Clinical Supervision and Experience

I am competent and experienced in providing the following clinical supervision of counseling practice clinical mental health counseling and school counseling. I have over 15 years of experience in the mental health field and the public-school setting in the state of Maryland as a professional school counselor, where I supported students in grades k-12. I have received training in clinical supervision through a doctoral course where I am currently studying at Walden University. The training included a lab component of receiving *supervision of supervision* (SOS) while supervising master's-level counseling students who were in their school counseling practicum experience. I also completed a 10-week teaching assistant experience, whereby I received weekly "supervision of supervision" while I supervised master's-level counseling students in school counseling internship.

All supervisees' privacy is important to me. I do not share client information with outside entities. My primary goal is to provide all supervisees with a warm and safe experience in which they feel comfortable discussing concern and receive support. Confidentiality is state law that requires mental health professionals to protect their client's and supervisee's privacy by not revealing the contents of therapy.

However, there are certain exceptions to confidentiality, noted below, which you should be aware of before you enter a supervision relationship. Please read these exceptions and be sure to ask your therapist if you have any questions.

Exceptions to Confidentiality:

- As a licensed mental health professional, I will immediately report suspected child abuse, dependent adult, and elder abuse.
- As a licensed mental health professional, I will notify the police and the intended victim, if a client or supervisee is threatening to cause serious bodily harm to said person (s).
- I will make every effort to secure the client's and supervisee's cooperation in ensuring their safety if they intend to harm himself or herself. However, if the client or supervisee does not cooperate, then I will follow safety procedures mandated by law to ensure their safety.

Philosophy and Approach

The approach to clinical supervision is essential to its process, the supervisee, and the supervisor. There are models of supervision that offer a conceptual framework for supervisors to help address the needs of their supervisees. My supervision approach comes from both cognitive-behavioral (CB) and discrimination models (DM). Although I do not consider myself a cognitive-behavioral therapist, clinical supervision is an appropriate space to utilize this approach with my supervisees to help them thrive. CBT approach to treatment is a structured way to help future counselors learn necessary behaviors as well as how to refrain from using inappropriate behaviors. Examples of structured activities or interventions when working with supervisees include check-in (i.e., ice breakers), goal setting, and feedback. Additionally, the DM focuses on how the supervisor interacts or offers support to the supervisee, and it looks at the supervisee's skills, such as intervention, conceptualization, and personalization. Overall, I will utilize cognitive-behavioral and discrimination models to create a system of support, while attending to my supervisee's strengths.

Expectations

Supervisee's Responsibilities in Supervision

- Prepare for and attend weekly sessions at the agreed scheduled meeting time.
- Keep supervisor informed regarding all client issues and progress.

- Keep supervisor informed regarding applicable personal matters that may have an impact on the supervision process.
- Complete supervision record at each supervision session.
- Document ALL supervision meetings and track hours.

Supervisor's Responsibilities in Supervision

- Prepare for and attend all sessions.
- Help supervise create a goal or plan for success.
- Provide feedback each session and a formal evaluation.
- Review client case notes and other materials for quality control purposes.
- Complete supervision record at each supervision session.
- Maintain licensure as a Licensed Clinical Professional Counselor (LCPC) in Maryland and status as an approved clinical supervisor.

Confidentiality and Limitations

Please note: All issues and concerns supervisees discuss in supervision will be confidential with the following exceptions:

- Your performance and conduct during your clinical supervision experience.
- Details regarding your clinical experience in the form of a recommendation for a job, licensure, or certification.
- I will take every measure to encourage confidentiality group disclosures, however I cannot guarantee that all disclosures will be confidential.
- If I seek consultation for my supervision of your client work.

Fees and Payment

The fee for one hundred hours of clinical supervision is \$500, due at the time of signing this agreement or \$50 per hour, due at the time of supervision.
