As we start another new fiscal year for Windjammer Village, let me introduce you to your new Board of Directors.

I think, once again, the Village elected a good group of new BOD members. We look forward to working on making Windjammer Village as great a place to live as possible.

A couple of months ago, we were able to finally get our boat ramp project done. It looks great and is being put to good use by all our boaters. Now, we are proud to announce that we have accomplished another goal by completing our Tennis court project. Not only did we repair it, but we have added the capability to play Pickle Ball on it. Two large patches of sunken black top were cut out and replaced. Then over 850 feet of cracks were cleaned out and filled with a Portland mix. Then a 3/8ths thick acrylic coating was placed over the entire court. The in-play area of the court was dyed blue and the out of play area is dyed green. The tennis court is painted in white and the Pickle Ball court is painted yellow. The white line down the center of each court is part of the tennis court. We had the fence all around the court and the net poles painted and had brand new nets installed. I hope that based on the photos (starting on page 6), you can see it turned out great. I want to emphasize what the sign posted on the fence says. NO DOGS, BICYCLES, OR SKATEBOARDS ALLOWED INSIDE THE COURT AT ANY TIME. The acrylic layer could be damaged by the dogs, bikes, and/or skateboarding. Please note: The court will be locked up at 10:00 pm each night.

We will be putting together a small committee to improve the area in front of the tennis court. Cleaning up the area and possibly some new picnic tables and benches and we will see what the committee proposes. We are looking into adding two new Santee Cooper poles with brand new lights and adding two new security cameras for the court and surrounding area. I would like to recognize the effort of our Maintenance Chairman, Charlie Parker, who turned a conversation with a contractor for another project into a lead to the company who did this great work. Thank you Charlie!

One final bonus of good news about the tennis court is the cost. It was budgeted a few years ago for \$45,000. We got this job done for under \$29,000. A savings of over \$16,000! Not an easy thing to accomplish now a days.

Now we can devote our attention to our last large inherited project, the Marsh Walk. This project will be larger than it looks but with the Boat ramp and Tennis court projects completed, we can put all our efforts into the Marsh Walk.

Another issue in our Village is the alarming amount of boats, trailers, equipment and such that are being parked on owners property. We are compiling a list of these lots and letters will be going out next week for these violations. Currently, according to our RRR Art. III sec.2h, these items are allowed to be in your yard **overnight once a month**. Owners have the capability to get permission to keep one of these for up to seven days by filling out an extended yard time request. These are not rules that we made up, but rules that are in place to prevent what is starting to become an issue. Hopefully these owners will understand and cooperate.

Finally, please mark your calendar because our monthly meetings will be changing from the second and third Monday of each month to the second and third Thursday of each month.

Security Camera's

Wire at Middle Gates was fried by a storm and was replaced. A new modem was installed at the Middle Gates by Spectrum for the same reason.

A wireless bridge access point dish had to be replaced for the Dock cameras. Also, the two wireless bridge access dishes at the front entrance had to be replaced. The old ones did not have enough bandwidth to handle the newer HD cameras that replaced the old ones.

Upgrades to software were automatically installed. With all that, expenses were under budget.

Miscellaneous Issues

Several incidents of trash being left on the ground beside the dumpsters and unallowed trash in dumpsters were identified and fines issued.

The Middle Gates were damaged several times. Please take your time to avoid undo stress on the maintenance personnel and Maintenance Committee Chair.

PUBLICITY - Charlene Schutte Annual Report July 8, 2023

As Chairperson of the Publicity Committee, I have responsibility for providing effective means of communication on news and events occurring in the Village. Two primary means for accomplishing this are through the following:

<u>The Breeze Newsletter</u> – which is distributed to all lot owners on the first of every month. The Breeze continues to grow as a valuable communication resource capturing events that have taken place and provides any new information relative to the operation of the Village. The fact that it is getting read makes it all worth my time and effort. I do appreciate the feedback I have received and welcome any ideas or suggestions you may have to include or improve upon its content.

