MR. SAATHOFF: That's fine. We're going to attempt to get this cut off before we go to court.

MR. SMITH: Well, I'm going to put it this way.

You're asking her, your client, Ms. Humphrey, questions that

I am hearing a lot of false answers on, in fact, everything
that you asked her.

To start with the truck, she sat there and admitted that she got angry when Don gave me the money. And it wasn't for a truck. He gave me -- buying the truck was just what I chose to do with the money, because I already had a truck. Even though it was run down, I had already decided that I was going to continue to use that truck. So when he gave me the money, she was sitting there as close as Lynn and I are here now, about two to three feet away from him. When she got up to go in the kitchen, she got some water for him, she brought the water back out, he had to eat and drink water through a

straw. When she brought it out and gave him some water, she sat the water on the table. He forgave the loan at that moment. It was mixed in with the conversation about us talking about me continuing to help her. That's all he asked me to do. He didn't say, this money is for a truck. I told him that \$5,000 wouldn't buy a truck. Then he said, we can go up to ten. She got angry. You've already heard her say that. She got angry and rushed to the front door, opened the door and she went outside. Lynn looked at me because she couldn't figure out what was wrong. But Barb said, oh, he's getting a house and a new truck? I have an e-mail where she said, oh, hi new truck owner.

Let me ask you this, Matt. If I owed you \$16,000 -now, the original loan -- and it was a loan. The original
loan started out \$25,292.92. She's claiming that I had it
paid down to 16,000. If you look in that orange folder,
you'll find a lot of documents in there where she's telling
me not to tell Don this, not to tell Don that. Don was doing
the identical same thing to her. He was using sweat equity
with my work to deduct a lot of that money because he knew he
was dying. He couldn't show up to the jobs no more. My
e-mails go back to July 9th of 2017 where she started telling
me, Don is going in the hospital tomorrow to have surgery.
On the 10th, the very next day, she sent me another e-mail
saying -- well, it's in the red folder -- saying that the

surgery went well for him. So from that point on -- well, actually from before that, because you just don't take sick and then you can't work no more. So months before that, almost practically the entire year, Lynn and I was doing all the work on all the properties without even having him present. But in my counterclaim, she said he was there supervising me like I was a complete idiot, that he was supervising me the entire time. She knew this was false when it was said.

So I put together all of these e-mails in this black folder here if you want a copy of them. I put together these e-mails to show her continuously -- I'm talking hundreds of jobs, continuously e-mailing these job duties to me, because Don couldn't get to the work site. The red folder shows where Don was not able to get to the work site, where she was constantly updating me on his condition, continuously. And she knows this on both counts.

So the point is, when Don gave me that money, this was for me, it was not for me to buy a truck, because I already had that gray truck. I already had an old -- it was a '92 Ford, but it was still running and working good. Okay? It was my choice to buy a new truck, because they had taken the truck that he had given to me, they had taken it and sold it.

So my question to you is -- and I'm not pointing at

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you. This is just the way I talk. My question is, why would I start out owing them -- or owing Don -- she had no part in it. And the tape recording, if you listen to 1A, you'll hear that. We was talking about trying to get his money back.

Now, if she was involved, why would she give me -or why would she and he give me the money on November 6th,
and then the very next week -- and you heard her say her and
Elizabeth was angry with him. If she was involved with
making the decision to help me buy that house, why would she
give me the money -- the loan on November 6th and then want
it back one week later? When I told Lynn about it, that Don
had informed me of this, the first thing she said is, I wish
you had taped it.

And so Don had me bring some rocks over to the house from the Webster Street apartment, he was asking me to bring some of the stones, because we was going to tear the wall down. He brought them over to my house. And at that time, I went in the house and I got the tape recorder that you saw me with here and decided to record it, because Lynn didn't believe he was doing that. And the entire tape recording is about concerns -- well, it shows where I was applying for a loan at Wells Fargo, he was applying for a loan down at First State Bank down on South 84th Street. He even had me to come in here to sit down with the guy at First State. And the only reason -- the purpose was to get the loan back. We was

going to put the house up for collateral and get him his money back to get Barb and Elizabeth off his back. That tape proves that. For 34 minutes it proves that. So it was going to get them off his back, and it was going to leave me owing the bank instead of him, not Barb. But because I didn't have credit at that time, we couldn't get the loan to do it.

