Our spring workshop was a study of Foundational Hand taught by Reggie Ezell on April 13th and 14th, 2024. The workshop was presented online with an option to meet in-person and view the presentation as a group at Co-Radius.

Foundational hand is an upright hand characterized by straight straights, round curves and deliberate transitions and intersections of the two. Foundational was developed in the early 1900's by Edward Johnston as a basic style to teach students the foundations of using a broad edge pen, thus foundational. Many of the forms Johnston borrowed and modified from Carolingian of the Ramsey Psalter. Carolingian developed in France in the 8th century as a hand to quickly copy books. As such it needed to be quick to write and clear to read. The exemplar we studied was a further evolution of the form developed by our instructor, Reggie Ezell.

After learning proper nib preparation with a gum arabic rub-down we began practicing the letterforms. The characteristics of the foundational hand we studied include vertical straight strokes, an x-height of three nib widths (different from the traditional 4.5 nib widths), ascenders and descenders of two nib widths and a pen angle of 30 degrees. Straight letters sit on a curved base and have a curved serif. Curved letters are round and rotund. Pen angle changes to 45 degrees for diagonal strokes. The stroke sequence was demonstrated for each letter with time to practice during the demonstration. Next we began writing words and incorporated proper spacing aiming for a rhythmic, rolling feel. We continued practicing the letterforms using three different nib sizes and then finished the first day by learning an uppercase alphabet based loosely on Romancaps to accompany the lowercase forms.

The second day of the workshop was a progression of foundational variations. We saw how adding pressurized forms, built-up serifs, altering x-height, adding slant and compressing or widening the forms all change the feel of the text. In using these variations, the calligrapher can match the feel of the writing to the content of the text being written. During lunch each day, Reggie presented a slideshow of calligraphic works incorporating the foundational hand and the many possibilities for its use in our own projects.

On 3/21, Guild member, Cheryl Tefft led us in a tutorial of an embellished Versal capital. We were provided with a pre-printed Versal and with help of light boxes traced our chosen Versal on good paper as our beginning. We drew with a micron around our letter and the drew a box touching the edges of the letter, containing it in that box. We then drew another box around that box 1/8" out creating a moat. Any little extras at the corners were added on then as well. We then began the embellishment by painting the areas around the letter within the box with our gold paint. Our next step was painting the letter itself. Cheryl gave us a bit of a lesson in shading the letter so that there was a lighter center and deeper as it went to the edge. Once the letter was completely dry. We went back in and created a little pattern and used an embossing tool to add circles which gives the letter a beautiful finish. Cheryl included a very detailed description in handouts of the whole process & included some variations to give a try. This meeting was very well attended and it was great to go home with a finished piece. Cheryl is a seasoned teacher and her attention to detail shows in her instructions. It's a very successful meeting. Thanks, Cheryl.



Neuland and Embossing Workshop with Sue Greenseth

This course will explore chunky and versatile hand of Neuland. By varying the x-height, customizing crossbars, using pen manipulations, adding outlines and embossing, an artist can easily personalize this hand to make it applicable for almost any purpose.

A traditional alphabet, a more contemporary variation, as well as ways to modify this hand will be covered. Part of this course will be spent covering how to emboss, and students will have a chance to emboss their own Neuland letters

6mm Pilot Parallel pen, inked and ready to go Paper: your favorite bond paper for calligraphy Pencil, eraser

Fine tipped marker, such as a Micron 01 Coffee stir-stick or balsa wood stick (optional) Automatic pens in a variety of sizes (optional)

Embossing Supplies

Pencil, eraser
