

Workshop

On October 15, & 16, 2023, workshop attendees met at Co Radius on Russell to participate in a Zoom set-up class with Connie Ferguson. Connie lives in Lethbridge, Alberta Canada which makes traveling a challenge, not only distance, but always the chance of snow. While most of us enjoy the in person workshops, the Zoom worked well. We were able to receive feedback from Connie and our first attempt at a Zoom workshop went relatively smoothly.

Connie is known for her watercolor paintings and often her watercolors contain an Italic variation script. We began with strokes resembling petals. dropping in color, and blending colors. We were encouraged to remain loose and experiment with different brush sizes. We moved onto tulip and daisy strokes. We created what Connie called the essence of blooms or free form type of flower: fun and whimsical. We filled an entire page of watercolor paper with flowers. We then created a floral landscape of sorts, these two sheets became the framework of a small book of "Windows into Flowers." The windows were cut outs from the painted papers.

The variation on the Italic had bounce and some exaggerated branching and downstrokes. The Italic worked into the watercolor gives the painting a fun, and sometimes funky look. I really like how my little book turned out and I enjoyed seeing what everyone else did too!

fall bi-annual November 10-12, 2023

Nine SLCG members gathered at Todd Hall for our 2023 retreat. On Friday night, after prepping the big work room, we made paste paper. Saturday we each did an individual abstract art piece. Leslie Barnes had us take a sheet of Arches text wove and divide it into I and I/2 "squares which we then taped with I/4" tape. Then, using masking fluid we did gestural calligraphic movements. When the fluid dried, we water colored over all with a variety of colors. The masking fluid was rubbed off and we then did mono-line writing, pastel marks and colored pencil marks. When we removed the tape, we had 40 (or so) small squares which we cut apart to paste on note cards as an embellishment. We each donated two squares which were used to create "get well" cards for Jane V. and Barb R. who each had recent surgeries.

Joanne Kluba had us use our paste paper to do a folded book binding. She also had us make a folded packet-pocket---I'll use mine for monetary gifts for my grandchildren.

Kathy Orf showed us her hand-painted rocks and some of us painted our own in holiday motifs.

Susan Zenner brought plain brown paper wine bags to decorate for host/hostess gift giving. We lettered words like "cheers," "a votre sante," "skal," "l'chaim," etc., in automatic pen or brush in bright colors for a cheerful presentation.

It was an enjoyable weekend for all. Our creative juices were put to good use. Hopefully a few more calligraphers will join us in 2025.