And so these payment schedules were created as a way of showing Barb and her daughter that I was actually paying the money back, which I was. I gave him a hundred dollars the first time. She was standing beside him. And her words were -- I remember like it was yesterday -- oh, we need to buy a house every day, knowing that she didn't mean nothing like that, because this was, like, in March.

So anyway, I had already created these schedules.

And that's why, if you look at -- not the front page they created. If you look at the following three pages, you'll see they was created in January at the identical same time, I think one minute apart, because I was creating them on the screen as a way of trying to show her that I was going to pay the money back. I created these three documents. And once I created them, then I saved them all of the same time.

MR. SAATHOFF: Just so we're clear, you're talking about Exhibit No. 24?

MR. SMITH: Yes. And then the following three pages after that, the same thing. They was all created on the same

night right after each other. And that's where Barbara got the four percent interest at, because one of those documents say three percent interest, one of them say four percent interest, because in my heart, I wanted to do this. But Don never accepted any of those documents. He never accepted a one of them. And that's why there was six of them created. They took information off of those six and created one document, and that's the document they submitted to you.

So no, Barbara Humphrey had absolutely nothing to do with Don giving me that loan. But when I listen to her talk, she's saying, we, we, we, over and over and over, throughout their entire conversations. The money that he gave me, the \$10,000, was not for the truck.

So where I want to go is asking you about the 25,000. Don loaned me \$25,219.92. The very next week he's telling me that Barb and Elizabeth was angry with him and he wanted to get the money back to get them off his back. And that's when we went to the bank. But before his death, even though I knew that the loan had been paid down to 8,000, which he forgave before he died, she wrote me the \$10,000 check.

Now, if I owed you \$16,000, why would you write me another \$10,000 and, then a month and a half later you say I owe you \$16,000? It's just so confusing. It's just lie after lie after lie. And it's hard to keep up

with. And that's why you see me get so angry. And I don't mean to get angry. I don't mean to point at people or anything like that. I'm not that type of person. And that's why they held on to us working for them for so long, because I catch on to things so quick.

But they're saying that, oh, Don was there on the job site supervising every job supervising him, as if I'm a complete idiot, when Don was nowhere around. The final two years of his life he was nowhere around. Everything that he ate had to be put in a puree machine and fed to him out of a straw. He couldn't even use his hands. They had to hold it up to his mouth. Even when he was in the hospice house, Elizabeth tried to get me to feed him, and I wouldn't, because I felt bad for him. They couldn't get him to eat. Why would I?

My voice was the very last voice that man heard.

Every time I got off work, I would go by there and tell him what I had done because I knew that's what he wanted to hear. Joe, her son-in-law, told me, oh, if I was you, I wouldn't do that anymore, because they was jealous of me because of the closeness Don and I had.

when he went to North Carolina, he asked me to go with him. I went down there and restored the house. He laid on the kitchen floor. We went out to eat, Texas Roadhouse, stuff like that. But he couldn't get his family, none of his

kids, to go with him.

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So that's where the house came in. We was on our way back to North Carolina -- and I'm just telling you like it is. I know we're wasting a lot of time. But we was on our way back from North Carolina, and we was approaching the Kansas City (sic) state line from the east. Don asked me a flat-out question that caught me off guard. He said, Ed, I want to ask you something. He said, if you had a wish that you could wish and have it come true, what would it be. it caught me off guard. And I said, you know, to be honest with you, Don, nothing. I say, as long as I can fish and I can write, because I was writing. I still write. But the last two years have been taken away from me. I said, if I could have anything in the wish, I said nothing, as long as I can fish and write, my life is complete. And a few seconds passed. And I said, but I'll say this, Lynn wants a house, so I guess if I had to wish for anything and have that wish to come true, it would be a house for her. "Fine" was the only thing he said. Barbara Humphrey had absolutely nothing to do with the trip, the conversation, or anything else.

So one day we was working on Webster Street. And I had already come across this property. I got out, I went around the back, looked. It was a very small yard, but I decided, well, it's just Lynn and I. So we went back and --normally we go over on Dodge Street to Wendy's to eat lunch.

