"MAKING IT MODERN" EXHIBITION Docent Summary Notes on LINE

In the visual arts, **LINE** is a mark or stroke long in proportion to its' breadth: the trace of a moving point, or, as Paul Klee famously said, "*A line is a dot that went for a walk*".

Short lines repeated (parallel or intersecting) produce tone or texture and often indicate volume or shadow as in **JUAN GRIS'** Still Life with Tablecloth.

LINE can outline shapes or figures as in <u>MILTON AVERY'S</u> *Nude Alone*, the two <u>MATISSE</u> *Photogravure of Drawings*, and <u>CHAGALL'S</u> *My Village*.

Sometimes artists make line the subject of their composition as in <u>MOTHERWELL'S</u> The Big Four, certainly in <u>MORRIS LOUIS'S</u> Number 2-00, and perhaps in the two photograms by <u>MAN RAY.</u>

BRAQUE gives us **LINE** as birds (or birds as line) in *Les Martines*.

<u>ALEXANDER CALDER</u> was a master with line's potential for expressing whimsy in the tail of his *Lizard*, and in the playful linear elements in *Butterflies and Spiral*. Note that in the spiral's center we can ask if we are looking at black on white, or white on black?

The fluidity of softly brushed (painterly) line appears in **BYRON BROWN'S** Fugue, and **DUFY'Ss** The Arno in Florence. The same can be said of **PICASSO'S** Grande Plaque: Tete

Sculpturally line defines the graceful contours and concave/convex surfaces of **ARCHIPENKO'S** *Flat Torso* and **GUITOU KNOOP'S** *1on1*.
