safety experts recommend thawing turkeys in the refrigerator. It takes about 24 hours for every five pounds of turkey to thaw in the refrigerator, so it can take three days to thaw a 15-pound bird. If you don't have time to use the refrigerator, you can use a sink of cold water (change water every 30 minutes), or a microwave. Never thaw your turkey by leaving it out on the counter.

The four main steps for food safety are:

Clean – Wash your hands for at least 20 seconds with soap and water before, during, and after preparing your food, especially before and after handling turkey, and before eating. Wash cutting boards, utensils, dishes, and countertops with hot soapy water after preparing raw turkey and before you prepare the next item.

Separate – Raw turkey and its juice can contaminate anything they touch. Keep the turkey and its juices separate from foods that won't be cooked and fully clean and sanitize surfaces that come into contact with turkey and its juices to prevent harmful germs from spreading to other

food or your family and friends. Use one cutting board or plate for raw meat, poultry, and seafood and a separate cutting board or plate for produce, bread, and other foods that won't be cooked.

Cook – Use a food thermometer to check if the turkey and stuffing have reached a safe internal temperature of 165° F.Take the temperature in three places – the thickest part of the breast, the innermost part of the thigh, and the innermost part of the wing. For stuffing, make sure the stuffing's center reaches 165°F.

Chill – For leftovers to be safe to keep, they must be refrigerated within two hours of serving or have been kept hot at or above 140°F or cold below 40°F. Discard any foods that sat out for more than two hours at room temperature. After eating, divide the remaining food into small containers and refrigerate or freeze it.Leftovers are safe in the fridge for up to four days. Reheat all leftovers to at least 165°F before serving or eating.

An easy rule is keep hot foods hot and cold foods cold. And avoid food handling mistakes like thawing food on the counter or peeling fruits without washing them first.

Typical symptoms of foodborne illness include vomiting, diarrhea, stomach cramps, fever, and nausea, which can start anywhere from hours to days after consuming contaminated food or drinks. Symptoms can last from a few hours to a few days. It is important to stay hydrated when you have diarrhea and vomiting. Those at risk of severe or life-threatening foodborne illness include older adults, infants, young children, pregnant women, and people with weakened immune systems. If you become severely ill, or if you are at risk for more severe disease, seek care from a medical provider to ensure a proper diagnosis and appropriate illness management.

Doe a Deer ... Just the Facts – Deer Fun Facts:

From wildlifeillinois.org/identify-wildlife/white-tailed deer

- The white-tailed deer is the state mammal of Illinois and is the only native deer
- A white-tailed deer can jump 8 feet high or 30 feet in length.
- It is illegal to feed deer in Illinois because of concerns about Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD).
- White-tailed deer are the largest native herbivore in Illinois and are an integral part of the Illinois landscape.

• Deer hunting has a positive impact on the Illinois economy. Deer can be legally hunted in Illinois during set seasons in the fall and winter. The Illinois Digest of Hunting and Trapping Regulations provides season dates and limits.

• White-tailed deer stand 3-3.5 feet tall at the shoulder. Adult males (bucks) weigh 150 to 250 pounds, and adult females (does) weigh 100 to 150 pounds.

• White-tailed deer occur in every county in Illinois. The highest densities of deer in Illinois are associated with wooded areas of the watersheds of the major rivers, especially the Mississippi, Rock, Illinois, and Kaskaskia rivers, and in the Shawnee Hills.

• The first modern deer hunting season was held in 1957 in 33 counties. Some form of hunting, firearm, or archery now occurs in every county, and the annual

deer harvest often exceeds 150,000.

• Family groups include an adult doe, her fawn(s), and her female young from the previous year (matriarchy). Bucks do not typically associate with does except during the breeding season. Bucks may group together in small bachelor herds.

• Deer become active at dusk when they leave their beds to go out and feed. They may rest during the night and forage again near dawn, or they may continue feeding throughout the night.