And on that particular day, we were at the Webster Street property working. And when we got ready to go to lunch, I told him, I said, I don't want to goes to Wendy's today, I said, let's go up on North 30th Street. He said, what's up there? I said, you'll see. So we went driving up there, and I told him which direction to go. I took him up there to North Ridge Drive. And there was a for-sale sign out in the front yard. And I said, stop right here. I found the house He wasn't with me. And he says, what's this? on my own. And I said, well, I looked around and, I said, I like it. Ι said, NP Dodge has it, do you care if I give them a call and see if I can get inside and look it over. He said, you ain't got to do that, I got a friend. Judy Dooley he was talking So he called her, and she set up the date for us to come view the house. That was the very first time.

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Barbara Humphrey's only been in that house twice, but that was the very first time she went in that house. Judy came, opened the door, and we all went in. Barbara and Lynn went downstairs. If two people is going to co-own a property together, you both look the property over. Donald Humphrey and Judy Dooley stood by the kitchen sink the entire time that we was there. Barbara Humphrey and Lynn went downstairs in the basement, and Barbara stayed down there the entire time that we was at that house. I was the individual that looked over the backyard, I looked over both the

bedrooms, the bathroom, the living room and the kitchen. when we was done, Don yelled down and let Barb know -- well, Lynn came up and looked at it last minute. When we got upstairs, Don was standing between the kitchen door -- I mean between the kitchen and the living room. Barbara was standing between the living room and the hallway. She stuck her head through, she looked both ways in the bedroom, but she never went back there. Lynn was standing beneath the ceiling fan in the living room. Ms. Dooley was standing by the front door waiting for us to go. And I say, I like it. And Don said, is this what you want? And I said, yeah, I'm going to take it. And he looked at Barb and he said, what do you think? Her only words were, I ain't got nothing to do with it. And from that point, up until Don died, every time Don and I would mention that house, she would always use the same words, that's between you two.

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If you listen to that tape, 1A, you'll hear -- I'm trying to think which one it was -- 1B, because 1A we was talking about paying the loan back. 1B, Don had sent a State Farm insurance agent to my house. It was on a Sunday morning. And I went up there -- because he was knocking on the door, and, you know, I'm like, what's up? He said, well, I need to take a look over the property. I said, what? I said, did someone send you here? He said, yeah, and he mentioned Don's name. When he said that, I decided to go

ahead and let him look at it.

So he took pictures of the house. And as soon as he was done, I drove straight to Barb's house and I knocked on the back door -- and you'll hear this on the tape, my exact words. She said, Don, Ed's here. He was in the back. And when he come out, he was like, well, good morning, which he always did. And I say, I had a State Farm agent come to my house morning. I said, he told me that you sent him there. Yeah. I say, did I ask you to send somebody -- you know, that I wanted to put insurance on my house? And he said, no. And after a little while, he apologized, well, I'm sorry. He started explaining that, you know, since I owed him money, he didn't want the house to burn down and he couldn't get paid.

But the only reason his name had been put on that house is because of my illnesses, which I've already told you about. Because of my illnesses, I put his name on the house because I'm thinking I might die. And this was his way of guaranteeing his money back. By his name being on that deed, he will be able to sell the property and get his money back. And Ms. Humphrey knew this, her daughter knew this, his son-in-law knew this. Everybody in his house, even his sister Ruth knew this. And when I told her that Barb had filed this claim, the first words out of her mouth were, I blame Don, he never should have put you guys in this situation.

So Ms. Humphrey already knew the agreement.

Actually, it wasn't in the agreement. And I think in one of her documents, one place there was an agreement; two other places there wasn't. It's just a mess.

