



The Creepy Crawlies of Summer!

Warm weather brings us camelid owners lots of fun times together at shows, but it also brings out the best in the world of external parasites. External parasites are any of the bugs that live on the outside of our animals. This can include mites, lice, ticks, fleas, and maggots. Many of these bugs require certain conditions to thrive, are easy to identify, and can be prevented or treated easily.

MITES: Like damp wet conditions, are not visible to the human eye, and have a tendency to produce areas of hairless, crusty skin. Can occur anywhere, but have a tendency to congregate on the feet, underside of the belly, and inside the ears. Sometimes, these areas are itchy and the crusts can get quite thick. The earlier you notice and begin treating a mite problem, the better the chance you will have of clearing it up. Some things that help decrease the incidence of mites are decreasing wet areas in the barn/pasture, regular Ivermectin or Doramectin injections (your meningeal worm preventives), and shearing once or twice a year. The only way to 100% diagnose a mite problem is for your vet to do multiple skin scraping to identify them under a microscope. Sometimes it can be hard to find the mites and, for this reason, we sometimes just treat for mites if it is suspected. Treatment can be very difficult and can include a variety of the following: scrubbing the affected areas with betadine or chlorhexide daily, weekly ivermectin injections, Frontline spray to affected areas weekly, Goodwinol (mange ointment) applied daily, topical steroid creams or sprays, "Witches' Brew" mixture of DMSO + ivermectin + gentamicin + propylene glycol, and others! Sometimes, the mite damage to the skin may be so extensive or the camelid's immune system response to the mites is so over-exaggerated that we frequently see chronic cases of mites and many times the skin does not heal up completely.

LICE: This is a fiber enthusiast's worst nightmare! Lice product tiny sticky eggs, which adhere to the individual strands of fiber. Because of this, there is no way to "wash off" the eggs and fiber from these animals should not be used for any sort of product. Throw these fleeces away or use them for mulching. Lice infestations typically respond very well to an ivermectin or doramectin injection and shearing. In extreme cases, you can bathe the animal in a parasiticide shampoo such as Mycodex.

TICKS: Typically like to live in taller grasses and wooded areas. The amount and types of ticks in your area may depend heavily on the types of wildlife around you as well. Ticks will most likely be found on the areas of the body with shorter fiber that come close to the ground/grass. This will usually be legs and face/ ears. If you find ticks, simply use tweezers to pull them off. You should try to grab he tick close to the skin where it is attached, so that you can try to get all of it. There might be a small area of irritations where the tick was attached, but you shouldn't need to treat it with anything. Take note if you do find a tick on one of your camelids, because if that animal becomes ill later, it could potentially be related to the tick bite. Ticks can carry all sorts of lovely diseases like Lyme Disease, Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever, Ehrichiosis, Anaplasmosis, and Tick Paralysis. Many of these diseases carry vague symptoms such as fever, decreased appetite, enlarged lymph nodes, joint pain, and others. If you have a sick animal of any species, remember to tell your veterinarian if you know it has been exposed to a tick bite!

FLEAS: Although very uncommon, it is possible that given the right circumstances, fleas could infect llamas. There would need to be a highly flea-contaminted area, and no better host for the fleas (like dogs, cats). Fleas are visible to the naked eye and they can be seen running along the surface of the skin when the fiber is parted. Most fly sprays or topical insecticides (like Cylence) should kill fleas.

MAGGOTS: Maggots, simply put, are fly egg larva. So, anywhere a fly spends a lot of time, there could be maggots in the near future. Flies like to lay their eggs in open flesh or smelly areas. This means any sort of wound or surgical site is at risk. Maggots begin to burrow under the flesh and eat the diseased tissue. They are easily spotted as tiny white to grayish "worm-like" critters, about 1/4" long. When I see maggots, I usually give



an ivermectiin injection, then flush the wound/area out with some diluted betadine or chlorhexidine, and then use tweezers to pick out any maggots that didn't get flushed out. Sometimes, I will even shoot a few cc of ivermectin into the wound where the maggots are to kill them. Beware! They hide easily. So get a really good look into the wound to make sure you got all of them.

