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HUGH KAPTUR:

ORGANIC DESERT ARCHITECTURE

We are proud to present local icon Hugh Kaptur. With more than 200 built projects in the Palm Springs area, Hugh Kaptur (b. 1931) played an extraordinary role in the city's architectural development.

A visionary designer, Kaptur established his practice in 1956 and continues to work today on civic and residential projects. Kaptur developed a bold modern aesthetic inspired by the desert architecture of Arizona and the work of Frank Lloyd Wright. This

organic, sculptural style became his signature and is immediately recognizable in buildings including Fire Station No. 4, Casa Blanca (Musicland) Motor Hotel, and Tahquitz Plaza, among others.

This exhibition traces Kaptur's career from the late 1950s to the present and showcases his dynamic renderings, which reveal his flair for drawing and capture the innovative spirit of Palm Springs's modern architecture. Focusing on a number of Kaptur's most iconic projects, the exhibition features a wealth of material drawn from the museum's Kaptur Collection along with new photographs by Dan Chavkin.

CONTRASTS:

PROMISED GIFTS FROM THE KAPLAN-OSTERGAARD GLASS COLLECTION

April 13—September 15, 2019

Budget: \$42,000



During the first decade of the American studio glass movement, the sharing and collaboration of techniques and ideas played a significant role in its advancement. As the initial glass pioneers became teachers and mentors, their independent thinking and contrasting approaches evolved.

The exhibition presents works in the collection of David Kaplan and Glenn Ostergaard that are promised gifts to the

museum. Kaplan and Ostergaard have explained that they were first attracted to the properties of glass that captivate the eye, especially its play with light and reflective attributes. However, they soon discovered that it was the contrasts in artistic and technical methods that inspired their appreciation. As their collecting grew to be more global, this variety and a wide range of diverse practices emerged as a central theme.

This selection of glass sculptures represents part of a larger group of 85 promised gifts to the Palm Springs Art Museum from the Kaplan-Ostergaard Glass Collection, and highlights the myriad creative possibilities in making blown, cast, and kiln formed glass.

BRAVE NEW WORLDS:

EXPLORATIONS IN SCULPTURE

Brave New Worlds invites you to enter the creative universes of five contemporary artists through immersive installations.

Motivated by the artistic legacies of Southern California as a place of experimentation and a space for self-fulfillment, these artists use their own visual, sonic, and sensual aesthetic languages to construct worlds that both challenge creative convention and ignite our senses.

Using tactile textures, vivid colors, soundscapes, and dreamy compositions, projects include those by Kelly Akashi, Gisela Colon, Victoria Fu, Karen Lofgren, and Adee Roberson.

Each weaves a distinctive constellation of sculptural and pictorial forms to explore spiritual practice, light and space, and a contemporary perspective on embodied experience.

Limited edition artworks and a publication will be created for this exhibition.

KELLY AKASHI composes sculptural installations that emphasize time, body, and ephemerality. Shifting between materials such as glass, bronze, light, and water, Akashi's works are composed to create surprising contrasts that emphasize the natural magic of everyday forms.



GISELA COLON has developed a vocabulary of organic minimalism, breathing life-like qualities into reductive forms. Her sculptures transform with light and color, capturing, reflecting, and refracting the environment that surrounds them.



VICTORIA FU uses film and video to create textured and color-filled installations that expand the narrowness of contemporary vision into physical space. She is a 2015 Guggenheim Fellow.



KAREN LOFGREN works from a feminist, decolonial perspective. Exploring ritual, history, and mythology, her sculptures represent relationships between cultural systems and the wild. She received a 2019 Pollock-Krasner Grant and a Fulbright.



ADEE ROBERSON weaves sonic and familial archives into her paintings and performances. Landscape, color, rhythm, and spirit combine to transmute energies from past into present, playing in the expansiveness of Blackness.

GERALD CLARKE: ON BEING CAHUILLA

January 18—May 31, 2020

During winter 2020 we are privileged to organize the first mid-career survey of this California Cahuilla Band of Indians artist.

Gerald Clarke (b. 1967) lives with his wife and two daughters in his ancestral reservation home and ranch in Anza where he raises cattle as his father, grandfather, and other Cahuilla Indians have done since the Spanish Colonial period. An Indian, cowboy, artist, university professor, and tribal leader, Clarke's art and life are intertwined with the past, present, and future.

Combining various media in his sculptures, paintings, and installations, he derives inspiration from his homeland's cultural heritage and

its desert and mountain environment to express traditional ideas in surprising and contemporary forms. Utilizing wit and humor as a tool to expose stereotypes and prejudice, Clarke brings a Native American perspective to critical social, economic, and environmental issues facing our world today. Designed to travel to two or three additional venues, this exhibition will be accompanied by a major catalogue with essays by prominent Native American scholars. In addition, a limited edition will be produced featuring an original artwork by the artist.

ALEXANDER GIRARD: A DESIGNER'S UNIVERSE

November 23, 2019—March 1, 2020 Palm Springs Art Museum, Annenberg Wing Organized by **Brooke Hodge**, Director of Architecture and Design Budget: \$240,000



Alexander Girard (1907-1993) was one of the most important designers of the 20th century. He created stunning interiors for private homes, restaurants, corporate offices, and even airplanes! He created textiles, typography, and tableware, and designed exhibitions, toys, and a whole city street in Columbus, Indiana.

Inspired by folk art (which he collected and eventually gifted to the International Folk Art Museum in Santa Fe) and pop art, Girard created a bold, colorful, charismatic universe.

He warmed up modernism with his whimsical, optimistic patterns and designs. This exhibition, organized by Vitra Design Museum (Germany), presents the colorful world of Girard through more than 400 objects: textiles, drawings, furniture, graphics, film, and folk art.

Exhibition visitors will experience one of his best-known interiors—that of the 1957 Miller House in Columbus, Indiana—through a full-scale replica of its iconic conversation pit, which will function as gallery seating as well as a space for public programs.

Plans are underway for future exhibitions at Palm Springs Art Museum in Palm Desert. The Galen and the Faye Sarkowsky Sculpture Garden present ongoing and temporary exhibitions of internationally important art in different media, including sculpture, painting, photography, and new media.