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But I'll say this, that's my home. When they filed this claim, they knew it. But what caused them to file this claim and what caused me to lose my job and Dora to lose her job was that -- and I have documents, e-mail documents showing that up until September 12th of 2018 -- this was shortly after Don passed away. Barb sent me e-mails talking about water being in her basement. And so up until September 12th of 2018, I was working at the Webster Street apartment building. And when she mentioned to me that she had water coming in the basement, I told her that I will come over and take a look at it. When I got over there, her son-in-law, Joe, was around the south side of the house. And when I went around and talked to him, they had to dig about maybe that much (indicating) dirt, I think like four foot of dirt down, and eight foot in length. So I got the shovel and voluntarily dug that dirt out three days in a row. I dua it Joe sat there screwing with some pipes for the drain so out. he could run it out towards the street. But I dug that dirt out, I took time and cleaned the wall down, I patched the cracks in the wall, and then I put that dirt back in place. Now, at the end, Elizabeth came out there and put a few

shovelfuls on, and then she disappeared. When she come out, she had Barbara with her. So I feel that it was Elizabeth behind this whole thing. And I still feel that way. When people becoming senior citizens, sometimes their kids take over their life. And I think that's been the situation, because she brought Barb out, and Barb sat in a little chair she put down for her, and she asked me about it after I threw the last shovel of dirt out there. The neighbor came out and was getting some dirt to put in his backyard because he had a hole there.

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So Barb started asking me was I going to continue to pay what she called rent, what I call a loan. And I said, Barb, Don's dead, he forgave the loan, and you heard him forgive the loan. But then we started -- I said, I really don't want to talk about this because I don't owe you anything. At that time, Elizabeth started asking me, let's go in the house and talk about it. So I didn't know that I had a recorder on my phone because I had just got it. And so I'm telling her, okay, I'll be back, let me run to the house and get a tape recorder. And she touched this elbow right here (indicating). I was at the fence on the north side of the house. And she said, no, come on, and she went like that (gesturing). So I just said, fine. Barbara sat on the south side of the kitchen table, Joe sat on the east side, I was on the west side, Elizabeth was sitting closer to

me on the north side of the kitchen table. And they started talking about the payments. And I kept telling them, no, Don forgave the remaining \$8,000. They said, well, you owed I said, no, I didn't. I said, I owed 8,000, and Don forgave that, and your mom was sitting there listening to it. And then they kept -- words kept going back and forth, back and forth. And then Elizabeth say, well, I'll tell you what, why don't we just sign a rent to own? And I told her, why would I rent something that I already own? And then she start -- I'm trying to think how did she put that. don't want to you lose your house. She kept saying that over and over and over, we don't want you to lose your house. And then the next thing I know -- that was on, I think, like -okay. My last job at Webster Street was, I think, September So this had to be the 16th or 17th of September of 13th. And the next thing I know, a week after that, we're 2018. getting a letter from their attorney, from John, asking us to meet them at 147th and something. Now, I had just seen Barb She walks fine. When she got there, oh, Elizabeth walking. has to help her in, and all this crap.

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So we sit there. I was sitting at the end of John's desk. Lynn was standing by the door, I think. Elizabeth was sitting next to -- Barbara was sitting next to me. Liz was sitting next to her across from John. I noticed Elizabeth was holding her hand. And everything she wanted her to say,

she would squeeze her hand a little bit, you know, as if she was giving her signals. But once again, Elizabeth started saying, okay, we don't want you to lose your house. I took it as a damn threat. It's kind of like extortion.

But no, that house is not owned by Barbara Humphrey. And if you listen to that tape recorder, 1A, you'll hear Don and I constantly conversating on getting his money back, getting bank loans to get his money back to get them off his back.

So I ask the question again. Why would Ms. Humphrey -- said she and Don agreed together to give me that money. Why would they give me that money and then a week later they're crawling all over his back for giving me that money? Why would you say I owed you \$16,000, and then three weeks before Don died, while you're saying I still owe you \$16,000, you give me another \$10,000? It don't make no sense.