<u>The Windjammer Website</u> – When I was asked in February of 2020 if I would be willing to create and maintain a monthly newsletter for the Village, I was more than happy to do so. However, since I agreed to produce a newsletter, it also meant I take responsibility for Publicity, and I knew my responsibility would not start and end with just a newsletter. Our website should not only let the public know who we are and the amenities associated with ownership, but most important, be a useful interactive tool for owners to retrieve information, submit concerns and be able to complete forms and documentation online without having to go to the office.

The first valuable lesson I learned early in this process is that all this information and access to it, should not be controlled by a volunteer. Not only is it an unsecured site; the administrative rights to it lie with a former resident who no longer has a vested interest in the Village and has not responded to numerous requests to transfer admin rights of the site. Which is why the information currently provided is outdated and results in a less than desirable tool for owners.

I don't share this information to serve as an excuse as to why nothing has been done to correct the situation. Moving forward I have a vision as to what our new website should do for us. However, the second valuable lesson I learned in order to accomplish this, we first needed to look at how our data and information is being managed including the steps involved in processing it.

Windjammer lost a valuable asset with the passing of Angela Marcotte. Angela was a living reference book with the ability to catalog events and provide examples of "how it was done, or here's what was decided" with much of the details shared from memory. Moving forward, it serves as a reminder of the value in systematizing our processes and eliminating the need for duplicate tracking. To the credit of Pamela Weber, who is doing an exceptional job in taking ownership of the daily operation of the POA office, she has recognized some areas needing improvement. Which is where I come in. After spending many hours with Pamela, asking questions, getting a sense of our current process, and first-handed observations of the travel flow and non-stop daily interruptions, together we continue to identify opportunities for improvement, which will ultimately position us to provide a more useful resource to our owners.

In the meantime, there is work to be done. We are not there yet folks and I won't pretend to have a target date for completion of a new website. All I ask is your patience while we continue to streamline, organize, and systematize as an initial first step towards getting us there.






Windjammer, we seem to have a reoccurring problem. Some of you have already experienced this and have learned not to do this.

Enjoy your retirement Jeff. We thank you for your service.

We all want to leave the beach with a little sun on our skin, a dose of salt and vitamin D and a piece of treasure to take home with us. Whether you're looking for sea glass, shells, or shark's teeth, we've got a few tips to help you find and identify the buried treasure along our coastline.

A Little About Shark's Teeth

Sharks have 4 rows of teeth and lose hundreds of them daily. When the lost teeth sink to the bottom of the ocean and become buried in sediment. Eventually, it begins to fossilize. The minerals in the sediment gradually replace the original tooth material. This process takes thousands of years to complete, which is why so many people collect shark's teeth—they're a part of history!

Most shark's teeth range in size from less than a half-inch to over six inches. Rarer finds such as a tooth from a prehistoric Megladon are over 7 inches. On average the tooth of a great white shark is about 3 inches.

Finding shark's teeth can be a fun family activity, combing the shores looking for the little black triangles and trying to identify what type of shark they may have come from. Try to be patient as you may not find one on every excursion, but typically a shark can produce up to 25,000 teeth over a lifetime so there's plenty out there to find!

What To Look For

Along the tideline of a beach, keep an eye out for triangular shapes. Newer teeth are still white, black teeth—which are more common finds—have been fossilized over time. Wide bases are attached to thinner triangles of varying sharpness.

Sometimes, shark teeth will have serrated edges and are curved in a certain way, depending on what side of the mouth the tooth was on. For serious hunters, a naked eye might not be enough; chances of finding shark teeth increase the more you dig and sift through the sand. A sieve or sifter might help you sort through the sand faster and more efficiently than your fingers.

When and Where to Hunt

Where there are sharks there are shark's teeth. There are some beaches more well known for having lots of shark's teeth, but they can be found on any beach. Topsail Beach, North Carolina is one of the most well-known shark tooth islands along the East Coast.

A lot of finding shark's teeth is knowing when and where to look. Essentially any time there is movement on the ocean floor is a good time. This could mean after a big storm or if there is nearby dredging. Sandbars and tidepools at low tide are also a great place to look because the water is constantly moving. Some claim that there are more sharks teeth during and around full moon cycles because the pull of the tide is stronger, but there is no evidence that this is true.