The Llamas Are Disappearing

NBC News recently ran an article titled, Llamas In the U.S. Disappearing: Here's Why." The article was written in response to an agriculture release that found pack animal numbers in the U.S. had decreased. In 2002 there were nearly 145,000 llamas in the U.S., but by 2017 Census of Agriculture that is published every five years there were fewer than 40,000.

The reason given was the crash of the llama market. In the 1980's into the 2000's llamas were considered a good investment by the wealthy and prices skyrocketed. When the novelty and breeding aspects were over the question became, what to do with them. The real estate market crash also led to less expendable income for many people. There was a downturn in llamas according to the ILR in 2008 or 2009. Llama owners cut down on their breeding and the older animals died off. Another reason for the downturn was due to climate change which resulted in the increase risk of parasites which also affected other livestock herds.

Current breeders, according to the article, believe the llama industry is beginning to pick up again along with the selling prices. The article points to the low llama population of quality llamas is helping with the prices. \Box

Bathing Your Llama

You Will Need:

- Towels (approximately 8 per llama)
- Tearless Shampoo/White Shampoo (for white areas)
- Creme Rinse
- Pin Brush or Board Bristle Brush
- Blow Dryer Fans

Try to pick a sunny day one to two days before your show. Have the mats brushed out and debris blown out. Wet llama thoroughly with the hose. Wash face/ears with wash rag. Apply shampoo with a spray bottle all over body. You may have to use a chute to do legs - a bristle brush works good on legs/knees. White shampoo helps brighten white legs. Let llama soak for a few minutes then rinse, rinse, rinse.

Apply cream rinse (which has been diluted 50%) with a spray bottle. Spend a few minutes working this in, especially where the wool is the thickest, then rinse well. It's nice to use a bucket of warm water at this point. After all the cold water, your llama will appreciate it.

Now squeeze as much water out as possible, towel dry by placing layers of hair in the towel and rubbing. Use lots of towels and, if you have another llama to bathe, hang your towels over the fence to dry. Walk your llama around to help dry (also a good time to walk them to the dung pile). You may also use your blower to get out some of the water.

Put your llama in a shady spot of clean grass where the wind will blow steadily. I also put a fan on them. Using your bristle or pin brush, begin to lift layers of wool and brush letting the wind fluff and dry the wool. It will take 1-3 hours to get them to the damp-dry stage. But if you have done your homework, your llama should be pretty well brushed out and tangle-free. The brushing after the bath also gives you a chance to pick out the small debris.

If you still have tangles, spray Show Sheen, work in well with your hands and brush. I prefer not to use this unless necessary as too much makes the wool gummy.

Preparing To Shear Your Llama

You will need:

- Oster sheep shears or groom master or hand shears.
- Blade wash
- Clipper oil
- Slicker brush, pin brush
- Shears

You must decide what the best hair cut is for your llama based on: Comfort, Show Style, or Condition of their wool.

Preparing To Shear Your Llama Continued

Work with your llama in advance of the shearing. If possible, blow your llama every other day for short periods. Concentrate on one main area each session with a quick blow over the entire llama. Remember to reward him.

You are shearing for comfort and don't want to spend a lot of time, I suggest the belted look. Shear llama just behind front legs/shoulders to just in front of back legs, making a band all the way around the llama. Clip tail area if necessary, brush legs, tail and neck.

Show Style: Try to save as much of the llama's wool as possible (legs, neck, chest, tail, belly), depending on the condition of their wool. Start shearing at the base of neck to tail - leaving about 2" of wool - continue down both sides.

The amount of wool you leave on the legs will depend on how matted they are. I like to put them in a chute and cut through the mats and brush, trying to save the length and fullness of the pantaloons. This is all very time-consuming. I do not consider this job complete until I have bathed, dried, brushed-out, and gone over the llama again with the clippers to even out. Wool will lay different when clean. I suggest you take two days for this, but the end results will be worth it.

Judges are looking favorably toward shearing and llamas actually feel better after it is done.

How is the best way to teach a young lama to stand still, especially during a showmanship class?

First this central question that is intertwined with almost everything we do with our animals.

The real questions is, "Why won't my alpaca or llama stand?" Llamas and alpacas know how to stand still, they do it all the time. So you really don't have to teach the animals how to do "Stand", you need to make it <u>safe</u> for the animal to stand still instead of doing what he thinks is the safer thing under the circumstances and that is to run away.