Nothing she said is truthful, none of this, you know. And it just frustrates me when you sit there -- and I'm not cutting nobody down, don't get me wrong. And I didn't mean to point my finger at you earlier. I apologize for that. But when you got someone trying to take something from you all because there's a law that they can will their way through to get it, that's hurtful, especially when it's someone that you've put your soul into for ten years. It

It really hurts. She know that house is mine. Her family knows this. And his sister Ruth point know this. blank told me -- I went over to her house. I was down at the Home Depot on 72nd and Ames. That was after I learned that she had filed this suit. And I said, Ruth, I need to talk with vou. She said, okay. So I went over to her house, and we sat in her living room. I was sitting in the small chair, she was sitting on the couch. And I explained to her what was going on. And I told her, I said, I believe -- I said, I'm pretty sure Elizabeth -- no. I was blaming Joe. I said. I know Joe don't like me. I said, I think that he's pushing Elizabeth do this. And Ruth herself point blank told me, no, Elizabeth is more deceptive than you think. I've seen her manipulate Joe. I've been around twice where her ex-boyfriend comes over to the house -- and I know I'm getting off the subject, but I'm trying to point something I've been around twice, and one of those times was when out. I was putting dirt up against the house, which was the last time I saw them. The ex-boyfriend come around. Joe wouldn't say nothing. Now, here's a man who's scheduled to get married, but he's around his ex-girlfriend. Nothing of what she's doing -- and when Barb confronted me about this \$16,000 supposedly, Elizabeth was the only one talking.

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Every single time I mentioned that house to Barb whatsoever, it was always, that's between you and him,

talking about Don. That's another thing you will find on that tape recorder 1B, because I confronted him directly, and I told him, I said, Don, every time I mention to you something about that house — this is how much they was on his back. I said, every time I mention to you something about that house, you always drop your head, you go silent, you won't say anything at all, you won't even respond. That's on that tape recorder with Ms. Barbara present. When I said that, guess what? He went silent again, he wouldn't even respond to that.

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That's my house completely, paid in full. And the evening that he forgave the loan, it made her so angry, her very words were, oh, he's got a house and a new truck? And when she rushed to the front door, Lynn got up and went out behind her. But she had just brought Don a glass of water with a straw in it. She held it up to his mouth. So I asked Lvnn. I said. if she was that mad and she didn't want to write me that check, why didn't she just give the damn check to him and a pen? And Lynn said, well, if you notice, every time we go over there, he can't even lift a finger. And that's what made me question her today about that picture, because the thing go around his -- that tie around his -- the string that tie that bib around his neck was laying on the outside of his hand. If it would have been on the inside, I could say, okay, he was eating and moved his hand back. But

how is he eating with the string still on the outside of his hand? It didn't make sense. His right hand couldn't be moved because there was tubes in it. The back side of his hand had tubes in it. So I can understand that. But why was half a doughnut over at the far end of the table in a sealed bag? Don wasn't fixing to get up and go nowhere with it, to take it with him, you know.

So I don't know what else to say other than I'm up against a lie. And not only am I up against a lie, I'm up against constant lies. You know, the word "rental" is continuously being used. But when I ask about it, all of a sudden, it's a loan and a mortgage. It's just over and over and over.

The invoices, you just asked about the invoices.

Yeah, we did have verbal discussions about payment. But in these e-mails, it shows that I was not set at \$15 an hour.

In these e-mails, it shows a full picture of the wirt Street property where Lynn and I went over there and restored the entire building. And that's where the \$15 came from for me. She was already paying Lynn \$15 an hour to clean the apartment stairways in the apartment building on Webster Street. I was getting ten the entire time up until 2017.

And that's when we restored that property on Wirt Street, 6508 Wirt Street, and she was so impressed with it, until standing in the dining room, she gave me the \$15, and again,

don't tell Don. And so the next time Don tried to pay me the \$10, I laughed at him. I said, well, Barb gave me 15. From that point on, he never paid me again. From that point on, she was the one that paid me the \$15 an hour. But that started in 2017.

I had worked for these people for ten years by then. You know, it's just lie after lie after lie after lie. I'm not putting no names to it. Okay? But it's lie after lie after lie. Barbara Humphrey let -- and this is myself. Okay? I'm thinking that she allowed Elizabeth to stand behind her, because she's an older lady, and push herself up front. That's what I think has happened here.

MR. SAATHOFF: Okay. Based on that, I have two follow-up questions.

- A. Well, Don had wanted to give him the house, the 25,000 that he put up front for the house. And then the \$10,000 was towards the truck, because Don had said, well, we need a heavy-duty truck, because we were hauling rock, and all that stuff. So the truck was supposed to be for future

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use for him to help me with the apartments.
