GAC Committee

For the year 2011-2012, the first GAC meeting was held at 7 p.m. Tuesday, September 6th at the WJV office. The chairperson, 5 committee members, and board liaison were in attendance. After meeting new members and board member liaison, the GAC discussed problems of outside cats, unkempt properties, unidentified golf carts, shrubs creating blind spots in circles causing safety issues, and one intersection where a stop or yield sign might be beneficial. GAC Concern Procedure: After a concern is received by the WJV office, a letter is sent to the property owner that they may be in violation of some rule. The owner may then respond in writing or come to the next workshop or meeting to present their case. Many concerns are getting resolved before the workshop, as soon as owners are made aware of the issue. *Jeanette Tripp, Chair*

In last month's newsletter, we thanked two volunteers by name for their help during and after Hurricane Irene, but we left one important person's name off our list. A huge thank you goes to **Bingo**Anderson for going above and beyond to help the village clean up.

Letters & Concerns

Fourteen concerns were closed; two concerns remain on hold. A follow-up letter was sent to an owner for allowing a child to drive his golf cart.

Tree Removal Requests

Tree removal requests for 7 trees were approved; 4 trees were denied. Two requests were submitted too late for the meeting.

Feral Cats

Please do not feed the feral cats. Feral cats have become a local (and national) problem. They feed on squirrels, green tree frogs, anole lizards (aka American chameleon), and songbirds. Granted, the benefit of squirrels is debatable, but the value of the insectivores is undeniable. By leaving food out for these cats you are inadvertently feeding other unwanted animals such as raccoons and opossums. Raccoons are the leading carriers of rabies in the United States.

Grass Clippings

When you mow your lawn, please take care not to blow your grass clippings into the street. The clippings can make our roads appear untidy. More importantly, after it rains, these clippings become hazardous to pedestrians because they are very slippery.

Maintenance Committee

Another very busy month for the maintenance volunteers and Robert. We wrapped up last month by trimming the limbs on most of the main road-just in time for Hurricane Irene. We believe the preventative maintenance worked, as we had no damage along Little River Road. We did lose 4 trees in our front lot; 2 were considered dangerous and had to be removed. 2 or 3 other trees fell into the roadways overnight and were removed at first light. By early morning, the entire village was passable. The pool was cleaned and open by the next morning. A few days before the hurricane, the tractor suffered a bent axle. It was out of commission for about 3 weeks, so we had to look at piles of brush a little longer than planned. In the last week, we have taken away about 30 tons of brush and leaves, and we are now caught up. Not just to the people that have been named, but Thank you to everyone that came out to help clean up.

Paving picked back up again, and we have exhausted our shortened budget for this year. We were able to pave 3 more circles. We have put some more work into the dock--replaced bad and broken boards, re-nailed the entire deck, and installed an energy-efficient dusk to dawn light. We are looking into placing new pilings and guides on the floating dock as it has taken a real beating over the years. This is part of our ongoing preventative maintenance program that was included in our annual budget. The lights at Georgetown and Dykman have been repaired. Throughout the village, we have been replacing entire light fixtures as they fail with the newer energy efficient lights.

The pool ionization is still proving to be very successful. In addition to the health benefits, it has saved us a lot of money in chemical costs. We were forced to convert our pool to liquid chlorine in June of last year due to DHEC regulations. I made a spreadsheet comparing June, July, and August of 2010 to the same months in 2011. Our chemical savings between the two years were \$3,165. These savings will continue throughout the year. *Charlie Nill, Chair*

Security Committee

We had two family's pool cards deactivated for bringing diaper dependent children into pool. One of these violations occurred within ten minutes of DHEC coming to check our pool. Two warning letters were sent to swimmers using the pool while it was closed for maintenance. Since the pool is closed on Wednesday mornings, we take advantage of that time to adjust the pool chemicals. The pool is not safe for swimming until after these adjustments are complete.

Once again, the security committee is not the police. We are not going to confront people; it is our responsibility to bring violations to the BOD. The board has given us the power to immediately deactivate clubhouse cards when a violation warrants it. However, the BOD is still able to act on a violation at the next workshop or meeting. *Charlie Nill, Chair*

House Numbers


To help the Police, Fire Department, and EMS locate your house quickly, your house should be clearly marked with your house number. Critical time may be lost if you have no house number. Ideally, house numbers should be at least 4 inches tall and reflective.

Do you use Voice over IP?

Voice over IP (VoIP) allows people to make and receive telephone calls using the internet and a computer instead of a phone line. This is one of the new technologies that many residents have adopted. However, our gate system was purchased and installed years before the advent of this technology. Residents have reported difficulties buzzing guests in using VoIP, such as Skype or magicJack, but there are two techniques that have been reported as being effective:

- 1) Try pressing "9" quickly, 3 or 4 times in quick succession
- 2) Try setting up your computer so that when you press "9", the microphone or telephone can pick up the tone of the "9" from the computer speakers.