If the animal is going to stand in a show ring, that means teaching your animal that it is safe to have a human approach him and perhaps touch him. This is a huge leap of faith for an animals that basically runs for a living. It is like running INTO a burning building.

Changing the way you do things at home on a regular basis is the best way to create a sense of safety when you head to the show ring. If you are in the habit of using the corner-grab-hold approach to catching, getting your lama to stand still in the show ring is going to be extremely difficult. Think about it....if you, the person with whom your llama or alpaca has the most familiarity, has to resort to trapping him in a corner to catch him at home when there are no strange lights, people, and noises, it will be exponentially harder at a show. How you catch your animals at home is the place you begin to make changes. If you are one of the llama or alpaca folks that use a catch pen for catching your animals, then good for you! If you are not using a catch pen consistently, that is the first thing to change.

To get more bang for your buck in the catch pen approach your lama from behind his eye and allow him to move around the pen until he comes to a stop. Catching a llama or alpaca using a corner means that the

animal learns that when a human approaches, the thing you do is evade until you **can't** and then you must accept being caught.

We typically corner and hold or tie our llamas or alpacas still for most of the interactions we have with them. This provides very little opportunity for them to develop selfcontrol. There are no corners in the show ring. When the ring steward and judge approach your animal, his conditioned response to move away kicks in. The animal will try to move away and when you hold him still, he will get frightened and try even harder to get away and this is the reason he won't stand.

Allowing your animal to move away from you in the confines of the catch pen until he stops on his own teaches your animal that it is possible for him to override his instinctive flight response and remain standing, which



he stops on his own teaches your animal that it *Approach llama from behind his eye and move around until he comes to a* is possible for him to override his instinctive *stop.*

sets the stage for improved behavior in the show ring. You cannot get good at something unless you have an opportunity to try it and practice it. Teaching your lama to stop and stand on his own each time you catch him is a great investment for future success.

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- Is teaching your llama or alpaca to lead like flying a kite or dragging an anvil?
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Stand Still Please Continued

Once your lama student has come to a stop, approach a it closer and, if he remains standing, approach a bit more. If he indicates he is going to move, then back up. If he remains standing, move a bit closer. Repeat this dance until you are standing next to the animal.

This can require a lot of patience especially if you animal student is very frightened. I use a wand and a rope to help speed this process up and to avoid frustration for both animal and handler. But some version of

teaching your animal to stand without being cornered as you approach is crucial to your success in the show ring.

Once you have mastered standing still in the catch pen, you can stage some exercises that mimic what goes on in a show. Enlist the aid of some friends to approach and retreat as you stand with your lama on a halter and lead in a very small area - a catch pen is not too small - then next in a slightly larger area. Always add new challenges incrementally and back up to what is easier if your animal student is having trouble accepting the new step.

Don't move on to the next step unless your llama or alpaca is comfortable with the previous step. **IT IS NEVER THE ANIMAL'S FAULT**

IS NEVER THE ANIMAL'S FAULT

IF HE CANNOT DO WHAT YOU ASK. It is your job to set the animal up for success by carefully adding small challenges, one at a time. It is fine to use food as a training aid for teaching your animal to stand as other people walk up to him. You can use it as a distraction and incentive to stand and help him relax and breathe. Make sure that you communicate with your helpers so they understand that they <u>only</u> get closer when you give the signal that is OK with the animal,

Teach your lama that when someone walks up to him in a field, in a catch pen or in the barn, that there is nothing to worry about. That at least 95% of the time good things will happen: a treat will be offered, he might have a walk, or a fun game with a clicker.

Standing still is very helpful for many situations on your ranch: assessing the animal's health and condition, taking a perfect photo, vet checks, examining eyes, ears, body condition and shearing. Typically the llama or alpaca is tied or restrained in these situation. Wouldn't it be nice if, in these situations, the alpaca or llama could practice learning self-control and stand in balance? Relying on force for routine handling can seem quicker, but it makes teaching your animal to stand in other circumstances much harder!

This short article outlines the very basics, but skipping the foundation means that you may not be able to get your animal to stand or that the learning process will take a LOT longer.
